# Purely operational

THE Department of Health is still insisting that there has been no change to eligibility for Non-Emergency Patient Transport (NEPT) for local patients requiring dialysis sessions with the Minister for Health's office declining to comment on the matter.

In a response to questions from this newspaper regarding the withdrawal of patient transport services by Ambulance Victoria, a media advisor to Mary-Anne Thomas, Minister for Health, stated that Ambulance Victoria has been asked to respond as it is "an operational matter."

An email later in the week from Ms Thomas's office claimed that the existing rules ensure Victorians who require clinical care during transportation will continue to be and those who don't require this additional monitoring or supervision, a large range of community and statewide based options are available.

Meanwhile the local community has reacted to the news Alexandra residents who need kidney dialysis will have to find their own transport to Seymour for treatment. A later announcement from Ambulance Victoria that the service would continue as normal of at least the next two weeks has also added to the confusion.

One dialysis patient posted online that they have secured non-emergency transport

Meanwhile the local community has adding that they hoped the service would be permanent.

In response to community concerns, Murrindindi Shire CEO, Livia Bonazzi, met with a group of citizens last week to investigate options for the impacted patients. Following the meeting council will have discussions with local health providers and the department.

For those who don't require clinical monitoring or care during transportation to medical appointments, community transport providers are available - particularly for those who may be unable to use public transport, taxi services or seek support from family and friends.

A government spokesperson has claimed that there is a large range of options available in regional areas stating that patients can connect with local travel options via information provided on the Better Health Channel website or via a hospital social worker when they are booking their appointment.

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I write to correct the record in the Letter to the Editor from Tom Collins in the Alexandra Standard and Yea Chronicle (October 2, 2024). It was disappointing to read my position on the conflict in the Middle East misrepresented so severely.

Like many Australians, I condemn the attacks on Israel on October 7 last year by Hamas and call for the return of all hostages. And like many Australians, I am appalled by the ongoing loss of life in Gaza, the suffering of innocent people, the destruction of critical infrastructure including hospitals and the obstruction of food and medical supplies. The spread of this conflict to other countries and the continued loss of life is distressing to me, and I know to many others.

As your Independent MP, I am using my position as an elected representative to push for an immediate and lasting ceasefire and immediate humanitarian aid, calling on the Australian Government to act in favour of lasting peace across the Middle East.

I have voted in the parliament to recognise Israel's right to exist and its right to defend itself, and I have also voted in favour of ceasefire in Gaza - working for peace does not mean supporting terrorism.

I condemn any violence which targets civilians, no matter the civilians and no matter the perpetrator of violence. There can be no acceptance of war crimes in any conflict and the international community must call out such actions.

My thoughts are with the communities here in Australia who are deeply and tragically impacted by the conflict. I hope that as a community we continue to discuss this issue with respect and empathy, and work towards maintaining a safe, peaceful and cohesive society.

## How voting in local council elections works

WITH ballot packs being mailed out to residents of Murrindindi Shire this week, it's worth considering the way that voting works for local council elections.

According to the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC), local council elections in which there is only one candidate being elected (per ward) use the preferential vote counting

This means that voters choose candidates on their ballot paper by numbering all the boxes in order of preference, with number one being their most preferred.

The first number on the ballot paper is the vote that really matters, with the other preferences holding little regard, except in the case of no candidate receiving enough votes.

To be elected to council, a candidate must have over 50 per cent of all first preference votes, called an absolute majority.

According to the VEC website, "if no candidate has an absolute majority, we conduct a preference results will be declared.



distribution. The candidate with fewest votes is excluded and their votes are passed on to other candidates according to voters' preferences. This process is repeated until one candidate has an absolute majority.'

With multiple candidates standing for each ward in Murrindindi Shire, all residents will need to vote in this year's council elections. Voting closes at 6pm on Friday, October 25, with November 15 being the latest date that the

# Statue now restored

THE Queen Alexandra statue, also completed in Rome as part of a known as the Princess Alexandra statue, in Alexandra's Jack Shiel Gardens has been restored after extensive work that involved the sculpting of a new marble head by a stone mason with the expertise in the style of the original.

The statue's head was removed in an act of vandalism earlier this year and following an extensive search the repairs were conducted with assistance and guidance from an experienced conservator.

The statue is on permanent loan to Alexandra from the National Gallery. It was created by English sculptor Charles Summers. The Princess Alexandra Statue is made of white Italian marble, and was commission for Sir William J. Clarke in 1876.

Sir William commissioned Charles Summers to sculpt four large statues in marble of Queen Victoria, Prince Albert, and the then Prince and Princess of Wales (later Edward VII and Queen Alexandra) for presentation to the Melbourne art gallery. The Princess Alexandra Statue was the artist's last sculpture.

At the time, Murrindindi Mayor Damien Gallagher expressed concern over the the recent act of vandalism adding that the statue commemorated Queen Alexandra as the Princess of Wales and was a monument to the shire's history.

## Call to bridge the gap

THE Victorian Government is running out of time to start and complete promised road works before the end of year on Gilmore's Bridge along the Goulburn Valley Highway, according to the Member for Eildon, Cindy McLeish.

Ms McLeish has questioned the minister as to when road surface repairs and bridge rail repairs were scheduled to occur and how long repairs were expected to take.

"The minister responded minor abutment works and minor road surface maintenance activities are required in both directions of Gilmore's Bridge on Goulburn Valley Highway which are "projected to be completed in late 2024. The minister has three months left to ensure repairs are made and

finalised. They better stop mucking around," Ms McLeish said.

"Meanwhile, road users continue to burst tyres driving on the deteriorating surface. The guard rail at Gilmores Bridge is falling apart and has become a real eye sore, not to mention a hazard. It is obvious that Labor can't manage money, cannot manage projects and it is road users who are paying the price," she added.

# **Check those** smoke alarms

THE Country Fire Authority (CFA) is reminding residents of the importance of checking their smoke alarms, advising that this simple act could be the difference between life and death in the event of a house fire.

With an average of 3000 house fires in Victoria each year, the importance of functional smoke alarms cannot be overstated.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan stressed the importance of regularly testing smoke alarms to ensure they work properly.

"Without a working smoke alarm, you may not wake up in time to escape safely in the event of a fire," Mr Heffernan said.

"We recommend testing your alarms monthly. It'll take only a few minutes of your day and could save lives.

"The more coverage of smoke alarms you have in the home, the more likely you are to wake up, so have them installed in the bedroom, living area, the hallway, even the games room, you can't have

"It's a good idea to install smoke alarms powered by 10-year lithium batteries, a small investment that will provide reliable protection for a decade."





# Pet vet survey open for feedback

THE Lost Dogs' Home is launching Victoria's biggest pet vet survey.

The cost-of-living crisis is also hitting veterinary practises hard, forcing them to increase prices to cover costs and it is understood this is making it difficult for some people to pay their vet bills.

Director of Veterinary Services at the Home, Dr Jessica Wilde, said it is important that as many people as possible participate in the survey.

"We want to hear from every Victorian who has a furry friend in their life about their experiences paying vet bills," Dr Wilde said.

"The survey results will help us to advocate for and develop low-cost vet services for people and their pets doing it tough. This includes the Lost Dogs' Home Mobile Low-Cost Vet Clinic, which will launch in the second half of 2025. This clinic will provide subsidised veterinary services to vulnerable communities in Melbourne and regional Victoria."

Dr Wilde said rising costs of veterinary supplies are forcing vets to increase their prices, creating a challenging situation for pet owners seeking care, but it's important to recognise that this adjustment comes from a place of necessity rather than a lack of compassion for their patients.

The most recent Victorian Pet Census found that 45 per cent of respondents saw cost as a barrier to using vet services.

"To make sure we provide the right services for maximum relief and support to people and their pets, doing it tough, we are asking Victorians to share their experiences with us through this short anonymous survey," Dr Wilde said.

"The Lost Dogs' Home is also advocating for the Victorian Government to offer low-cost desexing, registration and microchipping to support people to maintain pet ownership."

# Alexandra Heritage Machinery Festival

THE Alexandra Heritage Machinery Festival took place on Saturday, October 5.

There was a variety of old machinery on display, and the steam train was taking people for rides. A decent crowd attended.

Peter Aumann, vice-president of the Alexandra Timber Tramway, spoke about the event.

"The steam train is a 1909 Fowlers steam train. We have a driver experience on a dual-control Kelly and Lewis diesel locomotive. Lots of people have been taking the opportunity to drive a train for real," Peter said

"We have a blacksmith that is offering experiences as well, you can go in there and do some blacksmithing. He's got lots of stuff for sale.

"We've got a vintage haybale machine, making traditional rectangular bales. And multiple exhibits from all over the state, even from NSW and a couple from South Australia.

"There's engines that run on petrol, oil, kerosene, gas. We've got steam engines that run on wood or coal. Engines that are up to 120 years old, and we've got miniature donkeys as well."





### **Council gives evidence to parliamentary inquiry**

THE Rural City of Wangaratta and more difficult to fulfil these roles in our Murrindindi Shire Council have told a parliamentary inquiry about the challenges facing regional and rural local councils, including maintaining services from a small ratepayer base and attracting workforce.

The House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport is holding public hearings to examine and report on challenges impacting local governments and their delivery of services to the community. The two local councils appeared at a hearing in Wallan on Thursday, September 26.

Member for Indi Helen Haines is a member of the committee and attended the hearing on Thursday.

"Fixing our roads, building critical infrastructure to support more new homes and providing childcare, aged care, disability and local health services are all so important to people in Indi. That's why this committee's work is important," Dr

"I have increasingly heard from councils

communities and people are missing out.

"The issues include the small ratepayer base in regional areas, difficulties accessing federal funding for capital works and attracting a skilled workforce, an increase in service demand as our population ages and an increase in the cost of building and maintaining important infrastructure due to inflation.

"Hearing from local councils means local experiences are heard by the committee," Dr Haines said

"At the hearing we heard from Rural City of Wangaratta about the importance of federal grants for key projects, but they emphasised that accessing this funding should be simplified and the requirements for co-funding addressed.

"Murrindindi Shire Council shared valuable insights about the challenges they face with servicing a dispersed population and retaining a skilled workforce, and the cost-shifting from state governments to local governments. They want to see more Commonwealth funding quarantined for rural councils, with an equitable and that a range of factors are making it transparent grant allocation system."

Dr Haines said the committee was seeking to find solutions to ensure the sustainability of local councils.

"This committee is about looking at ways we can ensure that our local councils can continue to enable thriving regional communities. The challenges regional, rural and remote councils face are different from metropolitan equivalents, and it's important we tailor solutions with this

"As a member of the committee I worked hard to ensure our region had its voice heard, and this local hearing means committee members see and hear from local representatives firsthand.'

Other local governments from Indi who have made a submission to the inquiry are Indigo Shire Council, Wodonga City Council and Mansfield Shire Council.

The House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport will continue to hold hearings for the inquiry. You can read all submissions and transcripts of evidence on the committee's website.

#### It's time to be cyber aware

A NEW cyber safety check tool has been developed by the state government to help Victorians learn more about keeping their personal information safe and secure.

The new tool is available on the Service Victoria app and the safety check asks users questions about their online behaviour and habits such as creating strong passwords and using multi factor authentication. Once the user completes the check, they are given tailored advice on how to improve their cyber safety behaviour.

As cybercriminals become increasingly sophisticated, understanding how to safeguard personal information online is more important than ever.

Research done by the StateGovernment shows that only 39 per cent of people are using strong passwords, 33 per cent have multi factor authentication turned on and 48 per cent have enabled automatic updates.

As part of Cyber Security Awareness Month Victorians are encouraged to learn about the simple steps they can take to reduce their cyber risk and safeguard their personal data.

These simple steps include using long and unique passwords; turning on multi factor authentication; turning on automatic software updates guarding against phishing.

The state government launched a password strength tester in May for Victorians to test passwords and receive advice on how to make them stronger, so far nearly 45,000 passwords have been tested through this tool.

Both the password strength tester and the cyber safety check can be found on the Service Victoria app. Both tools are anonymous, secure and no information is collected, tracked or stored.

Victorians can learn more about being safe online by visiting the dedicated website for online safety advice. The website has a range of information on passwords, multi factor authentication, updating devices, and online

# **Marc Hodgson the** new Senior Sergeant in Murrindindi

NEW to the role of Senior Sergeant, Marc Hodgson joined the Murrindindi Shire police force on September 23. He is taking on the role of co-managing the Murrindindi police units alongside Senior Sergeant Noella Bannon.

"I've come from Heidelberg, so northwestern Melbourne. This is my first experience with country policing, so started here September 23, last week. It's very different to metropolitan policing, but there are lots of great opportunities to learn and people have all been great," Marc said.

"My title is senior sergeant, and my role is to co-manage the Murrindindi cluster of police stations, which encompasses Marysville, Eildon, Yea, Kinglake, and Alexandra, with the other senior sergeant, Noella Bannon. So we're co-managing the cluster to make sure that everyone is healthy and happy, and that we're delivering a policing service to the community."

Marc is new to Murrindindi, having worked in the suburbs of Melbourne and Melbourne itself, as well as in the Yarra Ranges. Now he has made the switch to working on this side of the Great Dividing Range.

"I've had no work relationship with Murrindindi Shire, but I've holidayed in the shire, so camping in some local areas. It's a beautiful place, a beautiful part of the state. There's a large volume of people that come through on the weekends, whether it's to go to the snow, or to camp or hike or 4WD or whatever. There's a lot of things to attract people to the area," he said.

With over 20 years in the police force, Marc has spent time as both a uniformed police officer and a detective. He joined late, in his early 30s, having spent his early career out of school working in a bank.

"I've been just over 20 years in the job. So I've split that between general duties policing, a lot of that in the eastern suburbs of Melbourne and through the Yarra Ranges and in Melbourne itself, and some time as a detective. I was in the Crime Investigation Units at Yarra Ranges, as well as Darebin, which is based out of Preston in northern Melbourne.

"So I split my time pretty close to 50-50 between detective work and general duties policing, which is uniform policing. I got promoted to sergeant at Heidelberg Police Station, north of Melbourne. I was there for about five years before getting this job and being promoted to senior sergeant.

"I always had an interest in the police force, and in law enforcement, and just decided that I would give it a go and see if I could do it. Twenty years later, here we are," Marc said.

His key focus for his new role is "providing an efficient police service delivery to the community of Murrindindi. Looking at how we roster, how we staff, so that we can respond when we need to to incidents that happen in Murrindindi. We can respond to them and make sure that the community is

Marc also spoke about a policing forum coming up on October 10 at the Mansfield Golf Club that encompasses most of the Benalla police catchment area. It is running from 12.30 to 3.30pm, and provides an "opportunity for the community to come and ask us about any issues that they're experiencing.

"I look forward to engaging with as many people as I can come in contact with from Murrindindi," Marc concluded.

# The Alexandra Fire Brigade- The start

ON Monday, February 2, 1874, the brigade conducted its first monthly meeting with Captain Radford Huddle as officer in charge, in excess of 20 members attended

To this day, the Alexandra Urban Fire Brigade still conducts its meetings on the same day each month, the first Monday, with monthly meetings having been conducted continuously since 1874.

A MEETING of residents interested in the movement and of volunteers was held at the library on Wednesday evening to meet Chief-Officer Marshall, of the Country Fire Brigade Board.

Mr. R. Willam briefly introduced the Chief Officer who then spoke at some length to the volunteer upon the subject of Fire brigade work. The brigade will consist of four office and 11men; officers to be a captain, lieutenant, foreman and secretary. The Chief-Officer suggested that a piece of land be acquired, not necessarily in the main street, and a building of 22ft. by 5Oft, be erected upon it. The board would probably be prepared to give £50 or £60 towards such erection.

At. the end of the year the men would be supplied with uniforms at a cost, of about £40, and the brigade would then come under the control of the Country Fire Brigades Board.

A maintenance grant would be allowed at the rate of £15 a year; £11 for allowances and £4 for supplies. A reel is being built for the Alexandra brigade at a cost of £20, and all other. necessary appliances had

At the close of, the evening Mr J.Clark moved a vote of thanks to the Chief-Officer. Mr Marshall, in reply, stated that in coming to Alexandra he was but doing his work, and that he hoped to be back in August or September to give the firemen a good night's practice with the appliances.

The volunteers are holding a meeting on Monday, May 2, to elect their officers, and form the brigade.

A few months later in May 1874 the main street again suffered when another outbreak of fire caused the loss of additional buildings, however, reports indicate the formation of a fire brigade, with discipline, expertise and training, paid dividends as this fire was contained after a prolonged battle. There had, however, been some problems as Captain Huddle and three members resigned immediately after the incident.

Regular training for members had captain. Raphael had been a member of commenced and records indicate a common drill was for the fireman to don their new red uniforms, form up and march to the racecourse where a member climbed a tree and others then had to supply continuous supply of water, using buckets, to the top of

By June 1874, Maurice Raphael, local real estate agent and auctioneer, had become

the Ballarat Brigade earlier and is credited mostly of the early development. He was also involved in many other local organisations. Sadly, he died, aged 46 in 1877. His tombstone at the Alexandra cemetery indicated his parents names as Phillip and Elizabeth and he had 17 brothers and sisters.


In the years that followed the brigade prospered and towards the turn of the century the members of the Alexandra Brigade became involved in the demonstrations (later known as championships) all over the state. The brigade was very successful winning many trophies, Firefighting equipment, though very basic was accrued, and amounted to the items including axes, kerosene torches, uniforms ladder, canvas hose, hydrants, branches/ nozzles and a wire strainer.

The erection of a fire bell on a small tower in the main street near the library, adjacent to the UT Creek, was a major move forward to alert the brigade members to the existence of a fire call. A continuous tolling of the bell indicated an urban fire call, and three tolls followed by a pause was the message alerting residents of a bushfire in the district. This historic bell is nowadays situated in front of the existing joint emergency services facility in Shamrock Street Alexandra.

Urban firefighting capabilities escalated significantly with the laying of water mains throughout the central town area in 1900. Around this time, the brigade acquired a hose reel. This equipment, still used in Fire brigade championships today, and remaining available currently for the Alexandra Urban Fire Brigade, enables a few hundred metres of 64 mm to be taken to a fire scene, with hydrant, branches and nozzles. Very effective, however the disadvantage being the reel had to be pulled by firefighters to the scene, either running or walking and usually panting. It could often prove a problem when the fire was uphill from the fire station, and the Alexandra Station was located in one of the lowest areas in town. Pity help the members if the call was up the hill to the hospital or the catholic church.

The earliest recollection of the Alexandra fire shed is a building located in Perkins Street behind the library. The brigade also hosted demonstrations in the same area, near the shed, for many years, this being the running track for many visiting brigades until the 1960's.

To better coordinate urban fire brigades throughout Victoria the Country Fires Board was formed in 1891, however the Alexandra Fire Brigade decided to stay as an unaffiliated brigade until January 1, 1911.

# Three Shops Destroyed

Alexandra and Yea Standard and Yarck, Gobur, Thornton and Acheron Express (Vic. : 1908 - 1949) Friday, September 17, 1926

THE loud clanging of the fire bell about 2 o'clock on Tuesday morning aroused the people of the town from their sleep (at least those who had retired to rest, as there were many folk who had just barely arrived home from the dance in the Shire Hall), and Grant Street soon presented an animated scene.

The fire apparently broke out in Mrs. E. O'Donnell's drapery shop, on the opposite side of the street to the "Standard" office. The flames quickly spread to the shop adjoining Mr. Verrier's produce store, and later on to the unused shop at the bakery, on the other side of Mrs. O'Donnell's shop.

At one stage it looked as if Mr.Cowie's shop and Mr. Cookson's office would be gutted. If that had happened, then Mr. Alf. Stillman's garage and all the buildings up to the Alexandra Hotel would have shared the same fate. Fortunately there was no wind.

When members of the Fire Brigade arrived on the scene there was considerable loss of time owing to difficulty in locating the fire plug. When at last the hydrant was fixed, and the hose screwed on, the pressure of water was found to be weak. However, notwithstanding this handicap, the fire was attacked from the roof of Mr. Cowie's shop, and after about half an hour's work it became evident that there would he no extension of the fire beyond the old unused bakery shop.

The fire bell was rung by Mr.Strickland, an employee of Mr.Vial. He was working in the

bakehouse, which is slightly to the rear of Mrs. O'Donnell's shop, when he heard a crackling sound, and on investigation found that a fire was burning in Mrs. O'Donnell's shop. Mr Verrier's stock was insured for £200 and Mrs. O'Donnell's for £200. Mr.Vial had a number of bags of flour damaged by water and heat, and he estimates his loss at £50. He had no insurance. Mr.Verrier considers that it will take £75 more than the insurance to cover his loss.

The premises, which were of brick, formed one building. They were part of the Hill estate and are owned by Miss Weymouth. The building was insured for £450. This includes the bakehouse and shed.

A word of commendation is due to Lieut. Hubbard and the firemen under him. They did good work. The cause of the fire is unknown.

Shortly after 1am on Tuesday Mrs. O'Donnell stopped at her shop on the way home from the dance in the Shire Hall, in company with some other ladies. The other ladies passed on, and Mrs O'Donnell entered the shop and picked up a parcel (a pair of boots) that she was to deliver to a person going out into the country. No matches were struck inside the shop; only a match outside on the footpath, which was struck for the purpose of locating the keyhole.

After Tuesday morning's experience it is indicate that the plug is distant so many feet. quite evident that the fire plugs in the town must at once be opened up and properly marked. A few minutes more delay in locating the plug opposite the fire in Grant Street and Mr. Cowie's shop, Mr. Cookson's office, Mr. Stillman's garage and private home, Miss Pease's shop, Mr. Collis's shop and dwelling, Miss Bossing's fruit shop and all the wooden buildings at the Alexandra Hotel would have been destroyed. There is a "white" peg near the "Standard" office, which is supposed to

It is absolutely misleading, as the plug is 6 or 7 ft. out of line, and it was covered with earth.

Another matter that requires attention is a plan whereby a full head of water can be directed to the section where the fire is located. At Tuesday morning's fire only one hose could be used, as the main was apparently unable to supply two hoses. The present main from the reservoir to the town is too small (being only four inches in diameter), and is no doubt badly corroded inside.

#### **Storms: Alexandra Fire Brigade report**

CHRIS Lynch, captain of the Alexandra Fire Brigade, said that their activities started with a 38 degree day and unstable atmosphere, so they were on high alert for fire outbreaks. This then turned into storm relief.

When storms arrived, the SES takes over, so the CFA worked alongside them, helping with tree removal.

They also had a few lightning strikes around that they kept an eye on. Taggerty, Buxton and Acheron fire brigades turned out to a fire on Connellys Creek Road where lightning had struck a tree and the fire had spread into the grass.

Chris commented, "Things were made quite difficult when, one, we lost power and two, when our communication systems went down. We had to put a fair few things in place because Triple Zero went down. We had several backup plans, not only for us

to receive calls but places like the hospital as well. Eildon, Marysville, Alexandra and Yea Fire Stations were open 24/7 for people to come in and charge phones and make outside contact. We had a station manned for the majority of that until the power came back on."

There was also a small house fire where someone had left something on the stove. A neighbour ran to the station to alert the brigade. Fortunately, there was little damage, "but it proved to us that we need to have these things in place for us to get communications through, especially emergency calls."

He added, "It was a bit of a nightmare across the board, really."

He was very pleased with the way that the members of the brigade adapted to the changing situation.

POLICE and emergency services Minister Bob Cameron has praised the efforts of the CFA firefighters across the state, who over the weekend contained 370 grass and scrub fires.





## Never leave your cooking unattended

VICTORIA'S fire services are reminding the community never to leave cooking unattended as it remains the leading cause of fires in the home.

CFA responded to around 250 fires that started in the kitchen across the state last year, an increase of 20 from the previous year.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said unattended cooking was one of the most common causes of preventable house fires.

'We know a fire in your kitchen can cause extensive damage and high level injuries, and unfortunately we saw this occur four times last year," Jason said.

"We know that 6pm is the peak time for fires, and most are due to unattended cooking or mechanical failure.

"Make sure your kitchen appliances are in good working order, and ensure your stove top, griller, oven, rangehood and cooking area are free from built up grease, dust and oil.

"While most fatal fires occur in sleeping areas, it is important to note that most residential fires start in the kitchen.'

Fire Rescue Victoria Deputy Commissioner Community Safety Joshua Fischer said it was essential to maintain awareness and pay close attention to the stove when cooking to reduce the risks of a fire starting in the kitchen.

"Cooking is a part of everyday life, but no one can afford to be complacent about the fire safety risks. Ensuring you don't leave your cooking unattended may save your life and property," Deputy Commissioner Fischer said.

"If a fire does start in the kitchen, turn off the stove if it's safe to do so. Use a fire extinguisher or fire blanket only if you are confident to use them. Evacuate everyone from the home, close the kitchen door if safe to do so, and call Triple Zero."

Deputy Commissioner Fischer said all Victorians should have working smoke alarms powered by a 10 year long life battery in all sleeping and living areas of their home.

"If affordable, we recommend installation of interconnected smoke alarms, so when any alarm activates, all smoke alarms will sound throughout the house," Deputy Commissioner Fisher said.

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

#### BE THUNDERSTORM READY THIS SPRING

With thunderstorm season starting on October 1st, the Goulburn Valley Public Health Unit (GVPHU) urges people who experience asthma and hay fever to prepare now.

What Is Thunderstorm Asthma? Thunderstorm asthma is a rare weather-related event that primarily occurs during spring, but can extend until December, aligned with the grass pollen season. It happens during storms when grass pollen is broken into tiny particles and inhaled. These particles can trigger sudden, severe asthma attacks, particularly in those with asthma or hay fever.

Who Is at Risk? You are at higher risk if you:

- Have hay fever
- Have a current or a history of asthma
- Have undiagnosed asthma

#### **How to Protect Yourself:**

- 1. Use your preventer inhaler as prescribed and as directed especially in Spring
- 2. Manage hay fever with advice from your GP or pharmacist.
- 3. Monitor daily pollen forecasts via Vic Emergency website or APP.
- 4. Be Prepared: Keep asthma action plans up to date and ensure you have enough medication on hand like inhalers and antihistamines.

# Recognising mental health

October 10, is themed 'It's Time to Prioritise Mental Health in the Workplace.

The need for mental health services is well known, with over 10 per cent of Murrindindi Shire residents currently experiencing a mental health condition. Alexandra District Health (ADH) has a small mental health team of qualified professionals who responded to approximately 150 people in need of referral, support or therapy in the 2023-24 year.

Risk of psychological injury is a consideration in all workplaces, so preventing burn-out among health professionals is an important mental health strategy for health organisations. Successful and continued delivery of mental health services requires healthy mental health clinicians and this is best achieved through providing healthy work environments.

To strengthen the local mental health workforce ADH launched the Murrindindi Mental Health Professionals Network in

THIS year's World Mental Health day, held on November 2023. This local network is run in partnership with the national Mental Health Professionals Network (MHPN) and currently has 23 members from both private and public services with diverse backgrounds including a doctor, psychologist, occupational therapist, social worker, nurse, art therapist, music therapist, grief counsellor, allied health assistant and family support worker.

> Breakfast meetings are hosted at Alexandra District Health at least four times a year and include either a presentation by a guest speaker or a focussed discussion on a particular issue, and general sharing of resources and information between members. Recent topics covered include Family Violence, and Men's Mental Health, with the next meeting (held in late October) exploring Borderline Personality Disorder.

# Species saved at Snobs Creek

EGGS from the critically endangered Moroka galaxias have been laid in a captive breeding program for the first time at the Victorian Fisheries Authority's (VFA) Snobs Creek Conservation Hatchery.

VFA Chief Executive Officer Travis Dowling said this marks a significant turning point in the journey to save the species, found in a single population in the Alpine National Park.

"Small-bodied native fish like Moroka galaxias are the foundation of healthy

aquatic ecosystems and the conservation hatchery at Snobs Creek is making projects like this possible," Mr Dowling said.

"Our next steps are to establish two new populations of Moroka galaxias in rivers where they've become locally extinct, putting our eggs in different baskets for their protection."

Broodstock were sourced by the staff from the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action's Arthur Rylah Institute for Environmental Research from a twokilometre stretch of headwater stream across their remaining range in a tributary of the Wonnangatta River near Dargo.

The small population of fish was then transported to Snobs Creek in insulated containers with a supply of oxygen. The eggs were laid and fertilised by the broodstock and will go through a period of incubation before hatching as juvenile fry, which will take two to three years to reach maturity and grow to approximately eight centimetres in size.

They join several other endangered or critically endangered aquatic species from across Victoria being bred at the conservation hatchery, including the Glenelg freshwater mussel, the south-western Victorian blackfish, and the southern purple-spotted Gudgeon.

Captive breeding populations, alongside restocked wild populations, mean additional safeguards in the case of future fire, flood, drought or predator invasion events, moving them away from the brink of extinction.

### Farmer worries on the rise

THE National Farmer Priority survey results have been released and the National Farmers Federation have said a growing number of farmers love what they do in their communities however, industry sentiment is deteriorating with half of farmers less positive about the future of family run farms.

One thousand and twenty-six farmers across Australia had their say on the survey and it showed farmers are worried about a wide range of policy pressures, with biosecurity, the market power of supermarkets, and federal environment laws topping the list.

Farmers are worried about farmer sentiment towards the Federal Government's policy agenda has continued to slide by up to 39 per cent in the second National Farmer Priorities Survey by the National Farmers' Federation in partnership with Seftons.

The survey found heightened levels of concern across a range of issues compared to last year, up by an average of eight per cent across all metrics.

Biosecurity topped the list of concerns with 94 per cent of farmers voicing concerns. The market power of supermarkets and processors fell to a close second place at 93.9 per cent. Federal environment laws ranked third at 92.5 per cent, both up more than 10 per cent on 2023.

The largest swings in concern levels, compared with 2023, were seen towards biosecurity (up 12.7 per cent) and live sheep exports (up 12.2 per cent).

There has been a steep decline in farmers' confidence in the Federal Government, with ratings across four sentiment measures deteriorating by an average of 32 per cent in the past 12 months. This includes one in 10 believing the government has a positive plan for the farming sector, a drop of nearly 38 per cent from 2023.

However, in good news the survey found 89 per cent agree with the statement "I love what I do" and 78 per cent say their community is a "great place to live," with those measures rising by 18 per cent and 10 per cent respectively.

NFF President, David Jochinke said, "The results are unsurprising. Critical issues like the live sheep export ban, biosecurity tax and water buybacks have weighed heavily on farmers.

"Particularly telling are the results around the live sheep exports. Despite only 10 per cent of respondents hailing from WA, it rated as one of the highest areas of concern.

"This clearly demonstrates when bad policy infiltrates one sector, it puts every other sector on notice that they could be next.

Mr Jochinke added, "With meaningful engagement from the government together we can build a more positive outlook for Australian agriculture and reach our shared goal to be a \$100 billion industry by 2030."
