Meeting to discuss Breakaway Bridge

COUNCIL met last Thursday to discuss what needs to be done regarding Breakaway Bridge, a historic connecting bridge between Alexandra and Acheron, that was damaged beyond usability in the October 2022 floods.

The meeting, which took place at 7pm on Thursday, April 4, discussed the available options for Breakaway Bridge moving forward, as well as the key factors that influence what can be done about the bridge.

The presenters included the mayor of Murrindindi Shire, Damien Gallagher, the director of community and development for the shire, Andrew Paxton, the manager of flood recovery, Kim Chadband, and senior planner for the council, Cameron Fraser.

The Minister for Emergency Services, Jacinda Symes, was an apology for the evening, along with MPs Cindy Mcleish and Helen Haines, councillors McAuley, Gerencser, Carpenter and Lording.

The current options for Breakaway Bridge include repairing the bridge, which would not guarantee its stability in future flood events, replacing the bridge with a modern structure, or leaving the situation as is and conducting no repairs or restructuring.

There were discussions around the historical significance of Breakaway Bridge and how that relates to any actions moving forward, in relation to whether to keep the

historic bridge or upgrade to a modern, up to code, bridge.

The bridge is of Regional Significance according to the Victorian Heritage Database, and is listed in Murrindindi Shire Council's Heritage Overlay, meaning that a planning permit is required before moving forward with any of the options.

Lake Mountain

AT a public meeting in Marysville on March 27, about 75 people discussed the impact that changes to the winter operation of Lake Mountain would have on Marysville and the Triangle.

Most felt that the \$20 fee to enter the toboggan slope would have an extremely negative impact on visitation to the mountain. And of course, there will be a major flow-on to food and accommodation businesses.

In the past, families had to pay the car entrance to the mountain, and any hire charges. Now, a family of four will need to find another \$80 on top of the car entry and hire costs. In these difficult economic times, it's hard to see that this will not have a significant effect on the numbers visiting the mountain, and indeed, on the mood of visitors to the area.

Despite the claims of Alpine Resorts Victoria staff, a charge like this has never been applied anywhere in Victoria. Mt Buller is the closest to it with a \$15 charge to toboggan at Mt Buller, but that includes the hire of a toboggan.

A major difference between Lake Mountain and other resorts is that tobogganing is the primary reason for most visitors to Lake Mountain, whereas it's a novelty add-on at the other resorts.

Further, while the major resorts cater to a middle to upper income bracket, Lake Mountain firmly attracts the lower to middle income earners. Applying a one rule to fit all simply cannot work.

People are already discussing ways to circumvent this \$20 impost.

Strong arguments were presented by schools against closing the resort on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Schools typically do not go skiing on Mondays and Fridays, so the large majority of schools will be wanting to go to the mountain on Thursdays, and there will most likely be a shortage of instructors

Local schools are bemoaning the loss of the shuttle buses from Marysville to the mountain.

With no ski lessons to be available on school holidays and weekends, combined with the severe disruption to school skiing, the whole future of skiing at what used to be promoted as 'Australia's premier cross country ski destination' seems to be in jeopardy.

It's disappointing that the community has only heard about these changes on the cusp of a new season and has had no opportunity to influence the decision. Together with the cessation of logging in the area (regardless of anyone's opinion on that), the future for the Triangle area looks bleak.

Anzac Day services require a permit

FOLLOWING concerns from local RSL groups over the requirement that Anzac Day and other services during the year require a permit, Murrindindi Shire Council provided the following response.

"Local Law Permits are required for all public events and functions undertaken on land managed by Council. The permit process ensures our public land is used appropriately and that event organisers are supported to plan and deliver safe and enjoyable events. It considers traffic management requirements, as well as covering insurance and liability protection for the organisers from any claim or incident that may occur during the event. There is no charge to apply for a Local Law Activity Permit.

"It is understood that the permit requirement also applies to Remembrance Day, as well as any other public event or function held on land managed by council.

"Our Community Safety and Events staff work closely with event organisers, supporting the application process. We are pleased to be engaged with all nine Anzac Day event organisers across the Shire and haven't been informed of any issues with the application process.

"Some Anzac Day events have not sought permits in the past. This leaves them vulnerable to risk and liability exposure, as technically, they are not authorised to conduct public events on council land, hence their insurance is void.

This is why we have initiated a change this year to ensure that all events are treated the same and have permits.

"The event permit process is simple and council officers work closely with event organisers to step them through what's required. If they are unable to apply for a permit, we will discuss with them the best path forward for a safe and smooth event.

"Council is proud to support the celebration of Anzac Day and we continue to work with the organisers of the events to ensure they are all run safely and successfully."





Lake Eildon assessment finds no viable options for flood mitigation

THE Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA)'s technical assessment of Lake Eildon's operating arrangements, conducted by Hydrology and Risk Consulting, has been released. The aim of the assessment was to find ways of reducing downstream flooding, and particularly referenced the October 2022 flood event.

The technical assessment "does not identify any option at Lake Eildon which warrants further consideration.'

Six options were explored for their potential to improve protection for downstream communities. The report states, "All options explored were found to be ineffective or unreliable as flood mitigation strategies, or created costs and impacts that outweigh the benefits of a change to how the storage is managed."

It adds, "The assessment report highlights that tributaries that flow into the Goulburn River downstream of Lake Eildon have a more significant impact on flooding in communities downstream, including Molesworth and Seymour, than releases from the lake."

The options assessed were:

Option one: Changing target filling curves so that Lake Eildon is full later in the year (for example December/January instead of October/November) and under less conservative inflow statistics (for example, reaching full supply in 85 years out of 100 instead of 95 years).

Option two: Reducing target storage levels by holding the lake, where possible, at a maximum volume of 78, 85, 90 or 95 per cent of full supply level (FSL) all year round.

Option three: Reducing target storage based on climate signals by holding the lake, where possible at a lower FSL based on industry-standard climate indicators indicating a wet year. This was dismissed as "climate signals tested for this were generally poor predictors however, the cost of offsetting supply of monthly inflows and storage volumes at Lake Eildon."

Option four: Pre-releasing based on forecast rainfall by releasing water to create airspace within the lake, two to three days prior to forecast rainfall and resulting inflows. This was dismissed due to uncertainty regarding the rain location and "the event-based analysis of the October 1993 and October 2022 floods showed that increasing prereleases to the moderate flood class level flow threshold downstream of Lake Eildon exacerbated the peak flows estimated at Seymour."

Option five: Changing maximum surcharge by increasing the amount of water that is held in the lake above the FSL during a flood. This was dismissed as the "option would increase the duration of Lake Eildon outflows above the minor, moderate and major flood classifications at Eildon as well as materially increase the likelihood of the dam overtopping during back-to-back floods."

Option six: Restricting maximum outflows by restricting the outflows to match the minor, moderate or major flood class levels downstream of Lake Eildon, and allowing the reservoir to surcharge more often. This option was dismissed as the "option would increase the duration of Lake Eildon outflows above the minor, moderate and major flood classifications at Eildon."

Options three, four, five and six were not deemed to be robust flood mitigation options.

The report states, "The two options that progressed to the detailed technical assessment were changing the target filling curve (option one) and reducing the target storage (option two). These options could increase the flood mitigation provided by Lake Eildon; evening of Tuesday, April 9.

reliability impacts outweighed the avoided flood damages."

It adds, "The main reason for the low benefit to cost ratio is that the flood mitigation benefits provided by the changes to target filling curve (option one) and reduced target storage (option two) diminish the further downstream the flood frequencies are assessed. Namely, the degree of difference between the frequency estimates reduce by Molesworth, and the difference is then minor at Seymour. This is because the tributary flows downstream of Eildon from the Rubicon River. Acheron River. Yea River, King Parrot Creek, Sugarloaf Creek and Sunday Creek influences the peak flows at towns such as Seymour. This means that changes to operations at Eildon have less influence on reducing the overall avoided damages downstream. In contrast, the approximate initial capital cost of water shares to implement these options ranges from \$7.5 million to \$266 million.

"When looking at the 1993 and 2022 floods, the only option that would have made a difference to what was actually observed during these floods, would have been holding the storage to a reduced level of 78 per cent FSL. However, this option still had a low cost to benefit ratio. If option one or any other target storage within option two was implemented, there would have been no material difference to the flows observed downstream of Lake Eildon, Molesworth and Seymour."

They also commented on the negative environmental impacts of the two options and for community and recreational facilities, the water's edge would increase.

Fire restrictions set to end April 15

THE Fire Danger Period (FDP) will finish at 1am on Monday, April 15 in Murrindindi Shire. While the restrictions being lifted, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) still expects the grassfire risk to remain across the state so Victorians need to remain alert and prepared.

CFA District 22 Assistant Chief Fire Officer Rohan Taylor said with weather conditions changing they're able to lift restrictions to assist people in the agricultural sector with preparations for cropping and farming.

"It's also an opportunity for people to start cleaning up around their properties. The fuels are still very dry in the Goulburn Valley, so we're urging everyone to stay safe, whether you're living in or travelling to high bushfire risk areas" he said.

"Please monitor the conditions on hot, dry and windy days, as we may still see some days of elevated fire risk." The end of the FDP will be an opportunity for some landowners to burn-off again, however it's important that residents check that local conditions are safe before undertaking these activities.

"You must register your burn-offs, check weather conditions and follow local council laws and regulations," ACFO Taylor said.

"Registering your burn-off ensures that if smoke or fire is reported, the incident is crosschecked with our register, which prevents firefighters from unnecessarily responding."

"When conducting burn-offs, remain alert and always have resources on hand to extinguish the fire. Landowners can register their burn-off online at *firepermits.vic.gov.au* or call 1800 668 511. If possible, landowners should also notify their neighbours and others nearby who may be sensitive to smoke so they can take necessary precautions.



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Meeting to discuss Breakaway Bridge

There were also discussions around the state of funding for the bridge, with regards to flood recovery money being available to repair the bridge back to its original stage, which was affected by the floods. Upgrading the bridge was estimated to lead to a \$5 million shortfall.

"For Breakaway Bridge, our costs range from hundreds of thousands of dollars, to approximately \$6 million," Kim Chadband, manager of flood recovery for the shire, said.

"And we've got other issues in relation to timing. I suppose the bottom line is primarily that political advocacy will be the key to achieving a positive outcome," she said, when discussing the funding issue.

There was a significant amount of community engagement, with many questions directed to the council, displaying the concern the community has for the issue.

The bridge acts as a cut-through for local residents from Alexandra to the Maroondah Highway, and the loss of the bridge affects transport and emergency services.

Jamie Duggan from Breakaway Twin Rivers Caravan Park said, "Breakaway Bridge for our area, is practical to have in place. It's an emergency in and out point, so we have two in and out points out here. It's something that I don't think should be considered, not being rebuilt at all. I think we need it.

"Replacing whatever is there now is fine, as long as there is still a bridge. We've managed with a one way bridge for a while, a few years now. A two-way would be great, but a two-way isn't practical because they'd have to take land either from the caravan park or the farmer across the road who's already lost land," he said.

Jamie has launched a petition to garner support for fixing the bridge.

"That's to prove to council, because there are people in the Acheron area that are retired, and they're happy to have no bridge put back there, because they think for some reason that there's less traffic now that the bridge is closed, which is not possible because we go over Breakaway Bridge to go into town, and now we're going up Acheron Road. Council needs to realise that it's a vital part of the area," he said.

Moving forward, the council is seeking to determine the state of funding for the bridge, at which point further discussion will be had with the community surrounding the options and their feasibility.

Digital drivers licences

VICTORIANS will now have the option to carry their licence on their phone, with the Victorian Government's digital driver licenses set to begin rolling out across the state next month.

Minister for Roads and Road Safety, Melissa Horne, and Minister for Government Services, Gabrielle Williams, announced the rollout.

Throughout April, consultation will ramp up with organisations that rely on photo identification including bars, restaurants, retailers, Victoria Police, and Australia Post to ensure they're prepared for the rollout.

In May, more than 4.5 million Victorians who are fully licenced drivers, motorcyclists, or heavy vehicle operators will be the first eligible to download digital driver's licences as part of the state-wide launch.

This follows a successful trial in Ballarat last year, where more than 15,000 Victorians accessed their digital licences via the myVicRoads and Service Victoria apps.

Digital licences have undergone rigorous privacy and security testing, boasting features like a dynamic hologram and a timed QR code that businesses and authorities can scan to verify authenticity and prevent fraudulent use.

The licences can also be updated in real-time if there are changes to licence conditions or personal information like home addresses.

Victorians who have downloaded either the VicRoads or Services Victoria app will automatically receive their digital licence through their app once it has been processed in May and will be alerted either by push notification or email.

Learners and probationary licence holders will be able to access their digital licence by 2025. Visit the VicRoads or Service Victoria websites to find out more about digital driver licences.

Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne said, "Our digital driver licences will make it easier for Victorians when they go about their day-to-day lives, whether that's driving around, renting a car, collecting a parcel, or visiting a licensed venue.

Minister for Government Services Gabrielle Williams added, "Victorians have been asking us for a digital driver licence, and from next month millions of Victorians can access them on their phones alongside other governmentissued cards like a Working with Children Check, seniors card or fishing licence."

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Keeping the honey bee population healthy

WITH over 47,900 registered beekeepers who own approximately 855,300 hives, keeping Australia's honey bee population healthy is no mean feat.

'Bee Pest Blitz' is an annual monthlong national campaign to increase awareness of the importance of bee biosecurity and encourage beekeepers to inspect their hives for high priority exotic and established pests.

Launched in 2023, the annual campaign calls on all Australian honey bee beekeepers to undertake biosecurity surveillance activities.

"Surveillance is key to the timely detection of new pests and provides the best chance for industries and governments to respond before pests become established and widespread," Sarah Hilton, Bee Biosecurity Manager at Plant Health Australia said.

Under the *Honey Bee Industry* Code of Practice beekeepers are required to inspect their hives twice per year, using a method that looks for the presence of arthropod pests, including Varroa spp. (varroa) and Tropilaelaps spp. (tropilaelaps) mites.

By participating in 'Bee Pest Blitz' beekeepers will fulfil one of their annual bee biosecurity obligations and requirements.

This time of the year is ideal to conduct hive inspections which are crucial for the early detection of exotic and reporting of high priority established bee pests.

Beekeepers are asked to keep samples of suspected pests and report their findings via the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline 1800 084 881.

Surveillance reporting will be handled at a jurisdictional level and

all personal information will be kept confidential.

"Maintaining honey bee health and sustainable bee populations is essential for the future production of Australian honey and supporting those agricultural sectors that depend on honey bee pollination services," Sarah said.

Seeking farms for demonstrations

AGRICULTURE Victoria, in partnership with Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA), is conducting a new producer demonstration program with the opportunity to establish five new on-farm demonstration projects.

Agriculture Victoria Project Leader Farming Systems, Bindi Hunter, said the program is inviting expressions of interest from Victorian sheep and beef producer groups to design and conduct their own three-year project.

"The demonstrations are conducted on group members' farms (preferably three sites per project per year) and involve participation by members in group activities, including skill development, site monitoring and discussion of results.

"Projects must be focused on increasing adoption of key management practices or commercially available technologies that improve business profitability, farm productivity and sustainability," Ms Hunter said.

Selected projects will focus on demonstrating systems or technologies in one of four priority areas: Manage and adapt to a changing climate or specific regional conditions (e.g. addressing feed gaps, grazing system, enterprise mix); reduce emissions or emissions intensity, (e.g. reproductive efficiencies, feed types and quality, soil fertility management); manage animal health and welfare risks resulting from increasing or emerging biosecurity threats in a changing climate; or implement on-farm innovations that improve production and management efficiencies (e.g. recent research findings, genetics, ag tech).

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



What's happening at the state's hospitals?

THE state Liberal Party have claimed that "regional and rural health services across Victoria are facing forced amalgamations, service cuts and closures as the state government slashes millions in health funding.

Leader of the Opposition, John Pesutto, said, "Victorians should make no mistake, these are not changes to improve efficiency, but desperate and savage cuts triggered by Labor's financial mismanagement.

"Under the Allan Labor Government, regional and rural communities across the state will be stripped of their voice in local health services.'

Shadow Minister for Health, Georgie Crozier, accused the government of "funding cuts by stealth... it is patients across rural and regional Victoria who will suffer."

Health Minister Mary-Anne Thomas spoke to Richard Willingham on ABC Melbourne on Thursday, April 4, in response to media reports saying that regional hospitals may be forced to close if they are unable to find savings.

She said that the article in the *Herald Sun* on Thursday was "at best misleading and at worst it's just simply wrong.'

She pointed out that the government has invested \$24.8 billion, almost a third of the state's budget, in the health service system and they want to see it spent on care delivery. They're keen for health services to look at their use of consultants and public relations staff, and to see if there are duplicated processes.

She noted pressure that COVID-19 put onto the state's budget as well as on medical services, and the extended lifespan of Victorians. She also acknowledged the staffing challenges in regional hospitals.

She said, "There will be no hospital closures under my watch."

Contacted for further comment, including whether amalgamations or budget cuts are in play, a Victorian Government spokesperson said, "There are no plans to close any Victorian hospitals, unlike the Liberal National Party. We are not in the business of shutting down, privatising or slashing funding to our hospitals.

"Victorians rightly expect us to prioritise the frontline health services they need and that is what we have done. Streamlining back of house functions will not impact our frontline health workers.

'We have a world-class health system in Victoria. It continues to be our largest investment and this will continue to be the case."

It's understood that the Department of Health has requested that services look at options to reduce any back of house inefficiencies, as it was not acceptable to learn that some rural health services were using taxpayer funds on expensive PR firms and other consultants.

Member for Eildon Cindy McLeish said, "These funding cuts by stealth are the realworld consequence of Labor's financial mismanagement and, it is patients across rural and regional Victoria who will suffer. These cuts and threats of large-scale amalgamations demonstrate the disregard Labor has for our local community. This is not the first-time health services have been amalgamated, there are already a number of hospitals in the west of the state that have been forced to amalgamate to survive. Make no mistake, these are not changes to improve efficiency, but desperate and savage cuts triggered by Labor's financial mismanagement.

Are you able to identify the people in this image? -S **Extension for** e-scooter trial THE government is extending the current e-scooter trial for the next six months to investigate additional safety and compliance measures ahead of introducing permanent regulatory settings later this year, ensuring e-scooters are safer for all road users.

Victorians, especially shift workers, have embraced e-scooters as another mode of transport for getting home, with more than eight million trips recorded during a closely monitored trial – making the public hire share scheme one of the world's most popular.

Minister for Public and Active Transport, Gabrielle Williams, commented on the e-scooter program, saying, "E-scooters are here to stay – they've proven popular among commuters, especially shift workers, providing an additional option to travel home safely.'

Data gathered during the trial period shows most e-scooter users are doing the right thing, however it also indicates that more time is needed to improve compliance and make e-scooters safer, and support riders to understand the rules.

"We have more work to do on safety and compliance to ensure that e-scooters are safe when they're made permanent later this year," Ms Williams said.

The government is investigating extra measures to ensure e-scooter riders and other road users are fully aware of and comply with the rules for e-scooter use. During this time, the current settings will continue.

To assist with this, a refreshed education campaign is being developed for roll out across trial areas, focusing on safe rider behaviour, helmet use and e-scooter parking.

Riders must not ride on footpaths, always wear a helmet, be at least 16 years old, not carry a passenger and not drink and ride. E-scooters must not travel at more than 20km/h and only be ridden on roads with a maximum speed limit of 60km/h or less.

User surveys conducted by share scheme operators revealed that around 28 per cent of e-scooter trips in metropolitan areas and up to 40 per cent of trips in Ballarat replaced a vehicle trip (private car or rideshare vehicle) on the riders' most recent e-scooter ride, helping to alleviate traffic congestion and reduce emissions.

Share hire e-scooters are only legal in councils that have an agreement with an operator.

The government will continue to help councils who choose to introduce share hire schemes by developing a guide with best practice advice on how to manage e-scooter share schemes, including parking management and operator insurance requirements.

The current settings will now end on October 4.

Time for Aussies to shoot flu

THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia is urging all eligible Australians to get their flu shot following an alarming number of flu cases across the country.

In the first quarter of 2024 there were 26,836 influenza cases reported by the National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System (NNDSS).

By February, case numbers were already double those reported at the same time

Pharmacy Guild National President Professor, Trent Twomey, says Australians should get ahead of the flu season and get their vaccination now.

"The flu season typically runs from May to October," Professor Twomey said. "However, flu vaccines for the 2024 season are available now in community pharmacies across Australia."

Professor Twomey said that getting vaccinated ahead of the flu season is important for protecting yourself and your loved ones from the flu and its complications.

"Although the vaccine will last throughout the year, it is most effective in the first three to four months following its administration."

According to the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI), people who received an influenza *com.au* to book an appointment.

vaccine in late 2023 are still recommended to get the flu vaccine in 2024.

ATAGI also advises that flu vaccines can be given on the same day as other vaccines, such as COVID-19.

The Australian Government funds influenza vaccines for eligible patients under the National Immunisation Program (NIP).

Further information will be available from the Department of Health and Aged Care when NIP-funded influenza vaccines become available.

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



Princess Alexandra's knee

WHILE the focus of Alexandra's attention of late has been on Princess Alexandra's missing head, much attention was given to the state of her knee in times past. So much so that a copycatting fashion trend developed, called the Alexandra Limp.

In 1867, Princess Alexandra of Denmark, Princess of Wales, gave birth to her third child and was diagnosed with rheumatic fever, a combination of strep throat and scarlet fever which was sometimes deadly, given that this was prior to the advent of antibiotics.

While the princess survived, she needed to learn to walk again with the aid of walking sticks, and she continued to limp both during and after her recovery. The limp may also have been caused by migratory arthritis or gonococcal arthritis, with the latter possibly transmitted to her husband, the future King Edward VII.

Princess Alexandra often wore choker necklaces or dresses with high collars, both of which were intended to hide a small scar on her neck. Many noblewomen followed the trend, changing the fashion of the day.

When the limp developed, this too developed into a trend, later known as the Alexandra Limp. Among both the nobility and the lower classes in both England and Scotland, the limping trend took off after it was discovered that a limp could be mimicked through wearing an uneven pair of shoes.

The fashionistas sought out uneven shoes, initially from an Edinburgh-based cobbler who provided shoes to the queen. They asked for shoes which would help them to replicate the limp.

Other cobblers soon followed suit, providing pairs of shoes in which one shoe had a low heel and the other had a high heel.

Able-bodied women were frequently seen limping around the towns and cities. The trend began to fade after a year or two, possibly due to the unpleasant side-effects of chronic limping, or possibly because they found other ways to torture themselves for fashion.

The North British Mail said in 1969, "A monstrosity has made itself visible among the female promenaders in Princes Street. It is as painful as it is idiotic and ludicrous. Taking my customary walk the other day, observant of men, women and things, I met three ladies. They were all three young, all three good-looking, and all three lame! At least, such was my impression, seeing as they all carried handsome sticks and limped; but, on looking back, as everyone else did, I could discover no reason why they should do so. Indeed, one decent woman expressed her pity in an audible 'Puir things!' as she passed, but I was enlightened by hearing a pretty girl explain to her companion, 'Why that's the Alexandra limp! How ugly!"

An influential fashion journal of the day said, "The Alexandra Limp is to be discontinued forthwith. The skirt of the season, we are informed, is to cling closely round the feet, in consequence whereof ladies will be obliged to walk as if their feet....were tied together."

Author Jeremy Clay called it the most thunderously daft episode in the entire history of fashion.

One giant leaf for plant-kind

NASA has announced that when humans take their first steps back on the moon after 50 years during the Artemis III mission, astronauts will cultivate and return lunar-grown plants to Earth for the first time. The mission is slated for a September 2026 launch.

Known as Lunar Effects on Agricultural Flora (LEAF), the project will collect plant growth and development data that will help scientists understand the use of plants grown for both human nutrition and life support on the moon and beyond.

The project involves the University of Adelaide, University of Western Australia, and La Trobe University, as well as various United States departments and universities.

"This research will be a pivotal step toward understanding how we might use agriculture in space to support human crews, paving the way for sustained lunar exploration and even missions to Mars," said Project Lead and Space Lab Vice President, Christine Escobar.

Associate Professor of Plant Synthetic Biology at the University of Adelaide and P4S Chief Investigator, Jenny Mortimer, said the mission will tell us how plants respond in an off-Earth environment, and how well we can build a robust, fully contained environment that allows them to thrive.

"The data we capture from the mission, both

from the lunar surface and what we learn when we analyse the samples upon return, will help us to design the lunar and martian crops of the future," Associate Professor Mortimer said. The LEAF experiment includes a plant

growth chamber with an isolated atmosphere, housing red and green varieties of *Brassica rapa* (Wisconsin Fast Plants), *Wolffia* (duckweed), and *Arabidopsis thaliana*.

Experiments undertaken as part of the LEAF program will progress P4S goals to develop novel plant-based foods and biomanufacturing technologies that assist humans to explore deeper into space than ever before, while also advancing on-Earth sustainability and efficiency.

Thousands busted during Operation Nexus

VICTORIA Police ran a statewide operation, dubbed Operation Nexus, over the Easter long weekend.

Designed to prevent unnecessary road deaths due to dangerous road behaviour, the operation ran from Thursday, March 27, through to midnight on Easter Monday, April 1.

Results for the operation were released on Tuesday, April 2.

Statewide, over 8000 traffic offences were detected during Operation Nexus, while over 4000 Victorians were caught speeding. 378 people were caught driving under the influence

of either alcohol or drugs, 728 people drove an unregistered vehicle, and 283 people used their mobile phones while driving.

In the Benalla Police Service Area, which includes the Shire of Murrindindi, there were six drink drivers and one drug driver caught, as well as three disqualified drivers and five unlicensed drivers.

Across the shire, 69 speeding offences were detected, 16 unregistered vehicles were discovered, two impoundments were made, and two cyclist offences managed.

Three fatalities were reported for the Easter long weekend in Victoria.

Cost of letter postage increases by 25 per cent

THE price of posting a domestic letter rose by 30 cents on Wednesday, April 3, an upwards jump of 25 per cent.

Australia Post made the decision to increase the price from \$1.20 to \$1.50 earlier in the year, with no objection from the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC).

Australia Post made a statement justifying the price inflation.

"Australian households only receive two letters on average each week and letter volumes are expected to halve in the next five years. On average, for households that regularly send letters, the increase to \$1.50 will cost them about \$4.50 extra per year," Australia Post said.

Other cost increases include changing the price of large letters up to 125 grams from \$2.40 to \$3, and large letters between 125 and 250 grams from \$3.60 to \$4.50.

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
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

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
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Removal of right to appeal renewables projects

MEMBER for Indi Helen Haines has written to the Victorian Government expressing her dismay with its decision to remove the right for third parties to appeal renewable energy planning decisions through the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT).

From April 1, third parties will no longer be able appeal to VCAT about planning decisions of renewable energy projects.

"I'm listening to my communities, including people from Dederang and Meadow Creek, who are telling me about their genuine concerns about large-scale renewable energy projects proposed close to where they live," Dr Haines said.

In her letter to the Minister for Energy and Resources, Lily D'Ambrosia, and Minister for Planning, Sonya Kilkenny, Dr Haines expressed concern that under the current system, there are not enough safeguards to ensure communities are heard and their issues acted upon by developers.

"The State Government is not listening to these concerns, and project developers are not consistently offering real benefits to regional communities expected to host these projects. The removal of the right to appeal to VCAT will exacerbate this situation," Dr Haines said.

"I am with my communities 100 per cent on this. Fast-tracking projects and silencing communities is terrible governance."

To address the concerns of regional and rural communities about renewable energy infrastructure projects, Dr Haines and Independent Senator for the ACT, David Pocock, worked with the federal Minister for Climate Change and Energy, Chris Bowen, in 2023, to establish an independent review into community engagement and benefit sharing for renewable energy developments.

"The Community Engagement Review final report was clear - the state and federal governments must improve community engagement and consultation," Dr Haines said.

"The decision to remove the right to appeal to VCAT is contrary to the recommendations of the review's final report.

"In my letter to the state ministers, I asked how the Victorian Government will act to implement the recommendations of the review to ensure community engagement and community benefit are delivered for the communities in Indi impacted by renewable energy projects.

"The federal government needs to put money behind the recommendations in the review and work with the states to legislate best practice community engagement for the energy transition.

"I support the transition to renewables but regional people should be given opportunities to benefit from the renewable energy transition, this must be done with us, not to us.

"I will continue to fight for regional and rural communities who should be benefitting from the shift to renewables, not punished for speaking up when the government gets it wrong.'

When contacted about the issue, a Victorian Government spokesperson said, "Victoria's old coal fired generators are closing and the cost of fossil fuels are rising globally. That's why we're streamlining planning approvals for renewable energy projects to keep the lights on and bills down.

"These changes bring renewable energy project approvals in line with other significant economic projects in Victoria, including for affordable housing and hospitals.

Of course Victorians will still be able to have their say and our planners will consider all submissions and unresolved issues will be referred to our advisory committee."

More than one in five renewables projects end up getting stuck in VCAT and in the overwhelming majority of cases the initial decision to support the project is upheld.

Community consultation will continue to form a key part of the renewable project planning process. There are no changes to the public notice process and all members of the community will be able to make submissions. All objections and feedback will be considered as part of the usual assessment of any application.

Duck hunting at GMW storages

GOULBURN-Murray Water (GMW) is reminding duck hunters to be aware of designated hunting areas at the water corporation's lakes, dams, and reservoirs this hunting season.

The Victorian Government has announced the 2024 duck season will open at 8am on Wednesday, April 10 and close 30 minutes after sunset on Wednesday, June 5.

The announcement detailed that the hunting start time will be 8am until 30 minutes after sunset for the entire season and that the daily bag limit will be six ducks per day. Bluewinged shovelers and hardheads cannot be hunted for the 2024 season due to their threatened status.

GMW acting Water Storage Services General Manager, Craig Kellow, asked people to make preparations before going hunting at GMW lakes, dams, and reservoirs.

"It is important hunters familiarise themselves with the duck hunting arrangements for the 2024 season," he said.

"Duck hunting is permitted at several of our lakes, dams, and reservoirs, but there are still areas at these storages where hunting

"It is important hunters are aware of these locations before they visit. We have maps on our website showing people where hunting is not allowed, and we encourage people to get in touch with us if they need something clarified.

"Hunters will also need to get landholder consent to hunt or pass through private property that adjoins GMW land, waterways,

"We ask everyone to be considerate of other members of the public and the environment, and to make safety their priority."

Duck hunting is permitted at the following GMW storages: Cairn Curran Reservoir, Tullaroop Reservoir, Lake Hume, Lake Eppalock, Laanecoorie Reservoir, Greens Lake, Lake Eildon, Lake Buffalo, Waranga Basin, Lake Charm, Kangaroo Lake, Lake Nillahcootie, and Lake Nagambie.

However, wetlands can be closed to hunting by the Minister for Environment and the Minister for Outdoor Recreation under the Wildlife Act 1975 for various reasons, including to protect significant numbers of threatened species or breeding waterbird colonies.

Hunters are reminded to regularly monitor the Game Management Authority (GMA) website for updates to wetland closures and other management actions at gma.vic.gov. au/hunting/duck/wetland-closures-duck-

The Victoria Police, and authorised officers from partner agencies, will patrol wetlands across Victoria to ensure people are abiding by the rules.

People can report illegal hunting and breaches to public safety laws to the GMA, by phoning 136 186 or visiting the GMA website, gma.vic.gov.au

Concern wetlands closures fall short

REGIONAL Victorians Opposed to Duck Shooting Inc (RVOTDS) welcomed the closure of the 32 wetlands to protect threatened species, but slammed the Victorian Government for ignoring evidence put to it, to close a small list of additional waterways for other "critically important" reasons.

The not-for-profit recently submitted to the minister, a list of 26 public duck-shooting sites it requested be closed not just for the presence of threatened species, but for aboriginal culture, proximity to residents, and public health or safety concerns.

Six of these requests have been fully granted and two partially, on the basis of protecting threatened species. However, none were granted on the basis of Indigenous culture, proximity to residents, or health and safety or social and economic reasons.

RVOTDS spokesperson, Kerrie Allen, said, "My question is this. How many tens of thousands of Victoria's public waterways do less than half of one percent of the population who like to shoot birds, need to be able to shoot on? And what is the mental, physical, social and economic cost to everyone else?

"Shooting hampers tourism and more popular (and financially beneficial) pastimes such as boating, fishing, and birdwatching. Incessant gunfire from duck shooters' shotguns is audible within three kilometers, a nuisance (legal term) which has an adverse impact on people's mental health as well as their ability to earn a living. Eco tourism businesses are forced to close. Shift workers cannot sleep. People cannot work from home. Farmers cannot attend their crops, irrigation pumps nor stock, for fear of being shot. Ammunition (sometimes lead) lands on rooves which collect water supplies."

RVOTDS said feedback from regional communities was critical, as no cost-benefit analysis has ever been done by authorities. Similarly, only two risk assessments have ever been done and both of those wetlands were closed to shooting (in 2019) as a result.

"We are appalled the government is not heeding community feedback, nor taking public health and safety more seriously.

"Closing a number of waterways to shooting would go a long way towards ensuring the regulator can actually perform its job and monitor the shooting, that nearby residents and landowners' rights are protected, and that tourism could thrive in regional areas where it's needed most.

"As most native bird shooting occurs on private land, removing these 26 public sites from the shooting list, does not restrict the shooters' recreation. But it does benefit the wider community, significantly.

"The government appears to have very low regard for our native wildlife and regional communities. It can't fund our hospitals, but it can find millions of dollars to support the minority recreation of native bird hunting, and it lets it happen at so many thousands of public waterways they can't possibly

"Why have a requirement in the Game Management Authority Act which states the regulator must consider social/economic impacts of hunting on community, when over the last decade it has continually refused to do so?" she said.

Some wetlands closed to hunting

THE Victorian Government has closed or partially closed 32 wetlands to hunting for the 2024 duck season to prevent losses or disturbance to significant numbers of threatened species and breeding waterbirds.

The number of wetlands closed to hunting in 2024 is partly due to an increase in the presence of threatened species currently present at Victorian wetlands.

The increase in the presence of threatened species is due to favourable environmental conditions, including extensive flooding in late 2022, resulting in increased waterbird habitat and breeding activity. As wetlands dry, birds are concentrating on remaining wetlands.

Wetlands have been closed to duck hunting to protect significant concentrations of threatened species including the blue-billed duck, blue-winged shoveler, freckled duck, curlew sandpiper and brolga.

Other wetlands have also been closed to prevent disturbance to colonies of breeding waterbirds, and three wetlands (Kow Swamp, Reedy Lakes and Richardson River) are routinely closed each year to reinforce their status as wildlife sanctuaries where game hunting is prohibited.

Signage will be installed to alert hunters to the closures and wetlands will be monitored throughout the season. If the reason for Victoria, visit *gma.vic.gov.au*

closure no longer exists, the wetland may be reopened to hunting.

Closing wetlands or regulating hunting methods at wetlands ensures that threatened species are protected and duck hunting remains sustainable.

Other wetlands may be closed or further regulated if significant concentrations of threatened species are found.

Hunters should check the GMA website regularly for updates to wetland closures at gma.vic.gov.au

Hunters are reminded that the hunting start time is 8am every day of the season, from Wednesday, April 10 to Wednesday, June 5 (inclusive). Hunting must stop 30 minutes after sunset. The daily bag limit is six game ducks.

The blue-winged shoveler and hardhead must not be hunted in Victoria this year.

Hunters are responsible for understanding their legal, ethical and safety obligations when hunting, including knowing where it is legal to hunt.

GMA Game Officers, Victoria Police and Authorised Officers from DEECA, DJSIR and Parks Victoria will be patrolling wetlands

Call to check smoke alarms

DID you remember to check your fire alarm when daylight saving ended last weekend? Victorian firefighters are asking all people to test their smoke alarms after concerning new data revealed 14 people died in preventable house fires last year.

Discarded smoking materials, lighters and matches were the most frequent cause of the fires, resulting in five incidents and seven deaths.

Of the victims, five were female (36 per cent) and nine were male (64 per cent). There were 11 single fatality incidents and one incident that resulted in the deaths of three people.

CFA and Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) are urging Victorians to make it a priority to check their smoke alarms.

CFA Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan, says it's essential that families are conducting monthly testing of their smoke alarms to keep their loved ones safe.

"The number of fatalities in the last year is very alarming and devastating to know they could have been prevented," CO Heffernan said.

"In the past 10 years, CFA have responded to more than 13,000 residential fires that have seen more than 330 casualties.

"The best way to keep your family safe is to install interconnected smoke alarms, so that when any alarm activates, all smoke alarms will sound, allowing you to evacuate early.

"We recommend the use of smoke alarms powered by a 10 year lithium battery to ensure their longevity."

FRV Deputy Commissioner for Community Safety, Joshua Fischer, said every fire fatality was a tragedy.

"This heartbreaking data reveals that in the past year, 14 people's lives were tragically cut short in incidents that could have been prevented," Deputy Commissioner Fischer said.

"The best way to protect yourself and your family from fire is by installing smoke alarms in all bedrooms, living areas, hallways and garages and to test that they are working.

"When you sleep you lose your sense of smell, and smoke will put you into a deeper sleep, rendering you unconscious.

"Only a working smoke alarm will wake you up and give you time to escape."

When checking, installing, or replacing your smoke alarms, CFA and FRV recommend: Only working smoke alarms save lives; choose smoke alarms powered by a 10 year lithium battery; smoke alarms should be installed in every bedroom, living area, hallway and garage; smoke alarms should be installed on the ceiling at least 30cm from the wall, or installed on the wall at least 30cm from the ceiling to avoid dead air space; smoke alarms should be interconnected, so that when any alarm activates, all smoke alarms will sound; smoke alarms should be tested monthly by pressing the test button on the alarm and waiting for the test alarm to sound; smoke alarms should be cleaned with a vacuum cleaner or dusted at least once a year to remove particles that will affect smoke alarm performance; replaceable batteries in a smoke alarm need to be changed yearly; smoke alarms, including those attached to mains power, should be replaced every 10 years; to check your smoke alarm, press 'test' and wait for the beeping sound, then each month continue to test, vacuum, and dust your alarm to remove any particles that may affect its performance.

Multi-agency exercise in Trawool

THE Country Fire Authority (CFA) last week led a multi-agency exercise to test and strengthen how emergency services respond to mass casualty incidents similar to the 2023 Eynesbury bus incident.

The exercise was a huge undertaking with 90 first responders from CFA, SES, Ambulance Victoria, Victoria Police and St Johns Ambulance taking part as well as 27 students from La Trobe University who acted as casualties.

Trawool Captain Sean Kerris said the exercise required significant planning and wouldn't have been possible without the hard work of all involved.

"It was a challenge to bring the exercise vision to life but the learnings will be invaluable for our first responders," he said.

"Our emergency service personnel will have a better understanding and ability to navigate very confronting emergencies if they arise after this exercise."

First responders were first briefed on the scenario when the exercise got underway to ensure their response was as realistic as possible.

The scenario involved a hypothetical bus accident in which the bus driver suffered a cardiac arrest while in transit. The bus then veered off the road as a result and into the back of a music festival hitting several campers. There were more than 30 passengers on board the bus at the time who suffered injuries of varying degrees from the bus rollover.

The scenario was influenced by recent tragic events such as the 2023 Eynesbury bus incident and the 2023 Hunter Valley NSW incident.

The objective of the exercise was to test and improve the way emergency services work together when responding to large scale emergencies.

VICSES Seymour Unit Controller Christine Welsh said it's important VICSES volunteers are prepared for any scenario and these exercises play a vital role in upskilling and nurturing important inter-agency teamwork.

"These relationships are particularly important in regional areas and have been an ongoing focus of VICSES' Seymour Unit volunteers over the last 12 months.

"VICSES volunteers pride themselves on being there to support their communities during a challenging emergency response, and these training exercises only strengthen that resolve."

The scenario was chosen because music festivals are commonly held within the region and the scale of such events can present unique challenges for emergency responders.

More than 30 people were on site in a supporting capacity.


