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Interim 2022 flood report released

THE interim report from the state Legislative Council's Environment and Planning Committee into the 2022 flood event in Victoria has been released.

The report included the following findings.

Finding 1: The complexity of processes associated with flood recovery financial supports exacerbated the distress of some flood-impacted individuals, families and businesses. Some communities experienced delays to immediate relief and some were potentially deterred from claiming assistance which would have facilitated recovery.

Finding 2: Despite the availability of a wide range of grants and financial support programs, the support available does not always effectively align with the actual needs of affected individuals and communities.

Finding 3: In Northern Victoria, the broader issues of housing availability, affordability and suitability in the region created additional strain in housing flood-affected people. These issues underscore a systemic challenge extending beyond the immediate emergency response.

Finding 4: In Northern Victoria, the October 2022 flood event has seen the prolonged submersion of land and infrastructure resulting in extensive damage and erosion. The damage of the floods has been widespread including the tragic loss of life, displacement of residents and damage to thousands of homes and businesses.

Finding 5: There is a pressing demand for comprehensive community support, including practical measures, and a critical necessity for increasing support mechanisms addressing emotional and mental impacts for an effective emergency response.

Finding 6: Timely insurance processing is crucial for easing financial strain and expediting post-disaster rebuilding. Delays or inadequate coverage prolong hardships, hindering recovery for individuals and communities.

In forming the interim report, the committee received 429 submissions from Campaspe Shire, and the second highest number of submissions came from Murrindindi, with 36 submissions, ahead of Greater Shepparton,

Gannawarra, Loddon and Greater Bendigo. Despite this, the committee looked at the experiences of residents of Echuca, Rochester, Seymour and Shepparton most closely. A total of 880 submissions were received.

While the interim report commences the committee's discussion of recovery needs in northern Victoria, the final report will make recommendations to the Victorian Government, and will include the causes and contributing factors to the October 2022 flood, including planning, governance, flood mitigation, flood warnings and SES reponses.

The committee noted Lake Eildon's filling target and said, "Releasing water from dams can be a significant mitigation measure. However as noted above, some stakeholders from the flood affected areas in Northern Victoria attributed some blame to the water releases for the magnitude of flooding their towns experienced. Water releases at Lake Eildon and Lake Eppalock is discussed further in the Final Report."

Tim McCurdy, the Shadow Minister for Water, criticised the Allan Government for its slow response, noting that many communities are still waiting for appropriate support 18 months on from the floods.


"Regional communities continue to miss out on the funding required to upgrade local infrastructure, making vital improvements that could help prevent severe infrastructure damage and save lives in a future flood event," Mr McCurdy said.

The Nationals Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad spoke on the issue as part of the regional sitting. Ms Broad is a member of the committee undertaking the inquiry.

She said, "It is time Victoria looks to the example of states like Queensland and builds back better to ensure that we are better prepared for disasters in future."

The poppies were knitted by Buxton resident, Carmel Denham, who saw



Who's driving that truck?

DRIVERLESS trucks will be on two major Melbourne roads during a six month trial of the new technology.

The trucks will be used from Port Melbourne to Dandenong, using the M1 from the West Gate Freeway through to the Monash Freeway, including CityLink, and will only operate from 10pm to 5am to avoid traffic congestion. A second route will be added in the future.

Each of the driverless trucks will have a specialist driver and an engineer on board, as well as an accompanying pilot vehicle. The trucks are designed to operate entirely without the input of a driver. The use of driving software means that traffic conditions up to one kilometre ahead are available.

A similar trial, lasting just three weeks, was undertaken by Transurban in 2022. Transurban is also the organisation behind the current trial.

Victorian Tippers United (VTU) secretary Luke McCrone told the Daily Mail in 2022, "Transport provides more than just financial security for over half a million people in Australia, it also provides a sense of purpose for people. Any roll out of job killing driverless trucks needs to bear that in mind."

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Return to neutral conditions

ACCORDING to the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM), the tropical Pacific Ocean has made a return to El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) neutral conditions.

This means that neither El Nino nor La Nina are active. However, regular rainfall and temperature forecasts are not based on El Nino and La Nina forecasts.

The latest long-range forecast, along with showing a return to neutral conditions, predicts that temperatures are likely to be above median for most of Australia.

Clearer indication of the likely winter 2024 forecast is expected by the bureau later in autumn.



New president for business and tourism group

ON Tuesday, April 16, Maureen Thurston became president of Marysville and Triangle Business and Tourism (MTBT). Two and a half days later, after various meetings, she found time to be interviewed about her new role.

She joked that she feels like she's jumping between the fire and the frypan.

The other office-holders for the organisation are pending. She said prior to being elected that she would like to take the next few weeks to go out and learn from the organisation's different constituents in Marysville, Taggerty, Narbethong, Buxton and everywhere in between to gain an understanding of what the organisation needs to achieve, and then in turn, provide a chance for them to get to know her, and some of the thing that the organisation is striving to achieve. They will then be able to identify the people with the skills and capabilities which will allow them to move forward.

She noted that the member numbers of MTBT have dwindled in recent years, and she is keen to make the organisation more inclusive, as well as holding the meetings in different locations. The first meeting appears likely to occur in Taggerty.

Traditionally, Taggerty wasn't a part of MTBT, but in recent years, they were "welcomed with open arms." The organisation will be looking at a re-naming, as the current name puts Marysville first and then the Triangle, and having Triangle first seems more appropriate.

She is particularly keen to find out what the constituents would like MTBT to achieve, and is looking to develop a 'mission critical' list of to-dos over the next few months. This will include a mission, a strategy and a plan.

Maureen spent much of her career developing strategies for a lot of different organisations. She said, "Without having a sense of a destination, you never actually get there... It's not about me at the end of the day, by any stretch of the imagination, it's about the individuals we can pull together and build together as a collective.'

Maureen's career has been in product design and was trained to look at an environment or the needs of the stakeholders and then design the right product, environment, experiences or services to meet those needs. As a result of her experiences, she tends to look at everything as an object of design, and believes that there are many opportunities ahead for MTBT.

Maureen grew up in New York, and has lived in many different locations in the USA during the course of her career.

She has also started her own companies, and is aware of the challenges that small businesses can face. She was running a consulting practice in California in 2007 and encountered a company in Sydney with some interesting intellectual property (IP). She invited herself to join them and crafted a six month program to review their IP and look at their business and then licence their product for the USA. After about four months, she fell in love with the opportunity in Australia, and the opportunity ended up lasting for five years. She helped to build the business from about six people to about 40, and was eventually purchased by Accenture.

At her going away party, she was invited to join Deloitte by their Chief Strategy Officer of the time. He said, "I don't know what it is you do Maureen, but I'd like you to do that here in Deloitte." She was able to write her own job description about how you embed a culture of creativity and inclusion and innovation in an organisation that is made up of technicians in accounting and auditing.

From there, she took up a role with Aurecon in Melbourne. She was asked to undertake the same task with their organisation, becoming Chief Experience Officer. She was living on a boat in Docklands, with Maureen and her husband previously being in the marina business in California. When COVID-19 hit, they found living on a boat challenging and sold their properties in California, and started looking at local properties. Maureen and her husband also own a recreational retreat resort in British Columbia, Canada, which they are in the process of selling.

She admitted that she didn't know the Murrindindi Shire well, having only travelled through it once, many years previously. She found an advertisement for a small log cabin nestled on top of a hill. She decided that she wanted to live there and bought it sight unseen as she couldn't visit it due to the lockdowns. She was relieved to find that it hadn't been Photoshopped and "literally fell in love." It reminded her of her childhood in upstate New York, growing up in the woods.

She's now keen to become a part of the local community and to see it prosper. She noted that she has an active ABN and is running a private consulting practice.

She will be looking to people to contribute to what might be possible for MTBT, and asked for the community's patience while she asks the question 'why?'

During the next couple of months, her focus will be on getting to know people and the lay of the land, understanding that we live in an ecosystem

with shared needs as well as unique ones.

Previously, MTBT was heavily tourism focused with the organisation providing accommodation bookings, for example, however this has now shifted due to online booking services. She said that while this was the right choice for the time, it's now time for a refresh of the view of what is required.

She's concerned that the Triangle area needs representation more so than just Marysvillecentric. If only tourism is looked at, then it ignores the wider ecosystem. Not all of the businesses are tourism focused, but there are also some which support tourism businesses. She wants to see respect and support for everyone in business.

She is questioning how to bring more tourists to the area, how to get them to stay longer, and in the longer term, how can the Triangle entice people to move to the area? The aim is for the area to grow and prosper. Housing and staffing are key issues.

"If we put our heads together, what can we come up with that allows us to look at the short term concerns with a longer term appreciation of where it is we need to build towards," Maureen said.

Temporary closure for Whanregarwen Road

WHANREGARWEN Road will be temporarily closed for road works on Monday, April 29 and Tuesday, April 30.

The works will start at 7am on the Monday and are scheduled to finish at 5pm on the Tuesday.

The road works are delivered under the **Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements** (DRFA), following damage to the road in the October 2022 floods.

The DRFA is jointly funded by the Australian Government and the Victorian Government.

According to the council website, the road works on Whanregarwen Road are the last scheduled works for the Murrindindi Shire regarding flood damaged roads. All other road works have been completed.

Tractor fire at Narbethong

and Marysville Fire Brigades responded to support Narbethong Fire Brigade at a reported tractor on fire between Buxton and Narbethong.

Buxton Tanker One responded with two compressed air breathing apparatus (CABA) qualified members and was followed up by Buxton Tanker Two with additional crew including a further CABA qualified member. Narbethong and Marysville brigades were enroute shortly after Buxton.

FireCom advised responding appliances that a tractor was on fire in a paddock off the Maroondah Highway. It was reported that the fire had not spread to the paddock and it was green and eaten out.

Buxton Tanker One reported black smoke showing from as far back as Williams Lane and upgraded all appliances to Code One

TUESDAY, April 16, just after 4pm, Buxton Emergency Response. Upon arrival one member donned breathing apparatus while a hose line was deployed with the help of a member who had arrived ahead of the appliances. Narbethong tanker was close behind and crews worked to rapidly deploy the initial attack line.

As always, all three brigades worked as a cohesive team but, unfortunately, the tractor was well alight and was a total loss. This was despite the efforts of the member who was first on scene and wasn't able to quell the fire with the tractor's nine litre extinguisher.

It was beneficial that the farm property has their property number clearly displayed, in both directions, on the highway. Being able to locate driveways along the highway is vital to dealing with any emergency. Big numbers on a contrasting background that can be seen from both directions is best for locating properties.

More funding for mental health initiatives in remote, rural and regional areas

NEW partners have joined the Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal's (FRRR) In a Good Place program (IAGP).

Additional funding is now on offer to support mental health projects in remote, rural and regional communities, thanks to new supporters of FRRR's In a Good Place grants program, with grants of up to \$20,000 now available.

First established in 2018 with the support of CCI Giving, the program's focus has been on supporting community-driven initiatives that reduce social isolation, increase social participation and connectedness, and increase help seeking for people within rural, regional and remote communities who are at risk of, or are experiencing, mental health issues.

Now the IAGP program is expanding, adding a stream focussed on farmers and farming communities, following the recent National Farmer Wellbeing Report, which was presented at a recent mental health and wellbeing forum, hosted by National Farmers Federation (NFF).

The Report revealed that in recent years, 45 per cent of Australian farmers have felt depressed, with 64 per cent experiencing anxiety. The causes of this are many fold, but top among them were weather or natural disasters (47 per cent), financial stress (36 per cent) and inflation and cost pressures (35 per cent). Add to this that 76 per cent of Australian farmers believe that the role they play is undervalued by the Australian public and it's not hard to understand why farmers and farming communities are experiencing declining mental health.

The report called for additional funding and support, which prompted six new partners to join FRRR's IAGP program, alongside CCI Giving, Macdoch Foundation, Jibb Foundation, Morris Family Foundation, Norman Family Foundation and Rebecca Gorman and John Sevior.

These funders have committed to the program for three years, ensuring dedicated funding for farmers and farming communities from 2024 to 2026. In total, \$1,063,000 has been committed over the next three years.

FRRR's CEO, Natalie Egleton, said that the insights shared by farmers and farmer advocates, reaffirm the relevance of the In a Good Place program, and the role it can play in supporting the wellbeing of farming communities.

"These firsthand experiences and insights, highlight the need for investment in projects that promote preventative and responsive mental health approaches in farming and agriculture dependent communities.

'Critically, the additional funding will help to address gaps in services by upskilling people locally and bringing in experts, so that locals in farming communities can better support one another."

The expanded program supports a range of approaches that are preventative or responsive in nature, reduce social isolation by increasing social participation and connectedness, and reduce stigma surrounding mental health by encouraging open discussion and supporting self help seeking. Communities of less 10,000 will receive priority.

Grants of up to \$20,000 are available from a funding pool of at least \$290,000. Grants are available via two streams, these include, community wellbeing, by focussing on mental health and wellbeing within remote, rural and regional communities and farmers and farming communities, by supporting mental health and wellbeing of farmers and the communities they live in.

Applications are via an expression of interest process, with EOIs due April 30 with final applications for those shortlisted due May 15. To learn more visit frrr.org.au/ funding/place/in-a-good-place

Past Olympians from Murrindindi Shire

MURRINDINDI Shire has fielded a number of athletes for the Olympics over the years, and with the build up to the Paris 2024 Olympics in full swing, now is the perfect time to recall their exploits.

The most successful Olympian from the shire, Bill Roycroft from Flowerdale, won two bronze medals and a gold medal across his years of equestrian events. He competed in all the summer Olympics spanning from 1960 through to 1976 in the equestrian category. In 1960 he won gold in the team event, and took home a bronze medal for the 1968 team event and the 1976 team event.

Laurie Morgan, born in Yea, competed with Bill Roycroft in the 1960 summer Olympics, winning gold alongside Roycroft in the team equestrian event, and winning gold for himself in the individual competition.

Winter Olympian, Andrew Paul, was born in Alexandra and competed in the 1984 and 1988 winter Olympics. He placed 50th in the 10km biathlon in 1984, and 47th in the 20km biathlon of the same year, marking his best results for the sport.

Ray Weinberg, born in Alexandra, competed across various athletics events in the 1948 and 1952 summer Olympics.

Born in Yea, Matt Gray competed in the archery category in the 1996, 2000, and 2008 summer Olympics. In 1996 he finished fourth in the team event, and finished 26th in the individual competition. These were his best results across the years.

Casey Wright stands as the most recent athlete, originating from Alexandra, and competing in the 2018 winter Olympics and the 2022 winter Olympics. Her feats in the skiing category include placing 63rd in the sprint event in 2018, and 16th in the 2022 team sprint.

Four bin service starting July 2025

MURRINDINDI Shire Council has announced the introduction of a new four bin kerbside collection service, starting July 2025. This new service aims to enhance waste management practices, aligning with the Victorian Government's policy requirements to improve recycling services, reduce landfill waste, and minimise greenhouse gas emissions.

The four bin service will include the following bins, collected at different frequencies: General waste in the red bin, collected fortnightly. Mixed recycling in the yellow bin, collected fortnightly. Food and garden organics (FOGO) in the green bin, collected weekly. Glass recycling in the purple bin, collected monthly.

To determine the most suitable service model, council engaged with the community in late 2022, receiving valuable feedback from over 200 residents. The overwhelming support for the four bin service helped shape the design of the service.

Now, council is seeking further input from the community on the finer details of the services, as outlined in the draft Kerbside Waste and Recycling Services Policy. This policy includes proposed changes to collection routes, mandatory zones for the four bin service, optional FOGO service zones, and opt-in options for commercial and industrial properties.

Residents are invited to provide feedback on the draft policy by visiting theloop. murrindindi.vic.gov.au/kerbside

People can also attend a pop-up event or register for an online community conversation session. Feedback closes on Sunday, May 19.

Council will provide additional guidance to ensure the community understands these changes and how to adapt to the new collection services when they are introduced next year.

Council's Sustainability, Assets and **Emergency Management Portfolio Councillor** Karine Haslam said, "Council is preparing to transition to a four bin collection service from mid-2025. We aren't alone in this change, with all other Victorian councils required to introduce four-stream household disposal system in line with the state government's policy. While we've decided on the format and frequency of our kerbside collection services, based on feedback gathered from the community in late 2022, we'd like to see what our community thinks about some of the finer details outlined in our Kerbside Waste and Recycling Services Policy. This policy will guide the roll out of the four bin services so it's important we get valuable feedback from our residents to make sure the transition goes as smoothly as possible. We're also planning a comprehensive education campaign to help our community make the most of the new kerbside collection services. We are excited to move our shire closer towards a circular economy, for the benefit of our community and the environment."

Prep enrolments open for 2025

THE Victorian Government has opened enrolments for the 2025 intake of Prep students, encouraging families to plan their applications for their preferred school as their children prepare to start their primary education.

Minister for Education, Ben Carroll, today announced enrolment applications are open until Friday, July 26, giving families time to plan, visit schools and get the information they need to apply.

"Planning for your child's education is exciting – we're making sure families have the most up-to-date information to enrol their children at our fantastic primary schools," Mr Carroll said.

Students have guaranteed access to their designated neighbourhood school.

"We're making sure all Victorians have access to first-rate schools close to home so that students have every chance to thrive at school," Mr Carroll said.

Parents and carers will receive offer letters back by Friday, August 9, while applications received after Friday, July 26, will be considered by schools as they are received.

Families with children in Year Six will receive a Placement Information Pack at the start of term two, which includes an Application for Year Seven Placement Form, which will need to be submitted by Friday,

Families applying for places at their local government school from the start of term two can now also access the recently updated Find my School website, which gives parents and carers the latest information on school zones.

The Find my School website allows families to find their designated neighbourhood government school and other government schools nearby, giving them clarity on what their government school options are for their children.

It now includes six new government schools set to open in 2025, along with small changes to existing government school zones to reflect changes in school provision and adjustments to improve accessibility for all students.

Schools can be found by typing in a residential address or searching by school name or categories such as primary, secondary, or specialist school.

CFA grants

THE Victorian Government is supporting the with the equipment and upgrades they need to keep Victorians safe.

Minister for Emergency Services, Jaclyn Symes, joined local volunteers to officially announce the opening of applications for this year's \$15 million Victorian Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) and thank them for helping during the response to the October 2022 flood event.

"Victoria's emergency service volunteers go above and beyond to protect the community during an emergency. These grants are all about helping ensure they have the latest equipment to do what they do best, protect communities and save lives.

"These grants have been going for more than 20 years, and we're proud to continue the legacy that they leave and I encourage all eligible groups to apply," Ms Symes said.

VESEP is an annual grant program that supports Victorian emergency services volunteer groups to purchase essential equipment or make facility improvements so that they can continue their vital work.

Local grant applications include: hardworking volunteer emergency services CFA Highlands-Caveat for vehicles and appliances, worth \$128,333; CFA Molesworth for operational equipment, worth \$2256; CFA Murrindindi and Woodbourne for vehicles and appliances, worth \$128,333; and CFA Terip Terip for operational equipment, worth \$2256.

> Under the program, volunteer groups can purchase equipment including generators, pumps, utility vehicles, light and medium tankers, and rescue trucks. They can also fund minor refurbishments or amenity upgrades to their station, club or unit.

> Groups can apply for a grant up to a maximum of \$150,000, with the government providing \$2 for every \$1 of funding contributed by the local volunteer group.

Since 2015, the Victorian Government has invested more than \$123 million in VESEP grants to volunteer groups across the state, enhancing volunteer operational capability and service delivery to communities. This year's VESEP applications are now open and close Friday June 14.

Disastrous fire ant consequences without urgent action

THE report of the Senate inquiry into fire ants, released on Friday, April 19, called for an urgent review of funding and other changes to the response program if Australia is to win the battle to keep the country fire ant free.

The inquiry found that there would be 'disastrous consequences' for Australia's natural environment and economy if eradication was not successful.

If the highly invasive fire ants are not eradicated from the massive infestation area in south east Queensland, all Australians will suffer their impacts.

For the last 23 years the government-funded eradication program run by the Queensland government has had multiple setbacks due to limited funding, slow decision-making and unnecessary secrecy.

The committee confirmed that eradication remains possible, but warned that unless major changes are made to the response program, the ants will continue to spread.


The committee made clear that 'current resources and funding are unlikely to meet that eradication goal' and recommended an urgent review of funding and the program's structure.

Reece Pianta, Advocacy Manager at the Invasive Species Council, said, "The senate committee report is a call for our government to boost fire ant eradication efforts. While the report makes it clear that the eradication program has successfully slowed the spread of fire ants, that approach is not a solution. The evidence to the committee was damning. There's now no excuse, the government must conduct an urgent review of fire ant eradication funding.

"The Prime Minister and Minister Murray Watt and state and territory governments must act on these urgent recommendations to get fire ant eradication back on track. Governments that let fire ants spread will be judged harshly by future Australians. This report comes on the heels of new economic modelling that fire ant impacts in Australia will exceed \$2 billion per year."

The report titled *Red imported fire ants in* Australia: Don't let this come back to bite us contained 10 recommendations and received unanimous support from the cross-party Senate committee.

The recommendations call for an alternative independent agency or commission for fire ant eradication program delivery, a rapid review of current funding to ensure it is sufficient and uninterrupted to get the job done, greater eradication program transparency and a public awareness campaign, an increased investment in research on emerging fire ant eradication techniques, more resources for public selftreatment of fire ants in the infestation zone, and increased compliance to control fire ant movements in freight.



Topic of the month: Andrew Tate

Andrew Tate is the latest in a string of influencers peddling ideas about male supremacy. He is a self-described misogynist and is currently being detained on charges related to alleged sexual assault and human trafficking. Despite these giant red flags, he has a massive following of men and boys looking to emulate his supposedly flashy 'alpha male' lifestyle in which he exploits women, whom he refers to as 'intrinsically lazy'. But don't worry – Tate also describes himself a 'good guy'. Yep, Tate says he genuinely cares about and wants to 'protect' women – presumably, from men like... Tate? If you think this is scary and a backwards step for gender equality, you're not alone.

Reader question of the month

I am concerned to witness the increasing influence of Andrew Tate among the student population in our Shire and the wider community. As a parent, I am worried about my daughter's experience in the classroom and about her general safety. Why are boys finding Tate's views appealing and what can we do to challenge their thinking without alienating them? –Concerned

Answe

In aligning with Tate, these boys are seeking reassurance and belonging above all else. They want to feel important, like we all do. As some boys (and men) see minorities gaining ground (even though some are very much losing ground) in their valid fight for equality, these boys/men may feel threatened or 'othered'. Some of them feel they are being framed as 'bad guys' when they want to be seen as 'good guys' by default. Followers of Tate believe the rhetoric that they are under attack by those advocating for equality, and that if others gain more rights, they will somehow lose theirs, which simply isn't true.

This isn't to say Tate doesn't raise real issues relevant to men, including increased male suicide rates, loneliness and relationship struggles. The problem is that he frames the cause of these issues as being directly related to feminism. In other words, he thinks women are to blame for many struggles faced by men today. This is also untrue. It is a society rooted in patriarchal and gendered stereotypes that dictates men (and women) behave in certain ways, that is the problem. Men should be able to express vulnerability and feel safe in their peer groups when they do. There are many studies already out there on the Andrew Tate problem but unfortunately there is no precise roadmap on how to really counter his destructive views. In other words, there is no quick fix. Coming to the table with facts seems to no longer be an effective tool in educating young people, and alarmingly, many older people too. Because, if you're not saying the things that Tate fans want to believe, they will simply opt into an alternative reality that makes them feel more validated, comfortable and powerful.

But, if in response to Tate, we only call boys out (i.e., shame them for their views in front of their peers), we will only push them further to the fringes, leaving them feeling so isolated, so on the edge of things – that it just reinforces a belief that they are entitled to retaliate to this exclusion with aggression or even violence. So maybe, just maybe, if we call these boys in, invite them (and ourselves) to get curious about the source of these ideas – perhaps with support, they can begin to imagine a kind of belonging that doesn't push anyone down or out.

We all have a responsibility to raise one another up, especially young people. It may be frustrating to do this work gently, but gentleness and kindness is exactly what we want to see young men fostering. There is a strength in that. Let's ask and really hear the answers about what boys find appealing about Tate's ideas. From this place, we can start to unpick what it is boys want to feel, not just what they say in front of other boys. More often than not, what we'll uncover is fear, loneliness and a desire to feel connected. Surely, we can work with that.

The Tate problem is not the role of just one person to fix, nor is it up to women alone to solve. All of us, especially men, need to rally and commit to joining together to create safer communities and safer conversational spaces for boys. And beyond this, we must agitate for our leaders to do the same. Yes, it is uncomfortable and yes, it is worth doing.

Wind farm: The winds of change for Murrindindi?

Wind farm: Fera

ANDREW Lawson was unfortunately unavailable for an interview to coincide with the interview with Darryl Otzen from the Strathbogies Responsible Renewables Community Group, however he supplied some information and we hope to have an interview with him in next week's edition.

According to the information Andrew supplied, "This year will see a lot of investigation and assessment take place."

Reports, information and advice are being developed regarding the area's biodiversity and ecology, including the identification of no-go areas, cultural heritage, desktop geotechnical and bushfires. These will inform the siting of turbines and infrastructure to avoid areas of highest sensitivity or constraint.

The second group of reports include an expansion upon the biodiversity and ecology, cultural heritage, bushfire and desktop geotechnical studies, as well as noise and vibration, preliminary landscape and visual impact assessment, traffic, water and hydrology, desktop aviation, land use planning and consultation planning. These will be prepared in relation to the micro-sited layout plan.

Following the earlier desktop investigations Biosis conducted an Initial Field Survey to review the preliminary turbine and access track site inspections (late November, Early December 2023). The group inspected the turbine locations and potential access roads to identify any potential ecology issues.

Andrew advised that five to six locations may require further investigation (potential relocation or deletion) but the vast majority were located in farmland and appeared not to have any ecology issues.

The information said, "To ensure that all key ecology elements are included in the detail surveys we met with the Landcare and Environmental group representatives from across the project in February in Yea. These meetings have been constructive and progressed to engaged discussions and good sharing of information. We have set up a portal for local ecology information to be uploaded. Following the meeting Biosis will finalise the Survey Protocol's for project Birds and Bats studies."

The preliminary Cultural Heritage desktop study is also programmed to start in the second quarter of 2024.

Fera have also put together a draft charter and have the outline of a Community Consultation Plan coming along.

The information stated, "Having conducted quarterly public sessions at Ruffy and Upton Hill through 2023 we have looked to continue in 2024 with local events where we can participate and have time to explain and discuss the project. Last weekend, we set up a stand at the Farming Expo in Seymour over the three days (Friday, April 12 to Sunday, April 14) and will seek similar events through the year. This approach was a success with strong support for the project across the three days."

Andrew appears to be referring here to the Alternative Farming Expo in Seymour.

The text also states, "In March, Robert Gardiner presented to the Yea 2030 group (following in on from my presentation to the group last August). We have had meetings in Euroa and with BEAM and remain keen to meet with all interested groups in the area. Equally we have continued our meetings

with local residents across the turbine and transmission areas."

Broadford Environmental Action Movement (BEAM) Mitchell Environment Group states on its website, "Our members are engaged in supporting sustainable outcomes in government projects, advocating for our local region, supporting green initiatives and generally causing a fuss about protecting the environment."

It is unclear which group Fera met with in Euroa as no advertisements could be found.

The information also said, "Everyone had a good day at Cherry Tree [Wind Farm on November 25, 2023] with 40-45 attendees. Virtually to a person they all came up and said they enjoyed the visit. I wish all community sessions were as positive and well received across the community.

"We set up a stand at the Seymour [Alternative] Farm Expo from Friday, April 12 to Sunday, April 14. The expo was well attended, and we had good opportunity to talk with people over the three days. A strong success. In total we talked with 318 people. We set up a survey and sought people's views on climate change, renewable energy and their views on regional renewable projects including whether or not they supported the local Cherry Tree and proposed Seymour project. Below are some of the main survey results."

The first question was, a scale of one to 10, (one not at all to 10 extremely) how much do you think climate change threatens your personal health, the weather and impacts drought / floods? Twenty-six people gave it a 10, 14 a nine, and 22 an eight.

Over 50 per cent of people felt 'somewhat familiar' with renewable energy sources and almost 30 per cent said they were 'very familiar'.

Sixty-four per cent of respondents had implemented renewable energy systems in their homes. Of those, around 44 per cent did so for cost savings and 38 per cent to help combat climate change or for the environmental impact.

Sixty-six per cent of respondents said that were 'very supportive' of wind or solar regional projects, and 17 per cent 'somewhat supportive.'

Eighty per cent of the people at the Seymour Alternative Farming Expo said that they supported the "local Cherry Tree [Wind Farm] and proposed Fera wind project."

Information was also provided on transmission alignment. It stated, "A key focus is continuing the investigation of the transmission alignments to connect the project. We are focussed on two alignments with the aim of narrowing down to a single alignment over the coming months. The target is to have the transmission alignment by the end of July.

"There continues to be a lot of activity across all areas on the project and 2024 will see the detailed investigations across all the reports required for planning. Robert Gardiner (lives in Yea) and I have been working away on route option for the transmission lines.

"We developed an agreement for the transmission alignment landholders. They are significantly more generous than the state government announced flat \$200,000 or \$8000 per annum payments. The approach is to provide an offer [which] is attractive and provides a strong incentive for hosting transmission lines."

Wind farm: opposition

THE Strathbogies Responsible Renewables Community Group (SRRCG) are strongly opposed to Fera's proposed 'Seymour Wind Farm' in the Murrindindi and Strathbogie areas. SRRCG held an information session at the Country Club Hotel in Yea on Saturday, April 20, which 209 people attended.

Speaking prior to the event, Darryl Otzen, Secretary of the Strathbogies Responsible Renewables Community Group (SRRCG), stated "Fera have not made any public statements basically since May last year."

He said that Fera committed to having quarterly community consultation sessions. One was held in February 2023, another in May 2023, and one in August 2023 "with a primary school lecture on climate change... Probably two third of the people got up and walked out in disgust," Darryl said. In November 2023, people were invited to view the Cherry Tree wind turbines up close, but Darryl commented that they're half the size of the ones planned for the local 'Seymour' project. The February 2024 didn't happen, and there's been nothing since.

Darryl said that at the February 2023 meeting, "[Fera] said we have already signed up eight landowners. We have enough land already to make this project viable. We are building a power station. That to me wasn't a consultation, that was a confrontation. It was a very heated meeting, that first meeting."

He said that on the Fera website, there's been an update to their investigation area for the transmission line route, where they appear to be looking down Whanregarwen Road.

Darryl said, "What people are actually doing is going around showing the good people of Yea district a map with multiple powerlines all over it that covers both east and west of Yea." This includes Molesworth, Native Dog Road, Murrindindi Road and Ghin Ghin Road from Highlands down to Ghin Ghin, and south to Glenburn and Murrindindi.

He said that they have been showing this map to individual landholders in the area, and is uncertain of the colour coding and whether these areas are under serious consideration.

Darryl was asked for his thoughts around the fact that wind is a renewable energy with potential negative impacts in terms of land usage and visual amenity. He responded, "The objection to the communities is against the sheer scale of the development. It's an industrial development of 80 to 100 very large wind turbines."

Darryl said that while it's not pristine land, having been extensively cleared in the past. Much effort has been put into revegetation, and there is unique granite in the area which is extensively studied by universities.

Fera is required to conduct an environmental survey and have engaged Biosis. Their report identified a number of endangered or critically endangered species in the area immediately impacted by the proposal.

He said that consideration needs to be given to what it will do to the environment, not just the visual impact, although the latter may have an effect on tourism-based businesses. He believes that any works done will run

into the Hughes Creek and this will have a huge impact on endangered wildlife, such as the Macquarie perch. Darryl believes that hundreds of kilometres of roads will need to built for the project, on private properties, as the towers will need to be a minimum of five kilometres apart.

The committee has no issue with wind farms, or renewable energy in any form. He said wind turbines are "amazing machines." He said that the state and federal government preference is for wind farms to be offshore. There, they will become a natural reef, and no harm will come to whales or other sea creatures.

Darryl said that the scale and siting of the current project is the issue, and he pointed out that there's nowhere to really connect it. The renewable energy zones are all centred around terminal stations, and there is no terminal station near this project apart from South Morang and Dederang, on the Victoria-NSW transmission line which run through Murrindindi Shire near Alexandra. A terminal station would therefore need to be constructed, bringing disruption, and three to five years of planning.

Darryl also discussed the removal of the right of third parties to appeal to VCAT over renewable energy planning decisions. He said that the Planning Minister "has introduced the Victorian Development Facilitation Program, which is basically a fast-track program for infrastructure projects, it doesn't need to be renewable projects, it could be housing, it could be other infrastructure. Eligible projects can apply directly to the minister, and the minister will assess and directly sign off on that project. It doesn't go through the planning department and there is no process for appeal to VCAT. The only appeal you could make at that point would be to the Supreme Court."

Eligibility includes a requirement that the project be financially viable and start development within 12 months. For renewable energy projects, the financially viable requirement has been removed.

He also noted that in February, the Community Engagement Review from the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commission (AEIC) was released. The AIEC spoke to communities about their engagement with renewable energy developers. The report asked, 'How do renewable energy developers engage with communities' and the answer was, 'They don't'. Developer ratings were considered. VicGrid has taken up the opportunity to audit land in the state to determine whether particular areas are suitable for renewable developments.

A survey was recently conducted via Engage Victoria to develop the Victorian Transmission Plan, where the community could place markers on a map and make comments. VicGrid are developing a transmission plan based on this, with a draft due mid-year.

Daryl suggested that Fera may build multiple 132kw lines instead of a single 330kw line, coming from multiple substations within their project, connecting to a single point on the main grid. Instead of having a big lattice tower, they would have mono-poles, possibly 35 metres tall, and due to the cable weight, they would be close together. "As a result, the visual impact is not much different to having those big towers," Darryl said, adding that a clear-felled easement would be needed beneath each powerline, and "they want to run multiple lines."

He believes that the impact of the alternative solution is "probably worse" than the single powerline.

Submissions sought on Lake Eildon Houseboat regulations

THE Water (Lake Eildon Recreation Area) (Houseboats) Regulations 2013 manage houseboating on Lake Eildon. The houseboat regulations are put in place by the Minister for Water. The regulations allow for the use of houseboats on Lake Eildon and lay out what houseboat owners must do.

The regulations describe requirements for licencing, managing black water from on board toilets, and managing houseboat greywater discharge into the lake.

The houseboat regulations will sunset on June 11.

The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) has been working in partnership with Goulburn Murray Water (GMW) to review and remake the current houseboat regulations. This has involved working with the houseboat community and interested stakeholders in a co-design approach.

They are now seeking public feedback on the draft *Water* (*Lake Eildon Recreation Area*) (*Houseboats*) *Regulations 2024*. Lake Eildon is home to over 700 houseboats.

The focus of the consultation is on the regulations for managing greywater and the way these regulations are implemented.





How to report potholes online

THE condition of local roads is a big deal, given it impacts the safety of shire residents. VicRoads is giving citizens the opportunity to report potholes on their website.

Head to *vicroads.vic.gov.au/traffic-and-road-use/report-a-road-issue* to report road issues that are not an immediate threat, such as small potholes, signs that have fallen over, faded linemarking, etcetera. To report urgent road hazards that present an immediate danger, call 13 11 70.

On the website, select a category for feedback from the drop-down list. For potholes, select the category Road and Traffic Hazards. Then select a subject from the second drop-down list (road conditions/potholes, bridges and structures, road signs, etcetera).

Once you've made your selection, click next, and a new page will open up. On this page there is space to write a comment on the subject, such as the condition of the road, as well as space for providing the pothole's location address, and details to contact you if further information is required.

Fill out all the required fields by typing the information. After that, just click the button at the bottom of the page that says submit feedback or enquiry to lodge your report.

Keeping your pets on track

HAVE you ever become annoyed at all of the lost pet posts on Facebook community pages, and have you then been mortified to discover that you had to post one yourself? Fortunately, there's a way around it. Pet GPS and bluetooth trackers are available for your favourite furry escape artist.

A wide range of trackers are on the market, offering extended ranges and real-time tracking.

There are two main types. Bluetooth trackers connect to your phone, but only have a range of 30 to 40 metres. This means that if your pet runs away, the tracker may not be helpful at finding them. On the upside, they're low-cost, the batteries are long lasting, and are generally small and lightweight.

GPS trackers use both GPS and mobile connectivity, so satellites make it much easier to find your missing pet. The range is unlimited, and as an added bonus, you can also see how active your pooch has been during the day, to ensure that they're getting enough exercise. The GPS trackers are connected to your phone or other device via an app. With a GPS tracker, you can also set up a safe zone (such as your backyard) and receive a notification if your pet steps outside of this zone. Be aware that some GPS trackers charge a monthly fee while others are free. They also only work where there is mobile coverage.

GPS trackers will also require much more frequent battery charging than Bluetooth trackers. They are priced at around \$70 to \$250.

If you do decide to get a tracker for your pet, make sure that it is a suitable weight for the dog. You don't want your chihuahua trotting around with a brick attached to its collar.

Sad end to motorbike rider search

A LARGE search was conducted around Jamieson and Mount Terrible over the weekend for a missing dirt bike rider. More than 70 volunteers were engaged in searching for the man, who had been missing since Friday, April 19.

It is believed he was involved in a motorbike crash and the 58 year old died at the scene.


The exact circumstances surrounding the crash are yet to be determined and police will prepare a report for the coroner.

Narbethong CFA recognised for 2019-2020 fires contribution

DURING Buxton Fire Brigade's 80th anniversary open day on Sunday, April 21, the efforts of four members of the Narbethong brigade, during the 2019-2020 fire season, were recognised with presentations of National Emergency Medals.

Ceremonies were conducted around Victoria last year to present medals to emergency services workers who had contributed to the suppression of the devastating fires that impacted the eastern states over the 2019-2020 fire season. CFA volunteers from Alexandra Group deployed to Queensland and New South Wales as well as the northwest of Victoria.

Last year, when the CFA presented medals in District 12, the Narbethong brigade opted for their medals to be collected by former CFA Board Member and VFBV District 12 State Councillor Paul Denham.

Narbethong Captain Robert Bean asked that the medals be presented during Sunday's activities. The recepients were James Bisset, Rob Bean and Steve Shultz. A medal for the late Eamon Flaherty was presented to Rob and will be passed to Eamon's family.

The National Emergency Medal is an award given for sustained service during a nationally significant emergency, or to other persons who rendered significant service in response to such emergencies.

The medal was established by Queen Elizabeth II in October 2011. The medal is awarded for events specifically set out by regulation or may be awarded upon the recommendation of the National Emergency Medal committee for significant service.

The National Emergency Medal is a circular medal, ensigned with the Australian Coat of Arms. The obverse depicts a central image of a golden wattle branch. Surrounding the image at the edge is a further depiction of the flowering wattle. The centre of the reverse has the same border as the obverse, but in the centre it details by inscription the award and the recipient.

The National Emergency Medal ribbon colours match the colours of the Humanitarian Overseas Service Medal ribbon. The colours of the ribbon are gold and eucalyptus green. Gold symbolises the

Australian sun, optimism and hope. Eucalyptus green complements the symbolism of the medal design. The seven gold coloured bands represent Australia's six states, with the seventh representing the territories.

Those who performed service during the 2019-20 Australian bushfire season and met certain criteria are recognised by the "Bushfires 19-20" clasp.

Planned burns on fire this autumn

HUNDREDS of Victorians are taking the opportunity to undertake private burn-offs as fire restrictions continue to ease across the state.

Country Fire Authority (CFA) and partner agencies will be making the most of cooler autumn conditions to conduct fuel reduction burns to lower bushfire risk for communities, while farmers and private landholders will capitalise on favourable temperatures to ignite stubble burns on their properties.

Over the weekend, wind conditions will prevent smoke from dispersing, with smoke expected to linger over the city and parts of regional Victoria into next week.

CFA Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan, said although CFA and Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMV) work closely with the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and Bureau of Meteorology to keep smoke impact as low as practically possible, smoke in our regional and rural areas can come from a number of sources.

"Along with the important planned burns that are conducted in our forests, parks and reserves led by FFMV and the many kilometres of road, rail and council reserve burns that are led by CFA, this time of year also sees a large amount of smoke coming from the necessary burn-offs that our farmers and rural property holders undertake," Jason said.

"These are part of traditional farming practices where burning off of crop stubble is often needed to kill off weeds and return nutrients and carbon back into the soil."

As the weather cools, smoke will also come from the many thousands of wood heaters households rely on for their autumn and winter heat source.

"This localised smoke or smoke haze can often be misinterpreted as coming from planned burns from a long way away, but this is not always the case," Jason said.

"As the weather conditions continue to allow for lower intensity burning, we will look to conduct the most suitable planned burns to ensure that our dependant native bush and grasslands are benefitting to avoid much more devastating bushfires.

"Our CFA brigades have already treated over 3,600ha of land this year, helping make at-risk communities safer, with more to come over coming weeks."

Landowners are urged to continue registering their burn-

offs at *firepermits.vic.gov.au* so that if someone reports smoke to Triple Zero, the incident will be cross-checked on the register.

For the latest information about when and where planned burns are occurring near you, residents are encouraged to sign up to Planned Burns Victoria at *plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov.au* and download the app.

If you do see smoke and want to know if it is a planned burn or a fire, visits the VicEmergency App or visit *emergency.vic.gov*.

Detailed information about smoke forecasts, current air quality in your area and health advice can be found on EPA's website.

Keep your burn off safe and legal: Check fire restrictions in your area and always register your burn at firepermits.vic. gov.au or by calling 1800 668 511; check and monitor weather conditions, particularly wind; to avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand; leave a three-metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn; have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading; never leave a burn-off unattended, stay for its entire duration; if your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately.

Think smart when obtaining firewood

THE autumn season of firewood collection is currently open until June 30. The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) are strongly encouraging people who rely on firewood as their sole source of heating and cooking to plan for their firewood needs early to ensure they are using firewood in the most efficient way possible.

Firewood collectors can only collect trees or parts of trees that are already on the ground. There is no cutting down, breaking off and damaging a tree or shrub regardless of whether it is dead or not.

Maps of local firewood collection areas can be found at ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood/firewood-collection-in-your-region

Some of these areas have been subject to recent planned burning, Darren Skelton, Program Manager Media and Communications from the Hume Region assured firewood collecters, "Once the planned burns are declared safe, people are free to enter the firewood collection areas. Only a small proportion of areas available for firewood collection have been subject to planned burning."

It is necessary to follow guidelines of firewood collection as you are not permitted to collect firewood within 20 metres of any rivers, creeks, lakes and dams. Video surveillance cameras are operating in state forests to monitor any illegal activity and the conservation regulator works with DEECA and Parks Victoria to conduct patrols in forest areas

If people are found to break the law with illegal firewood collecting, serious penalties apply including on the spot fines. Fines can include up to \$8261 or up to one years imprisonment.

If you don't have the means to get out in the designated firewood collection to collect your wood for the season and it must be purchased, it is important to do your research to ensure you aren't obtaining illegally sourced firewood.

There are many ways to purchase firewood locally and many services are advertised on local social media site. It pays to research of who you're dealing with if you go down this path.

Firewood merchants should source from a wholesale supplier, commercial wood lot or from private land with permission of the landowner.

To avoid supporting illegal firewood operations, questions you should be asking before purchasing include, where does your wood come from. They should be able to easily provide this information to customers.

Ask the question of why the wood is cheap. If it sounds too good to be true it probably is. Finally, ask if you can get a receipt for your purchase. If the merchant can't provide a legitimate tax receipt with a business name and ABN listed, it's another red flag for you to avoid the sale.

Shutting down these dodgy dealings is reducing the significant impact on the environment. DEECA urges people that if they see any offence take place to contact 136 186.

The book is currently available on Amazon and in print.


