Council statement on the proposed Seymour Wind Farm

MURRINDINDI Shire Council acknowledges the proposal by Fera Australia to construct a large wind farm called the Seymour Wind Farm in the area between Avenel, Longwood, Ponkeen Creek and Ruffy in Victoria. The proposed project is said to feature 80 to 100 wind turbines that are up to 245 metres tall and require approximately 30km of new 330kV transmission lines, proposed to be overhead, mainly across private and crown land within Murrindindi Shire.

While the Murrindindi Shire community generally recognises the potential benefits of renewable energy projects, council acknowledges the significant concerns raised by residents regarding the Seymour Wind Farm's potential social, economic, and environmental impacts in our 'culturally significant, environmentally sensitive, ecologically diverse and pristine' region.

Council believes it is important to carefully balance the need for renewable energy generation with the protection of local amenity, environment, agriculture, tourism, and social outcomes. We have reached out to Fera Australia to seek a more comprehensive and meaningful community engagement process to ensure community concerns are heard, considered and addressed effectively. Council has suggested that citizen panels could be effective in expressing and tackling community concerns, including consideration by Fera Australia for the undergrounding of transmission infrastructure to protect our significant and celebrated landscapes.

As the Seymour Wind Farm project is still in its preliminary stages, council encourages Fera Australia to step up community engagement efforts and conduct thorough environmental and social impact assessments. If a permit application is made to the Victorian Minister for Planning, who will ultimately assess and determine the project's outcome, council will provide a submission as a referral authority that will clearly reflect the community's views.

Murrindindi Shire Council remains committed to supporting sustainable development that benefits the local community while minimising negative impacts. We will continue to monitor the progress of the Seymour Wind Farm project and advocate for outcomes that protect the unique character and values of our shire.

Call for candidates for Murrindindi Shire Council election

CANDIDATES ready to stand in the upcoming Murrindindi Shire Council postal election are urged to use the Victorian Electoral Commission's (VEC's) newly refreshed Candidate Helper to get their applications ready for submission when nominations open on Monday, September 9.

Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel reminded candidates that there are several important steps they must complete before nominating.

"If you want to represent your local community, make sure to confirm your eligibility and complete the mandatory online candidate training through Local Government Victoria before lodging your nomination. This rule applies to all candidates, including those who are currently or have previously been a councillor," Mr Bluemmel said.

The VEC's online Candidate Helper at *vec.vic.gov.au/council*candidate allows candidates to pre fill their nomination forms

Jason Robertson appears on The Voice

JASON Robertson appeared on *The Voice* television show on the evening of Tuesday, August 20, and while unfortunately none of the judges' chairs turned, he put in an excellent performance, singing Daryl Braithwaite's *Horses*.

Jason's auditions took place in Brisbane, having recently moved up from Melbourne to the Gold Coast where he works as a portable toilet truck driver. As he joked with the judges, "When I'm not pooper scooping, I'm singing."

Jason was born at Alexandra Hospital and stayed in Alexandra until he was about 25 years old, before "moving to the Big Smoke seeking fame and glory. It's only happened about 35 years later."

Jason has always been a singer. When going through Alexandra Secondary College, he was in all of the school plays from year eight through to year 12. He then became involved with local bands, then bands in Melbourne.

Jason's only singing training came from locals Keith

Prospective candidates are also encouraged to attend the candidate information sessions being held in each electorate before the opening of nominations.

Prospective candidates must make an appointment to submit their nomination forms and pay the \$250 fee in person during business hours. They must provide evidence that they have completed the online candidate training, as this is required by law and will be shown on each candidate's nomination form.

Candidates must make an appointment to submit their nomination form in person at the election office by calling the Candidate Helpline on 8620 1316 between Tuesday, August 20 and Monday, September 9.

From Monday, September 9, candidates can call 131 832 and they will be directed through to the relevant election office.

Nominations close at noon on Tuesday, September 17. Late nominations will not be accepted.

Jason explained that the process of getting onto the show was quite extensive, with a variety of interviews and auditions conducted across about six months prior to filming. The show conducts auditions all over Australia, with thousands of people auditioning, so this also takes time.

He said of the filming process, "It was quite amazing. I thoroughly enjoyed it. I'm hopefully going to be doing some more TV work from now on. It was great. It was interesting to see how the entertainment industry works at that level. It was a really well-oiled machine when you get to the actual auditions. It's a huge factory and there's film sets and there's people running around everywhere. It's cool. It's extraordinary how they put it all together. Very interesting."

Asked whether he was nervous in the lead-up, Jason said, "Good question. Yes and no... But not really. I was sort of prepared for it. As I said to the guys, the main producer when we first touched base on the matter, was that this is pretty much 40 years in the making, so I thought to myself, no matter what happens, I'm going to give it my best shot. If it's good enough, it's good enough, and if it's not, I've had a crack and you can't ask for much more than that."

The song he performed, *Horses*, is a song "you've got to sing all the time. It's the last song of the night. I've been performing in bands forever, so it's a song I knew pretty well... It's a song for all, as one of the producers said. It's a song everyone will know."

His advice for younger singers is, "Don't give up. Everybody's got their own unique way of singing. It's not for me to say whether you're a good singer or a bad singer, but if you believe in it, and believe in yourself, anything's possible. Work hard and don't give up."

Tourism grants and big news for Eildon

REGIONAL Victoria will have even more amazing tourist attractions for people to visit with exciting local projects getting off the ground thanks to the Victorian Government.

Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events, Steve Dimopoulos, last Friday visited the Art Gallery of Ballarat to announce 29 projects across regional Victoria that will receive funding through the Enabling Tourism Fund 2024.

"Regional Victoria has so many unique attractions and this funding will ensure we have new and exciting tourism projects in the works for years to come," Mr Dimopoulos said.

"This is great news not just for our tourism operators, but for jobs and local economies in each of these regional areas."

The grants of up to \$500,000 will support regional tourism projects to reach investmentready status by funding feasibility studies and designing future infrastructure.

In Murrindindi Shire, Taungurung Land and Waters Council (TLAWC) was successful with regard to concept testing for a Taungurung Cultural Centre and Reddrops Management Group Pty Ltd have received funding for a Hotel Eildon Development Plan.

Further background information received from the Victorian Government about the Taungurung Land and Waters Council grant says: "The project will develop a business case for The Taungurung Land and Waters Council (TLAWC) for the development of new stateof-the-art multi-purpose engagement centre to provide an inclusive gathering place for Taungurung community and wider public to celebrate First Peoples Culture. "Taungurung community, seeks to develop a Taungurung Cultural Centre in Seymour, Taungurung Country. Centrally located in the Goulburn Region, this new state-of-the-art multi-purpose engagement centre. Visitors would benefit from cultural immersion and educational activities as part of a vibrant

year-round events calendar, proudly led by the Taungurung People, for the advocacy and advancement of the Taungurung Nation."

In relation to the Reddrop Management Group grant for the Hotel Eildon Development Plan, the provided background said, "The project will support the develop of schematic plans and relevant town planning requirements for Hotel Eildon. Over the last decade, the Eildon region has experienced a steady increase in tourism.

"With a desire to increase tourism, the region has identified a need for contemporary commercial accommodation and quality food and beverage establishments. Hotel Eildon will deliver a 4.5-star 100 key hotel with supporting high-quality amenity including food and beverage options, function and conference facilities, a wellness centre, gymnasium and an infinity pool overlooking the Eildon Pondage.'

The Enabling Tourism Fund is part of a \$170 million investment to create more local jobs, support our important tourism businesses and attract more people to the incredible experiences on offer across regional Victoria.

Job pathways for local government workers

THE Victorian Government is supporting more Victorians to get the training and skills they need to work in local government.

Minister for Local Government Melissa Horne announced a \$6.3 million pilot program to address workforce shortages in councils across Victoria, creating pathways to secure jobs with good pay and conditions.

The two year pilot will be delivered by a consortium of higher education providers led by RMIT University, filling skills shortages in areas like engineering, town planning and allied health.

Local government Earn and Learn program participants will commence training in 2025, creating more job pathways for local government workers wishing to retrain and new opportunities for jobseekers.

By connecting education providers with councils, the free program will help Victorians get the skills they need to work in local government and deliver important services and infrastructure across the state.

RMIT, Federation University, Swinburne University of Technology and Victoria University will collaborate with the local government sector to identify skills shortages and co-design training to directly address workforce need.

All 79 local councils in Victoria will be invited to participate in the program, addressing skills shortages across the state so that councils can deliver key services and projects.

It's understood that Murrindindi Shire Council has expressed their interest in being involved with the program, pending further investigation.

Ponderosa marks first Eildon Rowing Club event

THE Eildon Rowing Club will be hosting its first event on Saturday, August 31, from 10am to 11am. The Eildon Grand Ponderosa Cup is a 4.5 kilometre handicapped race for single sculls, inspired by the Winter Sculling Series in Melbourne.

The Lake Eildon Rowing Club will be starting a perpetual event with a training day on the beautiful and calm Eildon Pondage. Single scullers from all over Victoria have been invited to train and be coached at Eildon Pondage and there will be a timed lap to see how fast they can cover a distance of 4.5 kilometres.

There are approximately 30 scullers registed to attend and one of them is Peter Antonie, OAM recipient and Olympic gold medallist at the Barcelona Olympics of 1992. Peter Antonie, who will be first off the ranks and has a superb feel of the water, will be good to watch.

There will be bacon and egg rolls for sale and the club are hoping to get a coffee van at the Lions Rotunda in Riverside Drive, Eildon. Scullers will take to the water at 9am and the timed lap will be at 10am.

The Eildon Rowing Club's Mario Laing spoke about the details of the event.

"This is the first time [running the event], and we've had a bit of support from the rowing community, and we've talked about it and word of mouth has gone around. We've already got 15 entries, with a few of them coming to stay on the Saturday, going out to Pixies on the Billabong, and then the next day they're planning to go for another row on the lake."

The event will be run in handicap format, which means "in this situation, we're going to put the fastest scullers up front to make it safer. So there could be some up-and-coming sculler who wants to challenge the top sculler and try and get past them on their way up.

"Obviously if you manage to win the race, you still get something for that. But it goes on fastest time, sot the fastest time will get their name engraved on the Grand Ponderosa Cup," Mario said.

Due to the permit for holding the race on the Pondage not being approved, this year's event will be held on Lake Eildon proper. Eildon Rowing Club is hoping they will be able to obtain the permit next year, and hold their event on the Pondage then.

"We have a men's race and a women's race, so two races. We're starting small in it because we want to do it well, and we want to build trust in the community and then next year hopefully we'll have it on the Pondage, which is the ultimate aim. And then we'll have more races. Rowing has lots of different boats that you can row in, like singles, doubles, quads, fours, and eights."

Special guests at the event include Olympic rower, Peter Antonie, who "won the gold medal in the 1992 Olympics in a double hull with Stephen Hawkins," and Member for Eildon, Cindy McLeish, who will present the cup.

Mario added that he hopes the event will showcase the rowing potential of the Eildon area.

"Basically we want to let people know that we have this beautiful resource facility, and that people can go out for a row in winter time, or anytime. There's good water, and people just want to come up here and enjoy the surrounds as well, it's such a lovely area. Not many rowing courses are set on national parks. It's really to put Eildon on the map as a rowing venue.

"It'd be great to see locals out to support the event and see what it's like and imagine it happening on the Pondage at some stage. The more people that get behind it, the more the chances are that we can realise the potential the Pondage has to host events like this in the future."

The Lake Eildon Rowing Club was established in February 2023 to give an opportunity to the people of Murrindindi to come and try rowing on Lake Eildon. Their first season saw them competing at

the Masters State Championships and in other country regattas in single sculls, double sculls, and quad sculls.

A scull is a rowing boat that holds only one competitor with one oar in each hand. It is the hardest of all the boats to row and balance, requiring great skill and feel for the water.

In terms of previous results, one of Eildon Rowing Club's scullers, Kathy Lloyd, won bronze in the Masters State Championships in May this year. Jeremy Laing, another sculler, won the B division single sculls race at the Footscray regatta. The club went and competed in the Rutherglen regatta that has been going for more than 100 years uninterrupted.


The Eildon Rowing Club also invites people to get involved with the sport.

"If they want to have a go at rowing, they should get in touch with me, and we run learn to row programs on a Saturday or Sunday morning, so we can teach people how to row and take them on a journey.

"[Eildon Rowing Club] have 25 members. Many of them are social members who come from Melbourne, and they're members of other clubs and they want to be members of our club as well.

"We have about eight members who are consistently going out and rowing and getting out in quads and doubles and stuff like that," Mario said.

Her real schooling was in ballet, not academia. She had first performed on stage at the Palais Theatre in St Kilda at the tender age of two, followed by regular performances by the age of four. A visit to the Glaciarium Ice Skating Rink with a friend put paid to any thought of a career in ballet as she was

Ice skating also led her to meet dashing RAN Sub Lieutenant, Linley Selover, when he asked her to have a drink with him after her teaching duties finished. They were married in 1945 when he returned from service in World War II. There were three daughters from their marriage, Louise in 1950, Ruth 1953 and Cornelia 1959.

A highlight of her life was taking up skiing in her 50s. Even though she was an ice skater she had never had the chance to try snow sports. Going to the 1976 Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, attending various events and skiing in Austria, as well as Australia, was a dream come true for her.

Wendy was a very competent sportsperson all her life and even at 100 she takes her daily walks. 'If you don't use it you lose it' has always been a maxim for her. She taught skating until her 60s and took up croquet later in life, playing pennant for two different clubs. Sewing also took up a large part of Wendy's time, from making tutus for young ballerinas to voluntary work at Darlingford helping residents make rag dolls.

She now has five grandchildren (Lucy, Jane, Tom, Kitty and Jack) and nine great grandchildren ranging in age from 13 to two (Harry, Ellie, Eva, Zara, Alva, Georgia, Tilda, Wolfgang and Simukai). They are all a great joy to her and in her more active days she loved nothing more than taking a grandchild to lunch or on holidays.

Her ability with embracing technology was amazing. From the early days of mobile phones she enthusiastically took up messaging, though her grandies puzzled for a while over messages from 'Iran' (Gran). Until moving into Kellock Lodge she had paid all her own bills online from her iPad.

When Wendy heard about the proposed independent living units to be built adjacent to Kellock Lodge she decided that a move to Alexandra would suit her fine, and she was the first to sign on the dotted line.

There was always a connection to this area as her father-in-law, Roland Selover, worked for the Country Roads Board and Selover's


LOCAL community member Leo Chambers is celebrating a truly remarkable milestone, his first century of life on this planet.

On Wednesday, August 28, this amazing achievement will be accomplished. Our dad s a talented and generous man who mostly has self-taught life skills that have enabled him to share a life of plenty with his family. A life we, his family, are all very grateful for. He has shared this willingly, with his own expertise, in his own way. The following is a brief history of his life so far.

His next and most important exploits were the battle he waged to get council to agree with him to make land available for the Eildon Bowling Club. He went on to organise unused sheds owned by Utah and successfully repurposed these to house the then brand new Eildon Bowling Club club house.

Eildon Bowling Club very soon proved to be a force in bowls and Leo was inspirational as a coach, green director and champion in those early years. As a life member, Leo has

served the club well featuring many club wins. His name as champion singles player has numerous listings on the club's honour boards.

Leo Chambers celebrates his life with four children and their partners, David and Suzanne, Wendy, Robin and Kerry, Hal and Carole and lots of grandchildren including, Michelle (dec) Paul, Caitlyn, Lauren, Dan, Brad and Kris. ALEX Scott and Staff will be holding their first sale in Yea on Friday, September 13. David Setches, their Livestock Manager, spoke about what lead Alex Scott and Staff to taking their cattle to the Yea Saleyards.

"Due to the closure of the Victorian Livestock Exchange (VLE) in Pakenham, we have a clientele base in the Yarra Valley, and northeast and west of Melbourne. Those points there have indicated to us that, from the logistical side, it's a long way to get them down to Koonwarra freight wise, and we've been trying to get into Yea with Elders and Nutrien.

"The time has come now that we've decided to pull the trigger and have a go ourselves, and have our first sale on Friday, September 13," David said.

"We have invited the other private agents who want to come onboard. On our sales basis, the more the merrier of private agents who want to come, because it will strengthen the sale.'

David elaborated on the challenges faced in selling at Yea.

"Elders and Nutrien said they were happy to sell our cattle off-site, and they couldn't really

accommodate them numbers wise if we were to join in their sale, but they were happy to sell them on consignment, which doesn't really make sense.

"Why would we give half the commission away to another agent when we can sell them ourselves?" David said.

"With Pakenham's closure. the Yea Saleyards are one which could potentially increase by 20, 30, 40,000 cattle per year. The facility really at 3000 cattle is about maximum capacity, so I can't see any other option but Elders and Nutrien will have to have a bi-monthly sale.

"If you have 30,000 cattle per year, and 12 sales per year, they can't fit them all in. Three thousand, when they sort of capped the saleyards, they wouldn't let us in on their sales, so we just picked a date opposite to them and we thought we'll go then."

David concluded by sharing the companies excitement to be back selling cattle in Yea.

"Alex Scott and Staff, in 2012, or eight years ago back when I started, we did initially sell in Yea. We were selling in Yea back in the day.

"We're really excited to get back into the Yea district area and be an alternative option for anyone who may want to sell cattle up there and certainly look after our existing clientele that the company has on that side of the ranges," David said.

Riddellvue spring sale offering at standout despite dry times

RIDDELLVUE Angus has faced poor seasons numbers show, so to me it is a very special and falling cattle markets since moving to Markwood last year, but it hasn't hindered the continued improvement of its herd.

Principal Ian Bates said despite having to feed cattle through the winter, the spring sale bulls are looking as good as ever at Riddellvue.

'Old timers in this area are saying the season is one of the worst they've seen, so it has been a battle, but the bulls are going along really well," he said.

"This will be our fourth sale at Markwood, and since the move the climate in the beef industry has been very tough.

"And while opening new doors is harder in tough conditions, the locals have been really receptive to us in the area and past clients have followed us along, so it has been a good balance."

Ian will catalogue 36 angus bulls aged 18 months for the spring sale, to be held onproperty and via AuctionsPlus on Thursday, September 12.

The offering will include sons of the \$64,000 Reiland Ricochet R952, a bull which has a TransTasman Angus Cattle Evaluation estimated breeding value in the top five per cent of the breed for calving ease and top 10 per cent for docility and intramuscular fat.

When I saw the Ricochet bull I wasn't necessarily looking to buy a new bull but we went up to the Reiland sale at Gundagai and we liked everything about the bull. It had a great set of numbers, and he has proved the ground that he is stronger than his 600-day

bull," Ian said.

"We will end up retaining 50 to 60 females, and he has been used heavily in the Reiland herd and other prominent studs. We have now sold him on to Merlewood Angus for stud duties

It will be the first time Riddellvue will offer Reiland Ricochet progeny under the hammer, and Ian is excited for clients old and new to see the bulls.

"They have great temperament; confirmation and their feet are fantastic. I am really looking forward to them coming through the sale." he said.

As usual, Riddellvue will also offer 20 registered females at the spring sale, and there is a chance of Ricochet progeny to be included in that lineup as well.

One of the other prominent sire lines in this year's spring sale will be by Blackjack Genesis Q04, a son of Pathfinder Genesis with growth figures in the top 10 per cent.

"I've never seen such good feet as the Genesis bulls in this sale, and there is a bigger group of them," Ian said.

"It is just a great lineup of bulls across the catalogue, consistent right through and presenting really well."

With early bull sales in the north of the country looking promising, Ian is hopeful there will be a change of sentiment, and weather, moving into the spring.

"We've had 50ml this month, which has made a little bit of movement, and the days are getting longer so we are heading in the right direction, with a lot of crops looking good in the district," he said.

"The spring sales in the north are going well and Victoria is normally the cheapest place to buy bulls, which isn't a reflection of the bulls, it is just that there are a lot of good bulls in Victoria that people overlook.

Last year's spring sale at Riddellvue sold 21 bulls to a top of \$12,500 and average of \$6675, while in the autumn of this year a Genesis son made the top price of \$10,000 and the 21 bulls cleared averaged \$6450.

Gates will be open for a bull inspection day from 10am to 2pm on Wednesday, August 28 at Riddellvue, 153 Markwood-Tarrawingee Road, Markwood, Victoria.

The sale, on a new day this year, will follow at 1pm on Thursday, September 12, with presale inspections available from 10am.

Farmers and the Fire **Services Levy**

MEMBER for Eildon Cindy McLeish believes that the Victorian Government is favouring corporate-owned wind and solar farms, granting international proponents cheaper fire service levy payments, while Victorian famers are being forced to pay the full amount.

Ms McLeish said that the government has given enormous concessions to the proponents of renewable projects, seeing them pay a collective total of \$600,000. Ms McLeish believes that this is an injustice to local farmers, many of whom are CFA volunteers, and who are being charged \$75.7 million in fire service levies this financial year, compared to \$47.5 million last year.

"The Allan Labor Government are clearly looking after the major corporate and internationally owned companies while hanging Victorian farmer's out to dry.

"Farmers are the backbone of the Murrindindi and Mansfield Shires and play a major role in our community and economy yet are being financially slugged."

Wind and solar farm owners will see a 92 per cent reduction to their fire service levies, being classified as public figure rates, the same rates as schools and hospitals. Meanwhile, the farmers that live around those wind turbines, are paying 72 per cent more after this year's state budget.

"Many of our farmers also man the CFA trucks and are first responders to grass fires, bush fires and car accidents on our country highways. Through this levy, they are effectively paying for the services they provide to our community.

"The Allan Labor Government continuously ignore calls from local CFA brigades for urgently needed funding, facility and equipment upgrades, leaving brigades to do so much of their own fund raising. It is a disgrace and again highlights that this government will forget about hard working volunteering Victorians.

"We know out of control wind turbine fires are a real threat. They cannot be easily extinguished and are typically left to burn out. This is a major concern as we lead into what will be a very dry summer. Our farmers and CFA Brigades need more support, more funding and upgraded equipment," Ms McLeish said.

Premier comments on state forests and transmission lines

THE Premier of Victoria, Jacinta Allan, made a series of comments in recent days about governmental decisions and proposals.

Speaking at the Bush Summit, she said, "There are eight million hectares of public land in Victoria – close to a third of our state. And there are pockets we must protect, areas we must conserve. But, to me, the most important thing we can do for our bush is make sure it's enjoyed. That's why today I want to be very clear: as Premier, and a proud country Victorian: I will never put a padlock on our public forests. It's not who I am, and it's not what I believe. I want to make sure our kids and grandkids can get out in the bush and fall in love the same way I did."

She also made a series of statements at the Rural Press Club of Victoria luncheon in Bendigo on Friday, August 23.

About hospitals, she said about not supporting the amalgamation recommendation in the Health Services Plan, "We know that local people at local hospitals do have a very clear sense of what their communities need. And just as those organisations listen to their communities, government should as well. And as I said, I know how much local health services matter and I'm extremely proud of the work we've done over a sustained period of time to make it even stronger."

As the premier was speaking at the event, protesters were outside the building, particularly concerned about transmission lines on farm lands.

When asked about this, the premier responded, "Rural and regional communities, primary producers and farmers are the most exposed to the challenges of climate change, they are the most exposed to the negative consequences of a change in climate... Part of the answer to that is delivering more renewable energy and delivering more renewable energy means that we provide better energy security."

The vice president of the Victorian Farmers Federation said, "Farmers are feeling increasingly frustrated. Death by 1000 cuts, whether you look at wild dog, pest transmission, renewables and welfare legislation and... Farmers feel extremely unheard. Are you open to committing to a holistic food and fibre strategy across the whole of Victoria that actually prioritises agriculture and rural regional?"

The premier responded, "We are working on an economic growth strategy at the moment, looking at those sectors of the economy that have served us well."

which are carried out each year during almond pollination.

Agriculture Victoria Acting Chief Plant Health Officer Dr Stephen Dibley said Agriculture Victoria is working with the affected beekeeper and others close by to minimise spread and guide management actions.

"This early detection of Varroa mite enables Victorian beekeepers to prepare and manage their hives effectively," Dr Dibley said.

Varroa mite (Varroa destructor) is a parasite of adult honey bees and honey bee brood. It weakens and kills honey bee colonies and can also transmit honey bee viruses.

It was first detected in Australia near Newcastle in NSW in 2022 and is being managed through the National Varroa Mite Response Plan which is focussed on preparing industry to live with and effectively manage Varroa mite.

Varroa mite does not affect native bees.

In line with the National Varroa Mite Response Plan, Agriculture Victoria is working closely with beekeepers and orchardists to minimise the impacts on beehives and the almond pollination.

A team of 12 varroa development officers have been recruited in Victoria under the National Varroa Mite Response Plan and they are available to provide guidance directly to beekeepers on how to manage Varroa mite and appropriately utilise the chemical control options available.

Spring firewood collection opens this weekend

FIREWOOD collection areas will soon be open on Sunday, September 1. People who rely on firewood as their sole source of heating and cooking are encouraged to plan and to make sure they are using firewood in the most efficient way possible.

The spring season firewood collection is September 1 to November 30, firewood cannot be collected outside these times. There are serious penalties for failing to follow firewood collection rules. Forest Fire Management works with the Conservation Regulator to regularly patrol state forests and make sure people are adhering to firewood collection rules.

Maps of collection areas will be published at ffm.vic.gov.au from September 1.

There are also Varroa Management Training Workshops occurring across Victoria this month, which cover monitoring and threshold surveillance actions, integrated pest management techniques, recordkeeping, and chemical treatments, including organic options.

"With varroa mite established in New South Wales and measures in place to slow the spread nationally, the detection this week was not unexpected despite the requirements in place to enter the state," Dr Dibley said.


"I encourage all beekeepers to be prepared to manage varroa in their hives by attending one of the free workshops, engaging with Varroa Development Officers and accessing all the resources available."

Beekeepers in Victoria are urged to check their hives and to report suspected cases of varroa mite to the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline on 1800 084 881.

All Victorian beekeepers are encouraged to record all hive movements and inspections, and the results of mite testing in *BeeMAX*.

ADH gym-based programs

DID you know that Alexandra District Health (ADH) provides many programs to promote your physical health, meeting more than just the medical and post-surgical needs of the community?

ADH's team of physiotherapists and allied health assistants are there to help you recover after a life-changing event such as a bad fall, surgery or a cardiac event, and also deliver programs designed to build strength and stability to help prevent some of these events from occurring in the first place.

Some of these are tried and tested programs that have been offered on-site at ADH for a long time, others are new programs borne from the latest evidence from around the world

Cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation programs help people regain their strength, endurance and confidence after a cardiac event or if they have a long-term lung condition. Both of these programs are run across eight weeks and the cardiac program has been successfully running at ADH for over 15 years.

Lungs in Action also assists people living with a chronic lung condition, or those who may have difficulty breathing or doing dayto-day activities comfortably. This program is delivered by a Lung Foundation trained worker and is recommended after the completion of the Pulmonary Rehabilitation, although this is not a prerequisite.

The GLA:D Program was developed in Denmark and has been running at ADH since 2018. This six week program is for people living with hip and/or knee osteoarthritis, and aims to reduce the pain they experience, the amount of pain relief required and the progression of symptoms that may lead to surgery.

Stall the Fall is also a six week program that has been running at ADH for approximately 12 years. People participating in this program may have experienced a fall, may have been identified as high-risk of a fall by their GP or just feel they have lost some strength and confidence in this area and are seeking some support.

The Gentle Exercise Program is another long-term program and is more suitable for those who have limited weight bearing ability, experience chronic pain or prefer chair-based exercises. This gentle approach to strength building is tailored to each individual, with some participants improving and progressing into the Stall the Fall program.

Over the previous week alone, 25 locals have participated in these programs. Some programs require a referral from the ADH physiotherapist or from your GP and some require no referral. ADH's friendly Intake Officer can provide information about this and any associated cost, and can be contacted by calling Alexandra District Health on 5772 0900.



However, with no penalties for missing this target, the current trajectory would only reduce food waste by 28 per cent in the US by 2030. Food waste costs the US \$428 billion annually, while \$18 billion is needed by the food industry to scale up solutions.

Fortunately, initiatives like food banks are rapidly expanding, helping to divert food from landfills and providing those in need with healthy, nutritious options. A notable local effort is the Alexandra Hub and Food Share, which distributes excess food to those in need.

In the hospitality sector, leaders like Grant Street Grocer have partnered with Landcare and Sustainability Victoria to demonstrate how small businesses can show courage and commitment in

understand that they are part of a larger issue and that every effort counts.

One practical tip discussed was to shop for fresh fruits and vegetables more frequently, rather than making one big trip weekly or fortnightly, to reduce waste.

Looking ahead, the question remains; how can we help each other normalise saving food from landfills and make it more convenient? Ideas such as improved storage solutions, cooking classes, or a bulk buy food shop in town could be explored.

In Alexandra and across Murrindindi, we are already known for our excellent in home food waste management, including leftovers, animal feed, and composting. With the introduction of FOGO (Food and Organics) collection next year, this could be the perfect opportunity to broaden the conversation about understanding and reducing our food waste.


