

Peter Weeks inducted onto honour roll

UGFM Radio attended the Community Broadcasting Association of Australia (CBAA) awards night on the Gold Coast, following the annual conference. Peter was inducted into the Community Broadcasting Honour Roll at the event.

Peter said that the award was "a complete surprise."

The committee, mainly Naomi Booker, nominated Peter for the inaugural Honour Roll. The CBAA represents the 400 community radio stations across Australia and was established 50 years ago.

Peter explained, "This year they decided to have an Honour Roll to honour people

ON Saturday, October 19, president Peter that have done over 20 years of work in Weeks and treasurer Judy Blakeney from community broadcasting." through various programs and they talked about the new honour roll.

Peter was unaware that he had been nominated, although the rest of the UGFM committee knew. Fortunately, they managed to keep it quiet.

Peter said, "I came up here to talk with the Australian Communications and Media Authority, and Community Broadcasting Foundation that help fund the sector, and some of the technical people were up here. We were having talks about different aspects of broadcasting and we were sitting down at the dinner on Saturday night and listening to all the awards that everyone received from community broadcasters across Australia

"I thought, that's great. People will get some recognition there. I'm sitting there and I thought I was pretty safe, really, because we hadn't nominated anyone. So next thing you know, they mentioned my name and I thought, oh no. I used some other words too. Then I had to think of what the speech was going to be because I was totally unprepared for that. Four hundred people were in the room.'

Fortunately, he was able to think on his feet. He said, "I talked a bit about some of my involvement with the Community Broadcasting Association. I've helped out with the association over the years and of course a little bit about our role in establishing emergency broadcasting in Victoria and assisting other stations across Australia to get involved as well.

Peter has been involved with UGFM since the start, along with a few other people in the station. It commenced broadcasting 30 years ago, with an anniversary dinner coming up this weekend, with past and present presenters getting together to celebrate.

"We actually got our licence in October 1994," Peter said. "And we began broadcasting in November 1994. We had an inaugural meeting in November 1993 to establish UGFM. It took us nearly 12 months to get our initial licence and then we began broadcasting three days a week initially. That was the only licence we could get and then they brought in a new regime called a temporary community broadcast licence, so we could get a 12 month licence and we ran on that for a few years until we gained our full licence in 1997. It's been you know it's a team effort. I'm just the mug in charge of it."

Peter described his induction to the Honour Roll as "a lovely surprise. A lot of the peers in the industry said that I've been noticed from afar, so that's nice to know."

Peter said that he would "Like to thank everyone that's been involved in the station over the years. It's a team effort and everyone puts in 24/7. We broadcast seven days a week, keeping it on the air and maintaining the station. It's not just behind the scenes, but on air as well. It's a team effort by a lot of people. There are around 40 presenters and people that are involved in the operation of the station, financially and technically and

New penalties for drink drivers

THE new penalties to crack down on drink drivers came into effect on Friday, October 18, trying to ensure that drivers think twice before getting behind the wheel while under the influence

Every drink driving offender will now face a mandatory three-year period where they must have a blood alcohol content of zero.

This mandatory three-year period applies to all drink driving offenders from the time they successfully complete their court-mandated Alcohol Interlock Program.

The Alcohol Interlock Program requires drink driving offenders to install a breathtesting device in their vehicle which records any alcohol detected. Offenders must have an interlock device in their car for between six months or up to four years depending on the severity of their offence.

Victoria has some of the strongest penalties for drink driving in the country. First-time drink drivers who record a blood alcohol reading between .05 and .069 lose their licences for a minimum of three months and must have alcohol interlocks fitted to their vehicles for a minimum of six months.

Drink driving remains one of the most significant contributors to Victoria's road toll. Since 2023 around one in four drivers who have lost their lives on Victorian roads have had a blood alcohol concentration of .05 or above.

Murrindindi crime **statistics**

THE Crime statistics Agency (CSA) recently released crime statistics data for Victoria. Overall there were 552,228 criminal offences recorded in Victoria in the 12 months to June, amounting to an increase of 46,014 offences or 9.1 per cent.

The crime rate when population growth is considered is 7925 offences per 100,000 people. This is a 6.7 per cent increase from the year before.

Recorded offences for the Murrindindi Shire came to 758 cases, which is lower than last year's offences, which came in at 789 cases.

When it comes to criminal damage in the Murrindindi Shire, criminal damage has decreased from 66 cases in the 12 months to June 2023 to 60 cases to June 2024.

Firearms offences has reduced from 29 cases in 2023 data to 23 in the 2024 data.

Drug possession has almost halved from 42 offences in the 2023 data to 22 offences in the 2024 data. When it comes to drug trafficking in the shire there were seven cases of methylamphetamine and one case of the drug ecstasy. There were six cases of drug cultivation for cannabis recorded for the 2024 data.

Council's VicRoads services are changing

LAST week VicRoads Registration and Licensing advised Murrindindi Shire Council that the Alexandra Customer Service Centre will only be authorised to be a photo point and work diary supplier.

The Alexandra Service Centre will no longer be able to accept licence plates and will no longer be offering learners permit testing.

To complete other VicRoads services in person, the nearest VicRoads locations are in Seymour or Ringwood.

VicRoads have been contacted for comment.

Some positive data was the significant drop in breach in family violence order in 2024. In 2023 there was 105 cases and this year was 30.

Motor vehicle theft went from 23 cases in 2023 data to 31 cases in the 2024 data. Lock up your cars too, as theft from a motor vehicle rose from 36 in the previous year to 47 this year.

The data for sexual offences is concerning with a jump from 17 in the 2023 data to 29 in the recent data.

Voting closes soon for council election

THE Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is reminding voters in Murrindindi Shire Council that they have until 6pm on Friday, October 25 to vote in the Murrindindi Shire Council election.

"You need to post your completed ballot pack before 6pm on Friday, October 25, noting local clearance times may vary," Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel said.

"You can also drop your ballot pack off at the election office located at Murrindindi Shire Council Yea Office, 15 The Semi Circle, Yea before 6pm on Friday, October 25."

Any voter who still hasn't received their ballot pack should go to vec.vic.gov.au to complete an online replacement ballot pack form.

Extended hours for voters to hand deliver their completed ballot pack apply from 9am to 8pm on Thursday, October 24 and 9am to 6pm on Friday, October 25. Voting is compulsory for voters who were on the state or council roll for this election at 4pm on Wednesday, August 7.

Enrolled voters who don't vote may be fined.

History grants out now

APPLICATIONS are now open for the Victorian Government's Local History Grants Program.

The Local History Grants Program has been running for 23 years, recognising the importance of collecting and preserving the state's history.

Projects supported through previous grants include newspaper and photograph digitisation works, memorial websites, anniversary projects, digital histories, oral histories, archiving projects, community signage, exhibitions and walking tours.

Community groups such as historical societies, museums and schools are all encouraged to apply for grants to assist with funding for their historical projects, with up to \$15,000 available per grant.

More than 40 organisations received a grant through last year's funding round, locally the Taungurung Land and Waters Council received \$13,545 to catalogue its Aboriginal heritage artefacts.

Applications can be made online at *prov. vic.gov.au* by Monday, December 9.

Educating students about Respectful Relationships

VICTORIAN students will now have access to Respectful Relationships resources in schools to learn to recognise and respond to issues such as toxic masculinity, hate speech, and coercive control online.

The new resources will give students the skills to counter the influence of Andrew Tate-types, helping them safely navigate issues like consent, sextortion, pornography, and gender based bullying.

More non government schools are also being invited to join over 1950 Victorian government, Catholic and independent schools, including over 370 non government schools already signed up to the initiative.

These schools can join via a new Expression of Interest process that has now been launched, with support including startup funding, implementation guidance and professional learning.

Developed by education experts Professor Helen Cahill and Associate Professor Debbie Ollis in consultation with teachers, students and parents, the new contemporary materials will help young people stay safe online and in real life.

Dinner and medals for 150 years of **Alexandra Fire Brigade**

FOLLOWING the parade to celebrate 150 years of the Alexandra Fire Brigade on Saturday, October 12, Alexandra Captain Chris Lynch explained how privileged and honoured he felt to lead the brigade during the historic event.

"I don't lead alone, I have an amazing team that joins me and without them, I am only one person," Chris said.

"A lot of work went into the event and it was a great day. This isn't just about Alexandra's 150th, this is the community being able to have a minute to look and see the people that support them in their time of need."

Following the parade, a dinner was held with more than 100 people in attendance. Long-service medals were presented.

The brigade was formed in February 1874, with Captain Radford Huddle as officer in charge and around 20 members on board.

A few months after the brigade was formed, the main street suffered significant fires with several buildings lost. The town had been hit with fires in the past, but reports indicate the formation of the fire brigade paid dividends, as the fire was contained. However, with every fire comes problems and Captain Huddle and three members resigned immediately after the incident.

Training back in the day saw the firefighters don their new red uniforms before marching to the local racecourse, and while one member climbed a tree, others then had to source a continuous supply of water using buckets to get it to the top of the tree.

Over the years the brigade became involved in the demonstrations, which was later known as the State Championships, where they went on to being quite successful, winning many trophies.

The construction of a fire bell on a small tower in the main street was a major move forward to alert brigade members to fire calls. This historic bell still exists in front of the joint emergency services facility in Shamrock Street, Alexandra.

The brigade acquired its first motor vehicle during the late 1930s, a Dodge, 4 cylinder, open cap, fitted with a bell. It was a hose carriage

and firefighters transport vehicle only, which proved better than having to run a reel. This truck was replaced by an Austin Series 1 fitted with a Thompson front mounted pump around 1950.

Alexandra Captain Chris Lynch said the brigade has been involved in numerous major fires over the decades.

"The 2019/20 Black Summer fires stand out, our brigade spent time at the fires at Swift Creek," Chris said.

"Not long after I was voted in as Captain a few years ago, we responded to a fire at Maintongoon which ended up being one of the biggest fires for the season."

Chris joined CFA around 12 years ago and said it's a great way to meet people, have community spirit and assist people in need.

"Many people have come and gone over the years but it's important to talk to the people who have been there before, learn from them and respect everybody's opinion," Chris said.

"One of the most amazing things about Alexandra Fire Brigade is the members. We are such a diverse brigade, and we have the ability to do anything we put our minds to.

"We also couldn't do what we do without our Fire Equipment Maintenance (FEM) team and the auxiliary members who raise much needed funds for our brigade."

More than 30 service awards were presented during the brigade dinner including five members who received the prestigious 55 years of service.

Dignitaries at the event included Cindy McLeish MP, Mayor Damien Gallagher, CFA Board Member Ross Coyle, Acting Assistant Chief Fire Officer Stephen Keating and Commander Paul Brislin.

Alexandra landfill expanded

MURRINDINDI Shire Council is pleased to announce it has successfully completed construction of a new landfill cell at the Alexandra landfill site, increasing capacity for waste disposal and extending the life of the landfill for another 30 years.

The new cell, or waste storage unit, allows council to handle more waste locally, providing cost-effective waste management services within Murrindindi Shire, rather than transporting waste to other areas. This expansion was necessary due to population growth and new industry development.

This important project aligns with council's Waste and Resource Recovery Strategy, and alongside the introduction of a fourbin kerbside collection service next year, and community's efforts in reducing landfill waste, means council is well placed to achieve the goals of a circular economy. The new cell was constructed according to strict environmental and construction standards to prevent contamination and ensure the new landfill is safe and efficient.

A public tender process in July 2023 resulted in Goldsmith Civil and Environmental Pty Ltd being awarded the contract for construction, and Bajwa Enviro Consult Pty Ltd being awarded the contract for testing and audit services.

Council would like to thank the project partners for their dedication and hard work in delivering this critical infrastructure project.

Once council has obtained Environment Protection Agency approval to use the new landfill cell, they will begin the process of capping the old landfill area. Capping is a multi-stage project that includes a barrier layer to prevent water from entering the landfill, a gas collection system and a topsoil and vegetation layer to protect the cap, which will reduce soil erosion and improve the appearance.

Murrindindi Shire Council's CEO Livia Bonazzi said "To assist our community and visitors to appropriately dispose of household and business refuse and recyclable materials, council operates five Resource Recovery Centres, and the Alexandra Landfill.

"Landfills are essential for managing residual waste that cannot be recycled, ensuring it is safely contained and does not harm the environment. Households and businesses can play a crucial role in reducing landfill use by adopting more sustainable practices," Ms Bonazzi said.

"By making changes to the way we create and manage waste at home and at work, we can collectively reduce our environmental footprint and extend the life of our landfills.

"We are proud of the collaborative effort that has brought this project to fruition and look forward to continuing our work to enhance waste management in our shire. In line with Victorian State Government requirements, from July 2025 Murrindindi Shire will transition to a four-stream waste and recycling system, making it easier for households to divert food and garden organics, glass recycling and mixed recycling from landfill."

Improved safety for apprentices and trainees

THE Victorian Government has launched a \$9 million package to improve safety and mental health support for apprentices and trainees after accepting all recommendations of the Apprenticeship Taskforce report, in full or in principle.

The reforms will provide more support for apprentices and their employers and address the key issues highlighted in the report, including safety, harassment, training quality, and fairness at work.

Among the first reforms to be implemented will be a pilot of a central helpdesk service, where apprentices and trainees can go for all types of workplace support. This helpdesk will be run by *Apprenticeships Victoria* and builds on the success of the *Apprenticeship Support Program*.

The government has also given in principal support to the establishment of a dedicated regulator for apprentices and trainees. The dedicated regulator will work to improve outcomes for Victoria's 77,000 apprentices and make the system easier to navigate, helping them stay in their chosen fields.

The package of reforms will include more support for employers of apprentices, greater inclusion and safety for women apprentices, modernising laws that govern the apprenticeship system, and better collaboration between agencies and the Commonwealth.

To further support our apprentices, the state government has announced three new mental health programs that will be available to them, including the *Apprentice Employee Assistance Program* (EAP). The EAP offers free counselling and can be accessed online or by phone without the need for a referral.

Victoria's Apprenticeship Taskforce was established through the *Victorian Budget* 2023/24 and is chaired by Sharan Burrow AC, alongside representatives from unions, industry, and apprentices.

Apprenticeships Victoria, established in 2021, will oversee the new helpdesk and all mental health initiatives to make sure apprentices and trainees, across all industries, are getting the support they need to do well on the job.

Health transport challenges in Murrindindi

AMBULANCE Victoria has flexed the rules around Non-Emergency Patient Transport (NEPT), and as of a couple of weeks ago, a large number of people in our small regional shire can no longer access NEPT reimbursement of taxi services. This includes people requiring dialysis three times per week, as well as post-transplant treatments and cancer treatments.

For people needing dialysis, the cost of a taxi is around \$180 each way to and from Seymour, which hosts the nearest dialysis service. For three return trips per week, the cost could be almost \$1100 per week for people who are generally on pensions or similar.

Following the initial uproar over the sudden changes, the patients were advised that they would book an NEPT vehicle but not get a taxi booked for them, as occured previously. It's understood that patients accessing NEPT services require clinical supervision and therefore Ambulance Victoria is unwilling to pay for taxis. Patients instead may need to wait for a significant period for NEPT, with clinical supervision provided by the hospital.

As outlined in the editorial by Marie Bristow on this page, there have been some challenges for patients under the new systems, and there are few volunteer services able to step in and assist.

The initial response from the Health Department office said, "For Victorians who don't require clinical monitoring or care during transportation to medical appointments, community transport providers are available, particularly for those who may be unable to use public transport, taxi services or seek support from family and friends. In regional areas, across Loddon Mallee, Gippsland, South West Victoria, Grampians and North East, a large range of options are available."

In the Hume region, the only Murrindindi Shire service listed is Community Accessability.

The response also said, "Local counciloperated transport and statewide services are also available through Red Cross Patient Transport, Connect Health and Community, LINK Community and Transport and Federal Government schemes including My Aged Care and NDIS."

Red Cross operates in Murrindindi but the volunteers are based outside of the shire. Neither LINK Community and Transport or Connect Health and Community operate in the shire.

NDIS provides a maximum of \$1784 per year for participants who are not working, studying or attending day programs but are seeking to enhance their community access.

My Aged Care Home Care Packages (HPC) funds can be used to pay for taxi vouchers for aged-care related transport needs. This includes transport and personal assistance to help a care recipient shop, visit health practitioners, or attend social activities. Taxi vouchers can be accessed through HCP funds or through a state-based government program, but not at the same time. Where state subsidised travel is available for medical appointments, this must be used in the first instance. There are also delays in people being able to access these packages if they are not already receiving it.

Under the Multi-Purpose Taxi Program, which has very stringent criteria to access the service, half of the cost of each trip, up to \$60 is paid. More information on this service can be found at *vic.gov.au/multi-purpose-taxi-program*

There appears to be no easy transport solution for the people needing life-saving treatment.

Member for Eildon Cindy McLeish said, "They need to sort this out. They should have had it sorted out prior to making the change, rather than leave people in the lurch and increase the stress level significantly of the patient."

Member for Indi Helen Haines spoke about the new Aged Care bill last week in Parliament. She expressed concern that the new *Support at Home* packages will not be large enough for regional participants, who face additional costs due to higher transportation costs and workforce shortages.

She said, "It is important our aged care system is sustainable, now and well into the future, and this is the policy equivalent of knocking the house down and starting again. For people in Indi, we have a much higher proportion of older people compared to the national average, and many people move to our beautiful towns to retire. This reform is crucial to their quality of life."

"Across Indi, I hear from older people who do not receive the full benefit from their existing home care packages, because the cost of travel chews up their budgets too quickly."

Dr Haines continued her push for attention on regional transport issues during Question Time, asking the Minister for Aged Care how the government will ensure regional and rural Australians won't be disadvantaged by travel costs in delivering *Support at Home* care.

"The Minister, in responding to my question, said the Independent Health and Aged Care Pricing Authority will advise the government on services and pricing, particularly with respect to transport. I will be looking at this closely to see if this delivers better outcomes for regional people."

Things have not improved for patients receiving kidney dialysis at the Seymour hospital.

SINCE I posted my concerns on the Alexandra Community Page on September 26, the patients have been advised that all transport to Seymour Dialysis will be done by National Transport Non Emergency Transport.

Patients were informed they should be getting a phone call the night before treatment, to advise what time they are going to be picked up.

In the last two weeks this system has failed for the patients. For example, one patient never received a phone call and as treatment is a must, arranged private transport, then the National Patient Transport arrived to pick them up.

Patients have also been getting a phone call half an hour before they are due to be picked up, instead of the previous night. This adds stress for patients, not knowing

if they will be late for their dialysis and lose their space at the hospital. Delayed treatment adds time to the journey and treatment, exhausts the patient, and most importantly the cost of requiring the private transport.

Treatment times are getting later and later due to patients getting picked up between 8.30am to 9.30am.

The waiting time is up to an hour to be picked up from Seymour to go back to Yarck and Alexandra.

On Tuesday, one patient was picked up at 7.30am to go to Seymour Dialysis. They started treatment about 8.40am and finished treatment at 12.45pm, with everything going okay.

I received a distressed phone call from the patient that afternoon saying they had been waiting nearly one and a half hours and could not be given a time they would be picked up to return to Alexandra. The patient called Seymour Taxi to take them back to Alexandra.

Last Wednesday, a patient was told by staff at Seymour Dialysis that they had received a phone call from National Patient Transport that they would be prioritising patients. If they receive an emergency call, they will take that first, leaving the dialysis patient without notification and again the stress to arrange transport as stated above.

Enough is enough. This is affecting these patients both physically and mentally. How much more can they take? It breaks my heart hearing one of the patients saying they have had enough, this is not living and there's no quality of life. The staff from National Patient Transport are wonderful and very caring to the patients.

If the system is broken, how can we all get together to resolve it. You never know how many more will need this service in the future. Maybe it will be you.

Ambulance Victoria comments on the health transport challenges

AMBULANCE Victoria Executive Director Specialist Operations and Coordination (Acting), Michael Georgiou provided comment on the current situation regarding the transport of dialysis patients.

He said, "While there have been no changes to the Non-Emergency Patient Transport (NEPT) eligibility criteria, existing requirements for NEPT are being better implemented to ensure this service is available for those who need it such as eligible dialysis patients and to take pressure off our paramedics.

"Each time NEPT transports someone who doesn't require monitored or clinical care, it places additional strain on our busy ambulance services. This is about ensuring the service is available for those who need clinical care during transport

and to help ambulance services focus on the sickest Victorians first.

"For eligible patients in the Murrindindi Shire, we have been working with health services to coordinate transport and treatment times. Other patients have a number of options including services run by local councils and community transport providers."

NEPT is requested by authorised health professionals (nurses, paramedics, and doctors) for patients who require clinical monitoring or supervision during transport. Before being accepted, all transfers go through an assessment to ensure they meet the eligibility criteria.

The previous manual booking system for NEPT made it difficult to identify

bookings which did not meet the criteria but requests that are not eligible are now more readily identified.

Having NEPT available for people who need it is helping reduce reliance on emergency ambulances and taxis.

AV has also been working with health services to ensure patients who don't meet these eligibility requirements are supported in accessing other options including services run by local councils and community transport providers.

It's understood that appointment start times in Seymour are being pushed forward by half an hour to help ensure that NEPT can get the patients there in time, and that the pooling of patients in an NEPT vehicle is being explored.

Packing gifts for **Operation Christmas Child**

SAMARATIN'S Purse held a packing party for Operation Christmas Child at the Oasis Community Church in Alexandra on thursday, October 17.

Organiser Judy Peters explained, "We pack these shoeboxes to send overseas to the children for ages two to four, five to nine, and 10 to 14 for boys and girls. We put in school items, hygiene, clothing and a toy to play with such as a puzzle."

Judy stores the items at her home and does packing through the year. So far 600 shoeboxes have been packed.

The shoeboxes this year are going to Cambodia, Philippines, Fiji, Solomon Island and the Ukraine.

"Last year they sent over 10,000 into the Ukraine. It was a whole shipping container full," Judy said.

Judy has been doing the Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child for at least 20 years now. Her reason behind taking part is the children.

"I just think the kids overseas don't have much. They don't get gifts. They don't get things. For the children to get a box like this is amazing. They love it.'

Crazy Hair Day at Alexandra **Primary School**

ALEXANDRA Primary School held a Crazy Hair Day on Friday, October 18. October is Niemann-Pick Awareness Month, and the day promotes education, understanding, and emphasises the urgent need for effective treatments and a cure.

Niemann-Pick disease refers to a group of ultra-rare lysosomal storage conditions passed down in families. NP-C is a neurologically degenerative disorder characterised by the accumulation of lipids (fats) within cells. It affects both children and adults.





Road Advisory Group drives improvements

A DEDICATED group of community members has provided valuable recommendations to Murrindindi Shire Council on various road management issues. These suggestions aim to improve how council manages local roads.

Council's Roads Advisory Group (CRAG), formed in August 2023, consists of 14 members who live and work across the shire. Their role is to represent the local community on road management matters and help council understand what is most important to residents.

After four productive meetings, the group presented 16 recommendations, all of which were formally accepted by council at its September 25 council meeting.

Some of these recommendations are already in progress, including updating the Special Charge Scheme Policy to make it fairer, advocating for lower speed limits in high-risk areas, reviewing work practices to find efficiencies, and establishing a rapid response roads and tree crew for urgent maintenance requests.

These recommendations will guide the review of council's Road Asset Management Plan and Road Management Plan, which outline how they create, maintain, renew and upgrade local roads and road assets over the next decade and beyond.

Council thanks the Roads Advisory Group members for their thoughtful input. Their dedication has amplified the community's voice and led to improvements that will enhance road safety throughout the shire.

Murrindindi Shire Council CEO Livia Bonazzi said, "Managing council's 1200km of sealed and unsealed roads, along with maintaining roadsides within our townships, is a significant and ongoing responsibility. Every day, we face the challenge of balancing the

need for high-quality services with our limited resources, making road maintenance one of our largest annual investments. Through the review of our Road Asset Management Plan, we are committed to identifying practical improvements that will have a lasting, positive impact across the shire.

"I'd like to sincerely thank the Roads Advisory Group members for their time, insights, and dedication. Their valuable recommendations reflect a deep understanding of community priorities and will enhance road safety and service delivery for all. This initiative is a powerful example of community-led innovation, helping to shape a stronger future for our local roads.'

Roads Advisory Group member Mat Luma said, "Being part of the CRAG was an extremely positive experience. The insights gained about the council processes were valuable for us to truly understand the complexities of administration and to then be involved directly with the discussions and solutions showed everyone that there is a huge scope for future community advisory groups. Chlorthal dimethyl weedkiller found harmful: immediate cancellation

Medicines Authority (APVMA) has cancelled all 12 products containing the herbicide chlorthal dimethyl.

This follows the recent United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) emergency order to stop use of chlorthal dimethyl (DCPA), also known as Dacthal, in the United States.

Chlorthal dimethyl is a herbicide used in vegetable crops, lawns and cotton that is currently in 12 products available in Australia.

APVMA Chief Executive Officer, Scott Hansen, said the APVMA identified an immediate risk of serious injury or serious illness which could result from use of these products.

"The APVMA has the power to act swiftly where we identify an imminent risk to human health and we are exercising that authority today with the cancellation of all products containing chlorthal dimethyl," Mr Hansen said.

"We haven't taken this decision lightly and are exercising a high degree of caution in cancelling these products and ask those who hold them to cease use immediately. We will issue information on the product recall requirements shortly."

Mr Hansen said this decision brings Australia into alignment with international counterparts and reiterated that there is no phase out period for the products due to the risk to human health.

"The APVMA considers the risk of continued use to be unacceptable as the risk of exposure cannot be effectively mitigated," Mr Hansen said.

"The primary risk is to pregnant people's unborn babies, particularly where those people have handled the chemical or reentered areas where the product has been used within the last five days.

"We understand the impact that this regulatory decision will have on industry, but the safety of people is of paramount importance."

National Farmers Federation President, David Jochinke, responded to the news with positive support.

"We note the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority's (APVMA's)

THE Australian Pesticides and Veterinary immediate cancellation of the registration and use of all products containing chlorthaldimethyl, commonly referred to as Dacthal or DCPA," Mr Jochinke said.

> "We commend the APVMA for doing its job swiftly and urge all farmers to immediately comply with the directive to cease use. Further recall instructions will be made available by the APVMA shortly and we will work with our member organisations to ensure farmers understand how to appropriately dispose of affected products in their possession.'

> Farmers and retailers may continue to hold product until further notice but must not use it. The use of chlorthal dimethyl as an agricultural chemical product is now illegal.

> Products available in Australia that include chlorthal dimethyl are: Nufarm Chorthal-Dimethyl 900 Herbicide; Imtrade Pterodactyl 900 WG Pre-Emergence Herbicide; KDPC Prethal 750WG Herbicide; Novaguard Chlorthal 750 WG Herbicide; Ezycrop Chlorthal 750 WG Herbicide; Farmalinx Dynamo 750 Herbicide; AC Discord 750 WG Herbicide; MacPhersons Chlorthal 900 WG Herbicide; Lawthal 750WG Herbicide; Hemani Chlorthal 750 WG Herbicide; Titan Chlorthal 900 WG Pre-Emergence Herbicide; Dacthal 900 WG Pre-Emergence Herbicide.

Agriculture Victoria Livestock Development Officer, Dr Hannah Manning said during calving season regular monitoring of cows is important to pick up any that are having trouble

"A farmer's strength, a calving jack or a calving pulley are the only acceptable methods to pull a calf, even then you need to be a competent operator. There is no point having the equipment if you haven't had training on how to use it, and if a calf is stuck or not lined up properly then more force isn't the answer," Dr Manning said.

"Good facilities that are safe for you and anyone else helping is vital. It's amazing how effective a vet can be with drugs in improving the whole situation. If calling your local vet isn't an option is there someone else you can call or do you need to make some tough decisions?"

Dr Manning said the top consideration at all times is the welfare of the cow.

"Tough calvings can result in calving paralysis and down cows are a poor result and require a lot of skill and time to care for properly."

Water off to win prizes

Goulburn Valley Water Managing Director Steve Capewell said Water Night aims to remind people about how little actions at home can make a difference.

"We all reach for our taps on autopilot, and I don't think many of us realise how much we rely on running water every day or how much water we actually use," he said.

"I encourage people to sign up to Water Night and challenge you to turn off your taps; and in the process learn a little more about how important it is to make every drop count, particularly as we head into summer in a climate that is getting warmer and drier."

New research from the Water Conservancy about perceptions on climate change and water use shows that more than half (59 per cent) of respondents believe they are doing enough to conserve water, most underestimate their daily usage.

The average amount of water used per person every day in Australia is approximately 200 litres, yet more than three-quarters (76 per cent) of respondents think they use 150 litres or less each day. Despite Australia ranking among the top 10 countries with the highest water use globally, just one in four believe they could do more to save water.

The Water Conservancy CEO Chris Philpot said it wasn't surprising that most Australians are concerned about climate change, but the research highlighted a troubling gap in understanding how everyday water usage contributed.

CEO of The Water Conservancy, Chris Philpot said: "Last year was the hottest since records began, so it's not surprising that most Australians are concerned about climate change. However, these results highlight a troubling gap in understanding how our everyday water usage contributes to the issue.

"Water Night offers a valuable opportunity to increase Australia's water literacy and draw attention to the unseen environmental costs of over-using this precious resource," he said.

"We're encouraging all Australians to take part to demonstrate how practical, water saving actions could help make a positive environmental impact."

When considering future actions, nearly half of respondents (48 per cent) indicated they would commit to taking shorter showers. However, only one in three said they would only run dishwashers or washing machines with full loads.

Water Night ambassador and Gardening Australia's Costa Georgiadis is just one of many highprofile Australians registered to take part in this year's Water Night and is encouraging others to join.

"Climate change can often seem overwhelming, making it difficult to know how to make a difference. Water Night offers a straightforward way to reduce both water usage and your carbon footprint. I encourage everyone to sign up today. Together we can make a real difference," he said.

Victory in the bottle for Alexandra Football Netball Club

THE Alexandra Football Netball Club (AFNC) won the inaugural Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) Victorian Club of the Year award at the AFL Victoria's annual community awards recently.

AFNC took the honours for their efforts in raising more than \$14,000 for the club through the CDS.

Club President, Ray Steyger, expressed his gratitude for winning the award and detailed the hard work the club did to achieve it.

"We got a glass award, same as all the other winners, and then we also received a cheque for \$2500, which was quite amazing. We didn't expect that," Ray said.

"We really didn't know anything about the award, it just came across and eventuated in the last couple of months when the CDS ioined as a partner with AFL Victoria. The CDS are trying to encourage football netball clubs across the state to register with the program and actively participate. As part of that promotional, they initiated this award.

"We were contacted by people from the scheme probably four or five weeks ago to suggest that we were potentially in the running for the award. A bit after that we were contacted to say that we had been selected for the award, and that we would be invited to a function to receive that award.

"It started roughly eight years ago, a few people within the club approached me with the view to starting a bit of a recycle program. We started collecting cans and built up a little bit of a customer base there. We'd collect them, crush them and send them to Melbourne.

"From that, with the new scheme that came in, the CDS in November last year, we expanded things and now we're still collecting cans, but also doing plastic and glass that are eligible for the scheme and building it up from there.'

Ray finished by saying: "At the end of the day, we wouldn't be able to do it without the support of the community. We have to collect all the recycling items, and if people don't set them aside for us, we wouldn't be able to do what we do.

"We're very fortunate that around the district there is a number of people that will keep their recycling for us, and a lot of other people who drop their recycling into some bins that are at the reserve, and then we collect all the stuff from there as well.

"At the end of the day it's fairly simple. We just want the wheel to continue turning, and we need people to think about recycling," Ray concluded.

The opportunity is thanks to CDS Victoria recently becoming the Official Recycling Partner of AFL Victoria until the end of 2027, providing options for fundraising through

CDS Victoria provides the opportunity for Victorians to return eligible drink containers for a 10-cent refund at more than 600 refund points across the state through zone operators Tomra Cleanaway, Visy and Return-It. Containers are then processed to make new items, reducing waste and working towards a circular economy.

With the option to either keep your 10c refund or donate it, footy clubs across the state are already raising funds through the scheme. This partnership aims to increase the profile of the scheme and help more clubs to benefit.

Head of AFL Victoria, Greg Madigan, expressed his excitement to be partnering with CDS Victoria to create a positive environmental impact while providing clubs with additional funding opportunities.

"Local footy clubs are the heartbeat of communities across Victoria and any program that will help clubs raise funds while having a positive impact on the environment is great for the grassroots game, which is one of the reasons why the partnership with CDS Victoria has so much potential," Mr Madigan

"The process of recycling eligible containers in return for refunds is a fantastic opportunity for our local clubs and their communities. Having both a positive impact on the natural environment, as well as on the health and sustainability of their footy club is a great outcome."
