# **Potholes: We're tyred of this**

PAM Coulson from Alexandra Tyrepower was asked whether their business has seen an increase in the number of vehicles requiring new tyres as a result of pothole damage.

She said, "We would have someone come in probably nearly every day with blown tyres or racked rims. Huge amount of people... Sometimes even have to get a tow truck to get here because if they've blown a tyre or cracked a rim and they haven't got a spare, they've got no other choice but to get a tow truck. So that's extra expense for them again."

Unfortunately, damage to vehicles on Department of Transport managed roads is only covered for expenses past \$1640. The first \$1640 of damage is the responsibility of the owner or vehicle insurance (often with an excess which may make a claim unviable). Therefore, drivers often have to absorb the expense themselves.

Pam added, "Sometimes we might even get two [people with pothole-damaged wheels] in the one day. It's very bad and people are so angry."

Asked how many people would come in with tyres damaged by potholes five years ago, Pam responded, "Five years ago we probably got none... Or maybe, one or two every now and then, but it's really bad now." When asked whether there were particular locations that people have been mentioning when they came in with tyre damage, Pam said that between Alexandra and Yea is very bad, "But it doesn't really matter which direction you go in, they're everywhere."

She said that the damage is generally limited to tyres and rims, but sometimes people need wheel alignments after hitting potholes as well. The potholes are also having more impact on low profile tyres as well, with 4WDs and larger vehicles having fewer issues.

As outlined in the last week's edition, this newspaper's Freedom of Information (FOI)

request, submitted to the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) on August 15 was rejected on December 30.

It sought to find out the total annual spend on road repairs and maintenance in Murrindindi Shire across each of the past 10 financial (or calendar) years. They advised that such information was not available.

A new FOI was submitted on Wednesday, January 15. The new FOI is seeking to find out "The total annual spend on road repairs and maintenance in the smallest increment (ie. region) which includes Murrindindi Shire, across each of the past 10 financial (or calendar) years."

# POLICE REPORT

# **EV** charger out of order

MURRINDINDI Shire Council were contacted about the EV charging station that is out of order in Bakers Lane carpark in Alexandra.

A council spokesperson provided the following response, "As part of the Victorian Government's 'Destination Charging Action Victoria Program', Murrindindi Shire Council successfully advocated for the installation of an Electric Vehicle charging station located in the Bakers Lane carpark in Alexandra. This charger has two different plugs to enable charging of most electric vehicles.

"The charging station is partially out of order, due to the more commonly used plug being temporarily out of service. The other plug is only suitable for a limited number of vehicles.

"Evie Networks, who owns and manages this equipment, is responsible for maintenance and repairing faults. Council has contacted Evie Networks, however, they were not able to provide an estimate for when repairs are due to be completed. We encourage users to check the Evie app or contact Evie Networks directly to confirm when the plug will be operational again.

"The nearest publicly accessible EV charging stations that suit most vehicles are the Tesla Superchargers behind FoodWorks in Yea.

"Council does not maintain a list of EV chargers in the shire for residents and visitors, as there are already free resources available such as PlugShare or Google Maps, which provide a comprehensive and regularly updated list. Additionally, most electric vehicles have built-in navigation with the ability to search for charging infrastructure, and most charging infrastructure companies, including Evie Networks, have apps and online maps that allow anyone to check if their chargers are currently available, or out of order."

### Call for P plate driving age to be lowered

NATIONALS Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad is calling for Victoria's probationary driving age to be reduced to 17, saying this would bring it in line with other states and reduce disadvantage for young people in rural areas.

Victoria is the only state or territory in Australia that still requires P plate drivers to be aged 18 or over.

Ms Broad said the move would be a game changer for many rural and regional families.

"Young people, especially those living in rural and regional areas are at a disadvantage by not being allowed to access their provisional licence at the age of 17," Ms Broad said.

"In the last week I was contacted by many young people and their families who are very keen to see the P plate age lowered. One young driver said 'a lot of kids would be absolutely stoked'.

"People who live in rural and regional areas often do not have access to public transport to get to work, apprenticeships or study," Ms Broad said.

"They rely on their families to transport them to and from these commitments, but not everyone has someone who can drive them around when they need it."

Ms Broad raised the issue in Parliament in July 2024, but the state government did not support the idea.

"I will raise the issue again when Parliament resumes next month," Ms Broad said.

The Transport Accident Commission was asked about the possible lowering of the driving age. CEO Tracey Slatter responded, "Road crashes are one of the leading causes of death among young people, and drivers on probationary licences are at a higher risk of crashing.

"Victoria's world class Graduated Licensing System has been informed by research from youth development and road safety behavioural studies, and has proven successful in reducing the number of young drivers killed and seriously injured on our roads.

"The more supervised experience young people get as learner drivers the better equipped they will be to become safe solo drivers."

In their first year of driving, young drivers in Victoria are almost four times more likely to be involved in a fatal or serious injury crash than more experienced drivers. The key reasons for this are inexperience and the fact that young drivers are more likely to take risks, like texting. Experience and maturity are pivotal when it comes to safety.

The Victorian Law Reform, Road and Community Safety Parliamentary Committee conducted a Parliamentary inquiry to explore the impact of lowering the licencing age in 2016. Research conducted at that time estimated that lowering the licencing age to 17 would result in 10 more deaths, 241 more serious injuries and 714 more minor injuries each year.

Victoria's Graduated Licensing System (GLS) is informed by research and evidence in both youth development and road safety behaviours. It ensures drivers progressively build the skills needed to drive safely. This system includes a minimum licencing age along with other measures such as a driving experience requirement for licensing eligibility for learners under 21 years and restrictions on P1 and P2 drivers. Since the GLS was introduced in 2007/08, 42.5 per cent fewer drivers aged 18 to 23 years have been involved in fatal or serious injury crashes on our roads.



# Alexandra Fire Brigade's new truck

THE Alexandra Fire Brigade are delighted with their new fire truck. Chris Lynch, captain of the Alexandra Fire Brigade, explained that the truck was obtained via a VESEP (Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program) grant.

The new truck replaces the Alexandra Fire Brigade's smaller ultralight, a single cab four wheel drive with a 600 litre tank on the back. The old truck has been sold to a local farmer as a private firefighting vehicle. The money from the sale goes back into the brigade's coffers.

The new crew cab has 2000 litres on the back, which increase the brigade's firefighting capacity dramatically. Having a dual cab also increases firefighter comfort, as some of the team no longer have to travel on the back, and it's perfect for the terrain and conditions around Alexandra.

The efforts towards getting a new truck started three years ago. With the VESEP grants, the community needs to contribute one third of the total, and the VESEP grant covers the remainder.

Given the cost of the truck, around \$36,000 was contributed by the brigade, gained through fundraising such as barbecues, fire equipment maintenance and donations through Santa runs and people thanking the brigade.

Chris said, "It's 100 per cent a community truck."

The truck is online now, so people are likely to see it travelling to fires. It's already been to two fires over the Christmas break, and was on show at the Alexandra Carols event and the fire brigade's recent parade. People may also see it out and about on maintenance runs on Sundays.

Most of the brigade members have completed their driver training for the truck, and now it's just a matter of getting their kilometres up for individual training, and getting used to the truck.

# Pedestrian struck in Thornton

POLICE are investigating a collision that occured in Thornton on New Year's Eve. It is believed a blue coloured hatchback was driving erratically in the vicinity of Taggerty-Thornton Road and struck a pedestrian just prior to midnight. The truck gives the brigade the ability to take the truck to places where they wouldn't usually take standard trucks. It will be a terrific addition to the brigade's fleet.

Two people were particularly active in ensuring that the brigade received the grant. One was former secretary and treasurer Graham Atkinson, and the other was former captain Jay Williams.

"This was their project, and they were the masterminds behind the project," Chris said.

In 2021, the Alexandra Fire Brigade turned out to 39 incidents, in 2022 they turned out to 60 incidents, in 2023 they did 76, and last year they did 96 calls.

"You can certainly see that Alexandra is becoming quite a busy little brigade," Chris added.

Asked what was behind the increase in call outs, Chris said cited the population increase as well as becoming a structural brigade, with equipment including atmospheric monitoring, and the pumper. They have the only pumper in the Alexandra Group, and this has been used a lot more. Their forward command vehicle (FCV) also carries breathing apparatus, enabling a rapid response to anywhere that requires it. They have also been doing a lot more work with the Yea Brigade on the structural side of things, as well as motor vehicle accidents.

Chris estimated that their brigade has around 70 members, with 15 to 20 active members. New members are always welcome, particularly active members and daytime turnout responders.

He suggested that people keen to find out more could head along to the brigade on Wednesday nights. On the second Wednesday of every month, they have a general meeting. The first and second Wednesdays of the month are training nights. They could also visit on Sundays, when there are usually people down at the station doing equipment maintenance, truck services, truck runs, and general works around the station.

They are also keen to hear from recent retirees who are looking for something to do, as they want to expand their equipment maintenance team, testing fire extinguishers and fire hoses around the communities. This activity raises a lot of money for the brigade throughout the year, which allows the brigade to do what they do. This type of work is generally one day per week, on a Tuesday. It's not paid, but lunch and a uniform are provided.

"It's a chance to get out and do good things for the broader community," Chris said.

The Conservation Regulator, Parks Victoria, and Forest Fire Management Victoria will be conducting patrols in Victoria's parks and forests throughout the weekend to make sure campers are doing the right thing

A total of 257 unattended campfires and barbecues have been detected by the Conservation Regulator, Parks Victoria and Forest Fire Operations field staff on public land so far this financial year.

Over the last few weeks where Total Fire Bans have been declared, fire authorities and land managers continue to detect illegal campfires across the state during extreme weather conditions. Heavy penalties apply for anyone lighting a campfire on a Total Fire Ban day.

Many people try to put out campfires incorrectly with soil, or not enough water to extinguish them completely. Fires that haven't been properly extinguished can smoulder under soil for days and reignite in the right conditions. If it is cool to touch it is safe to leave.

Before you light a fire always check fire restrictions, including whether a Total Fire Ban is in place. Download the VicEmergency app or go to https://www.emv.vic.gov.au

Plan ahead and consider alternatives for cooking such as a portable butane cooktop. Use a purpose-built fireplace if available, otherwise dig a trench at least 30cm deep. Always follow the designated rules of your

campsite. In national parks, fires can only be lit in purpose-built fireplaces unless marked otherwise.

The campfire must not exceed one square metre, and three metres above and around your fire must be clear of flammable material. Branches and logs on your campfire must

be no longer than one metre. Never leave a campfire unattended. An adult must always stay within a 50 metre line of sight.

Campfires must be extinguished with at least 10 litres of water every time you leave the site. All rubbish must be taken home with you, not burned.

People who breach campfire regulations on public land face a maximum penalty of \$19,759 if the matter is prosecuted in court. The maximum penalty for lighting or maintaining a fire during a Total Fire Ban day is \$47,421.60 and or two years in jail. Report unattended campfires to DEECA at 136 186 or call 000 to report a bushfire. For more on campfire rules go to vic.gov.au/campfiresstoves-and-bbqs

Chris Hardman, Chief Fire Officer, Forest Fire Management Victoria said, "Even if a Total Fire Ban has not been declared, we encourage campers to consider the need for a campfire on hot or windy days. If you are building a campfire, make sure you know how to build a safe one, don't leave it unattended while it is alight and that you put it out with water. If the ashes are cool to touch, it's safe to leave. It only takes one stray ember to cause a destructive fire.'

Kate Gavens, Chief Conservation Regulator added, "Our authorised officers will be visiting campsites throughout Victoria's parks and forests making sure everyone is following the rules so we can all have a safe and enjoyable long weekend."

Chris Mercier, Manager, Enforcement Capability, Parks Victoria emphasised, "We want people to get out and enjoy Victoria's great outdoors, but unsafe campfires can have devastating consequences. It only takes one camper ignoring the rules to endanger the community and our environment."

# Don't be too social on social media

ACCORDING to Scamwatch reports, Australians lost more money in 2024 to social media scams than any other form of scams. Over 6000 victims reported losing \$58.3 million to social media scams in the first ten months of last year.

It's common for scammers to use fake or hijacked profiles on social media, messaging platforms and apps to steal money and personal information. Other forms of scams may include investment scams, romance scams and job and employment scams through social media networks. The usual way to spot a scam within social media is an offer to make quick, easy money requiring not much effort, advertising a job that requires payment for training or access to work tasks, inviting you to enter a competition or limited time offers.

When it comes to marketplace posts, if you are selling something and they will offer you a high price without seeing the item, this rings alarm bells, they may be selling items lower than the usual price they are listed, and once you show interest they make up excuses as to why they can't meet you in person. These scammers learn about you from what you share on social media, and they deceive you into sharing personal information even further. These scammers usually pretend to be one of your friends, a romantic interest, a financial advisor or a business.

According to Scamwatch there are some simple steps you can take to avoid these scams, they include: Make sure the person is who they say they are; research profiles to see how long they have been online, how many followers they have, and what kind of activity they have; be careful if anyone makes a job offer without an interview, research the recruiter or agency making the offer; research any investment opportunity fully, and never send any money or personal details to someone you have only met online.

Being in a tight knit community, our local Facebook marketplace pages and community groups have members who are fairly switched on as to what is a scam and what isn't, don't let this drop your guard though, always look after yourself by arming yourself to stay protected.

Don't send money or hand over any personal information to anyone you have met online regardless of who they say they are, check away, if something doesn't feel right it's probably not and protect yourself and others by reporting suspicious contacts and activities to scamwatch at *scamwatch*. *gov.au* and if you have found you have lost your money contact your financial institution.

### Lab grown labelling laws challenged

CATTLE Australia (CA) has critisized proposed regulations for lab-grown fake foods for their lack of clear labelling requirements and defiance of the recommendations of a Federal Senate inquiry.

Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ) has been undertaking public consultation in response to a proposal to permit the use of cultured quail cells as a novel food.

CA says the regulations proposed by FSANZ provide no reassurance that lab-grown proteins are safe for consumers and the environment, or that the labelling requirements will avoid misleading consumers.

"Lab-grown proteins must be held to the same food safety, environmental and labelling standards as real products like beef," CA Chief Executive Dr Chris Parker said.

"The processes and ingredients used to produce these products are often 'commercial in confidence' so it is very unclear what is actually in this stuff.


"The FSANZ framework fails to provide the detail consumers and industry are looking for as to how fake foods will be labelled, which goes against the recommendations of the 2022 Senate Rural and Regional Affairs Committee inquiry.

"If the pathway set out by FSANZ is followed, novel foods may only have to be described as 'cell-cultured' or 'cellcultivated', which doesn't adequately describe to consumers that they are in fact eating fake meat." CA has argued that minimum labelling standards for plant-based or lab-grown proteins should prohibit any reference to animal food products, including the words meat, beef, lamb, and goat.

"We strongly believe that the use of livestock images on plant or synthetic protein packaging or marketing materials should also be outlawed as it is a deliberate deception of consumers designed to dupe them into believing they are eating something that they are not," Dr Parker said.

"The use of the word beef and images of cattle on fake foods has been proven to be confusing to consumers, and actually weakens the value of the real thing.

"Beef should be defined in law as only including products derived from actual livestock raised by cattle producers."

### Unattended campfires in Murrindindi

BOXING Day appears to be a hot spot for unattended campfires in Murrindindi Shire.

Lucas Russell, District Manager of Murrindindi District with Forest Fire Management Victoria said, "On Boxing Day, which was a day of Total Fire Ban, eight campfires were detected in Murrindindi District. Seven of those were unattended campfires.

'There were no other unattended campfires detected over the Christmas and New Year period."

### Illegal spotlighting at Big River

TWO men from Werribee and Tarneit in Victoria pleaded guilty and have been convicted in the Werribee Magistrates' Court for illegal spotlighting offences in Big River State Forest near Lake Eildon.

The men received convictions for illegal spotlighting, had a vehicle seized and were ordered to pay court costs. The men also had a firearm, spotlight and ammunition forfeited and destroyed and a Game Licence cancelled.

The Werribee Magistrates' Court found that on the night of August 4, 2023, the men travelled to the Big River State Forest in a 4WD vehicle where they proceeded to hunt and destroy a Sambar deer at night under spotlight, near where people were camping.

An investigation began when hunters provided Game Management Authority (GMA) with information regarding the illegal spotlighting incident.

This resulted in a search warrant being executed at a property in Werribee where a firearm was seized. A ballistics test on the seized firearm and a recovered bullet shell from the scene confirmed that the firearm had been used to commit the illegal spotlighting offence.

The GMA Director of Compliance and Intelligence, Zac Powell, said illegally spotlighting deer at night is dangerous and can put communities, properties and livestock at risk.

"Those who break the law face significant fines and penalties including prosecution, having equipment confiscated and Game and Firearms Licences cancelled. In some cases, offenders may face jail terms," Mr Powell said.

Community members, including hunters, campers and local residents, are urged to report illegal spotlighting to the GMA through its website at gma.vic.gov. *au* or by calling 136 186.

The GMA assesses all reports of illegal behaviour and works closely with its partner agencies to conduct enforcement and compliance operations across Victoria.

If a suspicious bloom is found, farmers should move their stock to an area on the property with a safe alternative water source.

Farmers should plan for managing water availability in the event that a blue-green algal bloom impacts their primary livestock drinking water supply.

The plan should include calculating how much water livestock would require if the primary water supply was unsafe to drink and identifying additional alternative on-farm water supplies that could be utilised quickly.

In the medium-term, your plan could include improving water reticulation systems, considering options for treating blue-green algae affected water, or agisting your stock elsewhere until your farm water is safe again.

### Game bird harvesting statistics rise in 2024 season

THE Game Management Authority (GMA) last week released the *Estimates of duck and Stubble Quail harvest in Victoria 2024* report.

Results show an estimated 391,900 game ducks were harvested in 2024, which is 22 per cent above the long-term average of 320,000.

### Woman arrested after Highlands CFA Burglary

ALEXANDRA Crime Investigation Unit detectives arrested a woman on Monday, January 13 after an alleged burglary and theft of a ute along with firefighting equipment from the Highlands CFA on Ghin Ghin Road on Thursday, January 9.

The ute, a 2006 Toyota Landcruiser with CFA markings, was allegedly stolen along with the equipment.

Police located the vehicle parked in a service station on Hume Highway, Tallarook and attempted to intercept it on January 10.

The Landcruiser ute allegedly collided with a police car, unoccupied at the time, before it drove away with police in quick pursuit.

Police lost sight of the Landcruiser which was located a short time later, abandoned on Hume Freeway, Wallan.

A 36 year old Melton South woman was arrested nearby. She was interviewed by detectives and is expected to be charged on summons. A male suspect is yet to be identified.

Anyone with information is urged to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or submit a confidential report at *crimestoppersvic.com.au*  Of the 21,383 licensed duck hunters, 60 per cent actively hunted in 2024. On average, active duck hunters harvested an estimated 30.3 ducks during the season over an average of 8.9 days.

The three most commonly harvested species were the Pacific Black Duck (39 per cent of the total harvest), Grey Teal (25 per cent of the total harvest) and Australian Wood Duck (24 per cent of the total harvest).

The most popular hunting areas, with the highest numbers of ducks harvested, were around the towns of Sale, Kerang, Boort, Horsham, and Shepparton.

Results also show an estimated 457,400 Stubble Quail were harvested in 2024. This is almost triple the long-term average of 159,000 and is the second largest Stubble Quail harvest since telephone surveys began in 2009.

Of the 25,788 hunters licenced to hunt Stubble Quail, 22 per cent actively hunted in 2024. On average, active quail hunters harvested an estimated 79.4 Stubble Quail for the season over 8.5 days.

The most popular quail hunting areas were around the towns of Shepparton, Echuca, Rochester, Ballarat and Colac. The highest number of quail harvested were around the towns of Shepparton, Ballarat, Echuca, Rochester and Wangaratta.

GMA Director of Strategy and Research, Simon Toop said the research was based on information gathered from randomly selected licenced game bird hunters who voluntarily participated in the surveys.

"Favourable environmental and breeding conditions and more active hunters likely resulted in an increase in the number of ducks and quail harvested," Mr Toop said.

"The information hunters provide helps build a stronger understanding of gamebird harvest trends and hunting activity in Victoria and I'd like to thank all hunters who participated in the surveys."

Throughout 2024, approximately 3458 licenced game bird hunters were surveyed to collect information about their hunting activity, including how many game birds were harvested, where hunting occurred, hunting methods used, and the species of game birds harvested.

The report provides estimates of the total harvests of ducks and Stubble Quail by Victorian Game Licence holders and provides insights on hunting activity during the seasons.

The report is produced annually by the GMA in collaboration with an independent telephone survey company and the Arthur Rylah Institute for Environmental Research.

### Don't pump water if you don't have a licence

AFTER a spate of incidents in recent weeks, Goulburn Murray Water (GMW) is warning people against illegally pumping water from storages and waterways.

As the weather has become warmer and drier, there have been several cases of people parking at boat ramps or besides waterways on public roads and pumping water into their trailer tanks.

GMW Water Delivery Services General Manager Warren Blyth said people caught doing this would face legal action.

"The water stored in our lakes, dams and reservoirs belongs to entitlement holders," Mr Blyth said.

"When people illegally take water from our storages and waterways, they are taking our customers' water. "Water is a valuable and limited resource. To ensure fairness in how it is used, we take a zero-tolerance approach to any form of unauthorised take."

People who are caught pumping water from a GMW storage or waterway without the appropriate authorisations can be prosecuted for water theft under the *Water Act 1989*.

Mr Blyth said those in need of water, but lacking entitlements could contact GMW to discuss their options.

"Our diversions inspectors can help people with any questions about how they can gain authorisation to take water," Mr Blyth said.

"People in urgent need of water also have the option of using emergency water supply points." There are about 300 emergency water supply points in Victoria. These are bores and standpipes that people can draw water from for emergency stock and domestic or rural needs.

## **Howitt Society advocates learning from history**

COULD a Los Angeles-type fire disaster occur in Victoria or anywhere else in Australia? The answer is clearly yes and it has already happened many times.

Recent examples in Victoria are February 2024 at Pomonal near the Grampians where 45 houses were lost and Mallacoota in 2020 where 128 houses were lost. While these were on a smaller scale than LA, and no lives were lost, the key factors leading up to the disasters were similar to LA, long unburnt fuels, dry conditions and residences close to the bush. When adverse weather conditions including strong winds occurred, this ensured long distance spotting ahead of the main front and into the buildings in the towns, which were largely unoccupied as residents had already evacuated.

Of course, Victoria can go back to Black Saturday in 2009 where 173 people died, including 120 in the Kinglake area and 34 in Marysville, and where over 2000 houses were destroyed. In terms of loss of life, those fires were a far worse disaster than the current LA fires. Other Australian states have similar stories.

There is an important saying, "Those who cannot learn from history are doomed to repeat it." Fire disasters are the result of the combination of meteorological conditions, topographical conditions, and fuel type and quantity. It is not possible to change the topography of an area and meteorological conditions are outside our control, so the only thing that can help mitigate the intensity of fires is to reduce fuel loads. No fuel equals no fire, less fuel equals less intense fire.

Broad scale fuel reduction programs are the proven way to reduce fuels over extensive areas. The Royal Commission after the 2009 fires recommended a minimum of five per cent of forests should be treated annually. The successful program in Western Australia targets six to eight per

cent annually. Victoria currently achieves about 1.3 per cent.

It is important that land managers learn from history and actively manage a comprehensive fuel management program across the forests of Victoria as part of mitigation against another fire disaster.

## Include your pets in your fire plan

THE Country Fire Authority (CFA) and the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RSPCA) Victoria are urging residents to include pets in their bushfire survival plans, amid the significant fire activity already impacting Victoria this summer.

Having bedding, food, and water ready to go for your furry friend could save valuable time in the event of a fire.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan emphasised the importance of being ready to leave early on high-risk bushfire days.

"While you should always prioritise your own safety ahead of your pets, your bushfire plan isn't fully complete unless it accounts for them," Jason said.

"When creating a plan, consider what your pets will eat and drink, how you will transport them, and where you are taking them. "Once you have your kit prepared, keep it somewhere that's easily accessible. Keep towels and woollen blankets on hand to protect pets during the journey and to keep them as cool as possible.

"Another valuable step is microchipping pets for easy identification and ensuring your phone number is visible on their collar. For horses and livestock, a separate plan is required.

"If you're unable to evacuate livestock, the safest place is a large, well-grazed, and fenced area away from roads where they can move freely with access to water," Jason said.

"Make sure you're prepared. Late evacuation will put you and your animals at risk."

RSPCA Victoria CEO Dr Liz Walker reiterated the importance of including pets in bushfire survival plans.

"Planning for emergencies is such a crucial part of life in Victoria particularly during the summer months," Dr Walker said.

"Many people across the state already have a Fire Ready Plan in place, and we're urging everyone to make sure their pets are included too.

"An emergency kit with medication, updated contact details on microchips and collars, photos or scans on your phone of important documents like vaccination certifications, are just some of the items to prepare in advance.

"Our pets are such an important part of our lives, including them in your Fire Ready plans increases the chances of you and your pet making it to safety in an emergency situation."

### Campfire warnings on fire danger days

EMERGENCY services are urging campers to ensure they are aware of current fire danger ratings after 18 people were warned about unauthorised campfires in the state's east last month.

Jamieson police and Jamieson CFA conducted a patrol of camping grounds in the Upper Goulburn State Forest between 7am and 11am on Boxing Day. This was a day of total fire ban due to the hot weather.

During this patrol, 18 people were found to have lit a campfire at their site, with the fires immediately dealt with by authorities.

With the exception of one site, all campers were in the area from metropolitan Melbourne.

Last week police issued a warning about the dangers of unextinguished campfires following an incident in Cape Otway this month that led to a bushfire.

About 14 hectares were burned during the fire on January 8 and approximately 150 people needed to be evacuated from nearby campsites.

Investigators from Forest Fire Management, Colac Crime Investigation Unit (CIU) and the Arson and Explosives Squad have determined the cause of the fire to be an unattended campfire which appears not to have been extinguished.

Police are now treating the bushfire as a criminal investigation and detectives from Colac CIU are appealing for any witnesses.

Emergency services are reminding campers that a recklessly lit fire such as a campfire on a total fire ban day can have the same outcome as a deliberately lit fire, including significant loss of life, serious injury and property damage.

Recklessly lit fires can include things like disobeying restrictions relating to Total Fire Bans or fire danger periods, leaving

campfires unattended, or using machinery during hot weather.

Police will investigate and take action to catch those responsible when a fire is deemed suspicious, whether it was a deliberate or reckless action.

Anyone found guilty of recklessly or intentionally causing a bushfire faces a penalty of up to 15 years imprisonment.

Detective Inspector Chris Murray from the Arson and Explosives Squad said, "It is absolutely critical that people are aware of the current fire danger rating and what it means for them, both before they head out on a trip and during the duration of the trip.

"The weather can change quickly, meaning people need to adjust their behaviour. It may mean that on one day a campfire is permitted but the next day it absolutely is not.

"The actions of these 18 people could have led to catastrophic consequences for their families and everyone around them. It could have resulted in the destruction of people's properties and livelihoods, as well as irreparable damage to the local bushland.

"No life is worth a campfire and I again want to remind the community that if you light it, you own it, which includes all the consequences of your actions."

# Agriculture, Horticulture, Viticulture, Aquaculture and Silviculture Big yarding for Blue Ribbon Weaner Sale in Yea

THE Elders Yea Blue Ribbon Weaner Sale took place last week over two days for a total of 6159 cattle yarded and \$7.6 million turnover.

Wednesday saw 2842 cattle yarded, with the focus on Euro X steers and all breed heifers. The vast majority of the cattle sold on the day were Angus X heifers, numbering almost 2000. There were also around 350 British breed heifers sold, and over 150 Euro X steers and 150 Euro X heifers sold.

The top steer pen on Wednesday was Charolais breed and fetched around 397c/kg or \$1700, with a weight of 427.9kg. The top heifer pen sold for around 392c/kg or \$1590 with a weight of 405.3kg, marking a 42c increase over the top heifer pen in Yea on January 10.

These pens both sold for more and were weightier than the averages for the day, with average price per head coming in at \$1082 and the average weight being 316.5kg, meaning the average was 342c/kg. Even more cattle were yarded on Friday, with a total of 3317 mixed Angus and British steers.

Prices rose over Wednesday, perhaps due to the heavier weights and popularity of Angus cattle. Average price per head was \$1410 and the average weight per head was 347.3kg, around 30kg heavier than the Wednesday sale. This meant the average price per head was 406c/kg.

Given there were only steers, the top pen fetched 406c/kg or \$1830 per head. These cattle were well clear of the average weight, pushing the scales to 450.4kg.

Members of the Victoria Police Eastern Region Proactive Unit visited the Yea Saleyards on both the Wednesday and the Friday to discuss farm safety with attendees, and Yea and District Memorial Hospital provided free skin checks on the Friday.

Coming off such a big annual sale, this Friday will see the Elders and Nutrien Combined Store Sale for January take place, starting at 9.30am.

### **On Farm Connectivity Program returns to support farmers**

THE National Farmers' Federation (NFF) has welcomed funding for a third round of the On Farm Connectivity Program (OFCP).

Announced recently by the Minister for Communications, Michelle Rowland, the OFCP is designed to assist farmers to adopt advanced connected machinery and sensor technology.

In previous rounds of the program, farmers have benefited from a 50 per cent rebate on eligible equipment costs, including installation and training, with rebates ranging from \$1000 to \$30,000.

NFF President David Jochinke praised the value of the program, with funding

increased to a pool of \$20 million for round three.

"The NFF is a strong supporter of this program and the direct benefit it creates for farmers," Mr Jochinke said.

"Embracing connectivity and digital infrastructure is key to unlocking the productivity of the agricultural sector, but high upfront costs are often a barrier. This program is a smart investment for the government and a win for Australian farmers, who, through the NFF, have been calling for further rounds."

The NFF's Regional Tech Hub has resources and advice available for farmers seeking to access the program.

"I encourage farmers to get prepared for when applications open later this year. Find a spare moment to give the Regional Tech Hub a buzz and make the most of this opportunity," Mr Jochinke said.

"My advice to farmers however would be that like previous rounds, round three is likely to be oversubscribed. So if you're ready to buy some kit and the investment makes sense without the rebate, buy now."

Following the success of the two previous rounds and increasing industry interest, the NFF is calling on all sides of politics to get behind the program.

"This program has been a stroke of genius. As we head into an election, we

would like to see all parties support further funding for the program to give producers and agtech providers confidence that this funding will flow," Mr Jochinke said.

"Now more than ever, we need programs which support increased productivity and sustainability. The On Farm Connectivity Program does exactly that by allowing more farmers to adopt technology that makes their farms safer, more productive and more sustainable.

"The NFF will continue to work closely with government on the design of the program to ensure it remains equitable and accessible to farmers around the country."



### Japanese encephalitis virus detected in northern Victoria

HOLIDAY makers and residents in the state's north are being reminded to remain vigilant against mosquitoes, following recent detections of the Japanese encephalitis virus.

Victoria's early warning mosquito surveillance program has identified the virus in two mosquito traps in Moira Shire, the first mosquito-borne disease detections this season.

It follows similar recent detections in New South Wales and a confirmed human case of Japanese encephalitis identified in Victoria in December.

Victoria's Chief Health Officer, Tarun Weeramanthri, said the findings confirmed the virus was circulating in northern Victoria.

"Japanese encephalitis virus can cause a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain and is spread to humans through bites from infected mosquitoes," Dr Weeramanthri said.

**Plenty of fish in the lakes** 

VICTORIAN fishers are in for a bumper season, with more chances to hook, line and sinker a Murray cod thanks to 10 years of record fish stocking by the state government.

Minister for Outdoor Recreation Steve Dimopoulos visited Karkarook Lake recently to release 6000 Murray cod fingerlings for fishers and to celebrate the government's continued investment in Victorian fishing.

"We want Victorians to get out and enjoy our great outdoors and there's no better time to wet a line, with 66 million fish stocked in the last decade, more than all other Australian states and territories combined," Mr Dimopoulos said.

"There are millions of reasons Victorian families should get out and drop a line this year, with dozens of lakes and rivers stocked across the state."

Since 2014, more than 66 million fish have been released across Victoria including golden perch, Australian bass, estuary perch, trout, salmon and dusky flathead. That is more stocking than all other Australian states and territories combined.

The fingerlings released today were produced at the Arcadia Native Fish Hatchery, near Shepparton, which is being upgraded to triple its size and will see it produce up to six million native fish each year, part of a \$15 million investment.

Since 2014, more than 22 million Murray cod have been stocked into Victorian waters at more than 60 locations across the state.

Several Victorian lakes are open year-round so fishers can wet a line and reel in a Murray cod including Lake Eppalock, Rocklands Reservoir and Lake Eildon. Since 2014, Lake Eppalock alone has scored 2.4 million cod, with locals and visitors now catching increasing numbers of fish, which are likely upward of three to four years old.

Near the Grampians, Rocklands Reservoir has been stocked with millions of Murray cod since 2017, plenty of which are now being caught by freshwater anglers.

Several other waterways are flourishing thanks to record stocking and delivering benefits for nearby communities like Melton Reservoir, Cairn Curran, Taylors Lake near Horsham, Eildon and Lake Nillahcootie.

### Dale McKeon: The man behind the Yea Cruise Night

DALE McKeon is the mastermind behind the ever-popular Yea Cruise Night that fills the main street of Yea with classic cars once a month, bringing shiny fenders and the rumble of engines to Murrindindi Shire.

Famous around town for his toreador red 1958 Plymouth Belvedere and photography skills, this masthead sat down with Dale to talk about who he is and what he is passionate about.

"I've had it [a passion for classic cars] for a long time. My dad had an old car in the garage for years that was his from the 60s. It was a 1939 Ford, which he took off the road to do stuff to, bought all these parts for it, and never got back to it. It sat in the shed for pretty much my entire childhood, not going, but it was always there," Dale said.

"I had an aunty who had a car similar to that, which I always loved. It just stuck in my mind.'

Dale's photography skills emerged when he took up the hobby following a major injury some years ago.

"The backstory on my photography is that I had a serious back injury about 2012-13. I had a double fusion in my lower back. I was doing metal fabrication at the time. I've been in metal trades my whole life. Basically, I had to give that up, I couldn't work, and I was off work for years," Dale said.

"Some of my hobbies took over, which was photography. While I was recovering, I bought a camera and mucked around a little bit. Once I was okay with life a bit, I went around to a few more car events and things like that. It really is just a hobby, and I enjoy that. I've been doing some community photos and stuff, and it's been good to do that."

Dale and his now-wife Amanda Price moved from Melbourne to Yea during COVID-19 and started looking around for car events and clubs.

"In Melbourne, we moved up from Croydon in the eastern suburbs, and we went to a lot of car events down that way often. When we moved here, the first thing was to get on Facebook and see what events are going on around here to go and do stuff. I could see there wasn't a lot," Dale said.

With a clear niche to fill, Dale contacted Jim Wolstencroft, then-president of the Bushrodders Rod and Custom Club, and

pitched him the idea of running an event in Yea. The pair now work together at Deluxe Rod Shop just outside of Yea.

"I messaged as you do... I'd seen they'd [Bushrodders Rod and Custom Club] previously run some events in town, but I think the last one was 2017. There wasn't a lot happening, and that [COVID] sort of stopped them from having different events," Dale said.

"One thing led to another, I met him, and I said I had an idea... I was thinking about doing something here. He was very encouraging and said let's just do it. We created a Facebook page and put an event out with no council approval or anything, just a social gathering of like-minded people.

"It's an empty main street, if you've got an old car bring it along. It was very casual to begin with."

The Yea Cruise Night began in December 2021 and has flourished into a major event that brings the town to life. Many of the shops in the main street of Yea sponsor the cruise night, and the Yea Community House handle the logistical side of the event.

Dale and Amanda are the dynamic duo who capture the essence of the cruise night in the form of photography, sharing their pictures online. Dale handles the car photography, while Amanda wanders the main street taking pictures of the crowd and families enjoying the event.

This gives a good perspective of how the event imbues Yea with a special buzz once a month on a Saturday night. Dale spoke

about the healthy connection between the cruise night and the Yea residents.

"The amount of local people that came [at the start], and continue to come and support it, has surprised me a little bit. We started it for car people, but lots of families and kids and whatever come down for the night and it's something to do in Yea. They've been really supportive, which is good," Dale said.

Since starting the Yea Cruise Night, Dale now works at Deluxe Rod Shop, with the job evolving from the owner, Steven Alldrick, enlisting Dale to take photos and improve the shop's social media footprint.

"I met Steven, who is the owner of Deluxe. After we started the cruise night, he initially wanted some photography work for his business. That was the real reason I went there. He got in touch with me and said he wanted to improve his social media. He didn't have time to take photos, he's too busy building hot rods," Dale said.

"I went there initially to go and do that, but we talked, and he realised I could weld and use a lathe and do some metal work from my previous life. I hadn't worked in that game since my back injury, so I just eased myself back into work there, so now I do three days a week there and photos and stuff for him. Building hot rods at Deluxe is great, I enjoy it.

"I moved here and one thing led to another, it wasn't my intention. But obviously I do something that appeals to people," Dale concluded.

"If you're visiting northern Victoria, particularly inland riverine regions and near the Murray River, you're potentially at higher risk of infection.

"It's important to take steps to prevent mosquito bites so cover up, use repellent and limit your time outdoors when mosquitoes are about."

The Japanese encephalitis virus vaccine is free for eligible people in 24 high-risk local government areas in northern Victoria.

If camping or caravanning in high-risk areas of northern Victoria: Ensure mosquito screens are intact; close doors and tent flaps to stop mosquitoes getting inside; use a mosquito net if mosquito screens are not available; try to avoid camping near wetland habitats where mosquitoes are likely breeding.

There is no specific treatment available for Japanese encephalitis. The best prevention is to protect against mosquito bites. For people who develop Japanese encephalitis, treatment aims to reduce the severity of the symptoms and may include medication and admission to hospital.

### **Murrindindi's** median house price falls

MEDIAN house prices in Murrindindi Shire have not fared well over the last 12 months, according to a recent report from Domain.

Murrindindi Shire's median house price dropped by 11.9 per cent from December 2023 to December 2024, from \$732,500 to \$645,000. The longer term growth remains positive however, with a five year increase of 44.4 per cent, starting at \$446,750 in December 2019.

In the surrounding area, the annual median price decreased by 7.1 per cent in Alpine Shire, and increased by 3.3 per cent in Mitchell Shire. There wasn't enough data for Mansfield, Yarra Ranges and Strathbogie to be determined.

The only regional Victorian shire with a larger fall in median house value than Murrindindi was Colac Otway Shire with a 13.3 per cent drop, and equal to Murrindindi Shire with a 11.9 per cent drop was Yarriambiack.

Many city dwellers were keen to move to regional Victoria during COVID-19. In recent times, this may have shifted with many office workers needing to return to the centralised office, post-COVID-19.

Melbourne house prices increased by almost \$16,000 (1.6 per cent) over the December quarter to \$1.039 million. It is the first quarterly gain in a year and the largest in three years.

Notably, it's the first time in about four years that Melbourne has recorded stronger positive quarterly growth than Sydney. This improvement has softened the pace of annual decline, with house prices down by almost \$11,000 (-1.0 per cent), making Melbourne the only capital city to record a decline in house prices over 2024.

Despite the positive shift over the quarter, Melbourne has struggled to enter a sustained ecovery over the past three conditions remaining subdued. The positive change in the final quarter of 2024 means Melbourne house prices are about one-quarter into a recovery, though they remain almost \$54,000 (-4.9 per cent) below their December 2021 peak.

Melbourne unit prices increased by almost \$12,000 (2.1 per cent) over the December quarter to \$577,405. This is the strongest quarterly gain in 1.5 years and brings unit prices to their highest level in 2.5 years. Despite this quarterly reacceleration, annual growth has continued to slow, and has halved compared to the previous year. Units have consistently outperformed houses over the past two years, narrowing the price gap between property types to just over a twoyear low. A house now costs 80 per cent more than a unit.







# Fun facts about huntsman spiders

HUNTSMAN spiders are harmless to humans. They rarely bite us, but when they do, it's likely to cause only mild pain and can be treated with a cold pack.

Only the badge huntsman (Neosparassus *diana*) bite can produce unpleasant symptoms, including localised pain and swelling, sweating, nausea and vomiting.

No-one has ever died from a huntsman bite in Australia, however if you are concerned after a bite, seek medical attention.

The huntsman spider diet includes cockroaches, mosquitoes and other insects, as well as small skinks and geckoes. They don't build webs to catch them, but instead either ambush the insects or run them down and bite them to immobilise them. Cockroaches are their favourite food.

Huntsman spiders do create webs, but only to create daytime retreats or to protect their young.

There are around 200 different species of huntsman spiders in Australia, 94 of which have been described, and 1363 worldwide. One of Australia's huntsman spiders, the tiger huntsman, was only discovered in 2006 in far north Queensland and is yet to gain a scientific name.

In the bush, they tend to live in the bark of trees or under rocks, however they also like to live in homes or cars. They tend to be most active at night, and when it's raining or humid.

Delena cancerides, or social huntsman, are the only species of huntsman spider which live together, and there can be hundreds of them in the one location. They hunt and raise offspring together. They're often found on dead acacia trees.

There's a species of huntsman spider, which sadly does not appear in Australia called Heteropoda davidbowie.

The wheel spider, a species of huntsman which lives in the Namib Desert in Africa, quite literally cartwheels down hills to escape predators. The videos are fantastic, and we recommend that you look them up.

The fastest huntsman is the golden huntsman. It has been recorded travelling at a speed of 110 centimetres per second.

Huntsman spiders have eight eyes divided into two rows. All the better to see you with my dear.

The average huntsman leg span is 15cm. The giant huntsman spider, which lives in Laos, has a leg span of up to 30cm.

Male huntsman spiders use sound to attract a mate. This can be heard by humans and tends to sound like a quartz clock ticking.

A female huntsman spider can lay up to 200 eggs.

Huntsman spiders live for about two years. They must shed their skin to grow, and this skin can often be found by humans.

Their predators include birds, geckos, spider wasps, nematode worms and egg parasites of wasps and flies.
